flat pods; Tendergreen, a fairly new round pod green bean, is in the same class in excellence.

If you have never tasted the crisp dark green crumpled leaves of Chieftain, the latest development in Savoy or "odorless" cabbage, you have a treat coming. While there's no mistaking its sistership to other cabbages, there's a difference!

A vast improvement has been made in garden peas these later years. Little Marvel and any of the Laxton type have richer sweeter flavor than some handed down from earlier days.

Naturally, you will want your vegetable garden to consist mostly of your old favorites and standbys. But a few of the newer varieties added along with the others may prove to be a genuine revelation. If your dealer does not have them, he can undoubtedly get them for you.

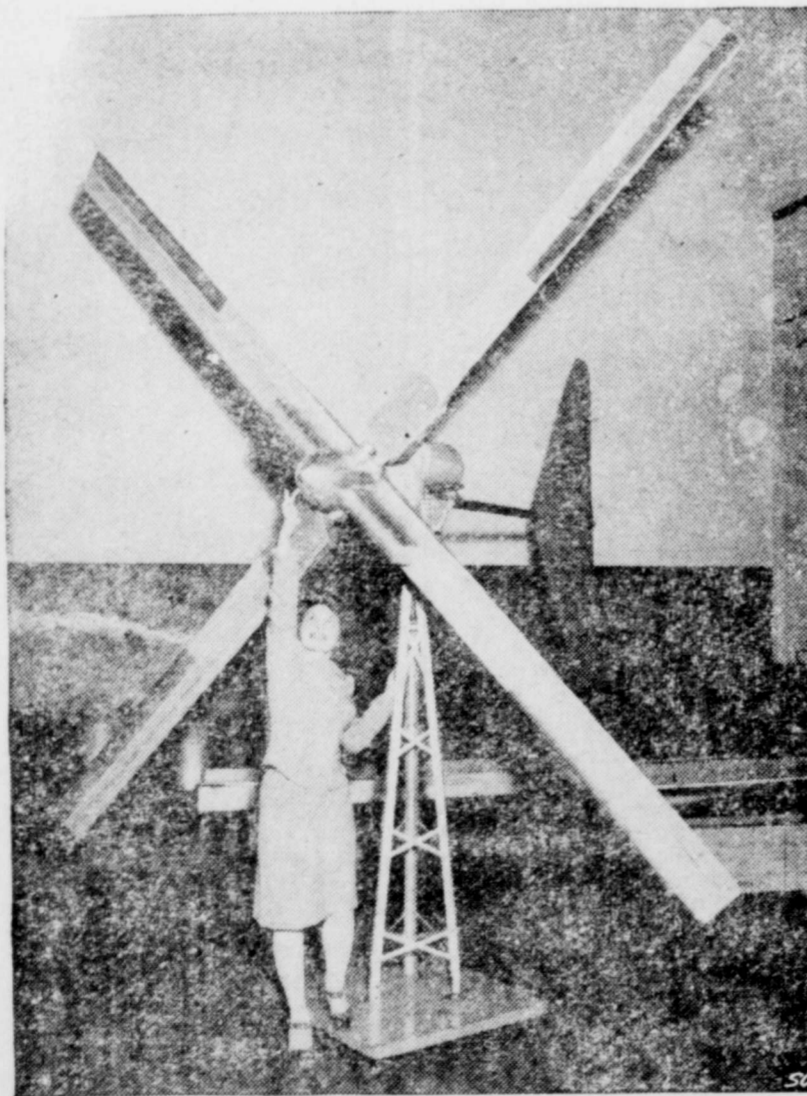

New Electric Supply For Farms



— SIOUX CITY, IA.—A new four-bladed, wind-driven generator for 32-volt farm lighting systems that will charge batteries in winds as low as five miles per hour makes possible a new electric supply for the one million farms beyond reach of power lines. Blades are air foils that are pulled around by the wind instead of being pushed as with the conventional pressure type used on standard wind mills. This Wincharger is equipped with an automatic governor which feathers two blades to prevent excessive charging rate during high winds. The unit when used with proper type of storage battery will provide 100 kilowatt hours of dependable power per month. This is enough to operate an electric refrigerator, a water system, radio, vacuum cleaner, washing machine and iron, and provide power for cream separator, milking machine, illuminated chicken house and light-type pig brooder. The average electric consumption of electrified farms in the United States is 71 kilowatt hours per month.

The Sterling B team eked out a 36-35 win.

The local A team lost to Water Valley in the evening of February 19 42-32. This game between Sterling and Water Valley was a curtain-raiser to the main event of the evening, which was a district basketball between Water Valley and Crews, Crews being the winner.

## Audit Shows A Balance of \$10,680.89

The balance in all funds for Sterling County stood at \$10,680.89 June 30, 1945, according to an audit filed this week by the San Angelo firm of Sedgwick and Cherry, certified public accountants.

The audit, embracing a four year period ending last June 30, was the first for Sterling County in its history and is the first of annual audits now planned by the commissioners' court.

### GENERAL FUND GROWS

The examination by the San Angelo firm showed the county's financial condition in the general fund to have grown from \$841.05 on June 30, 1942, to \$2,148.75 on June 30 last year. At the same time, the county discharged \$79,000 in bonds and warrants to leave \$167,000 in outstanding indebtedness at the close of June last year.

The audit challenged the county's having paid for office supplies for various officials and suggested that County Treasurer O. M. Cole balance his books monthly.

"The records have been adequate and well kept" on the present method employed by Cole, Sedgwick reported to the court in recommending changes in Cole's system.

Sheriff Vern Davis and County Clerk W. W. Durham were cited in the audit. Of the two officials, the audit said:

Davis—This official was showed to owe the county \$59.87 on June 30, the sum representing errors in computing commissions. Otherwise, "it is our opinion that his records are adequate and exceptionally well kept."

Durham—"We want to commend Mr. Durham for the method he has adopted in accounting for work done by county equipment and distribution of pay checks. This new method was installed shortly after June 30, 1945."

"STATEMENT OF ACCOUNT" The audit listed "a statement of account" for W. N. Reed, former county commissioner who resigned last May after he was charged with neglect of official duty. The "Statement of account" listed 13 county warrants on payrolls ranging from \$15 to \$22 and adding up to \$227.50, and added that examination of the county treasurer's records showed "The account has been satisfied."

The permanent school fund was shown to have \$35,500, \$14,000 of it in government bonds, bearing interest at the rate of 2 1/8 to 5 per cent.

The commissioners have called for bids on a second audit, to cover the period of June 30, 1945, through Dec. 31. Thereafter, the audits will be on a calendar year basis.—From the San Angelo Standard-Times.

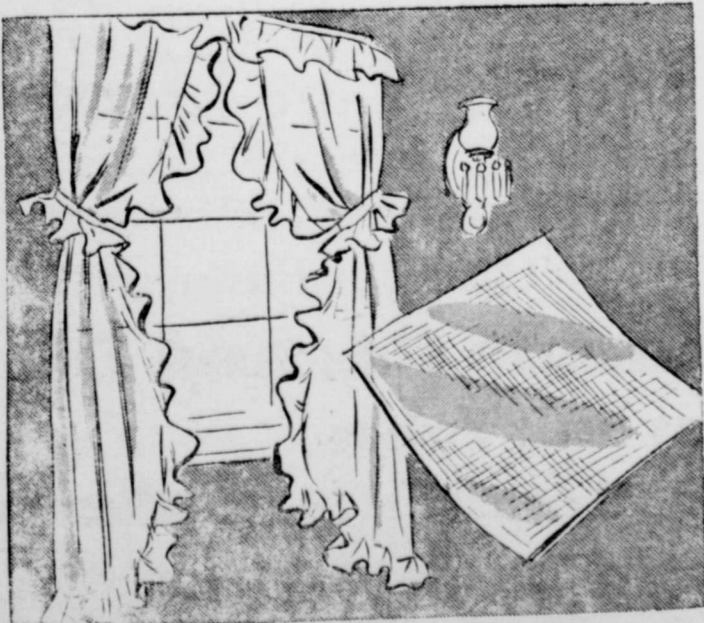

The use of left-over canned baby foods is a problem which concerns many mothers. Canned baby foods may be as safely stored as any other cooked foods, if promptly covered (preferably in the original container—either tin or glass) and refrigerated. However, even with this knowledge, some mothers refuse to feed their infants other than from a freshly opened container but, at the same time, deplore the waste which results. If there is another young child in the household, their foods may often be adapted to his diet, thus saving time and money. Or perhaps the busy mother would welcome similar dishes in her own lunch. Below are given a few simple uses.

#### Cream Soup

½ can strained vegetable or strained soup  
¼ to ½ cup milk  
½ teaspoon butter  
1 teaspoon flour (optional)  
Salt and other suitable seasonings

Heat the milk and butter (or make thin white sauce if flour is used), add strained vegetable or soups, other seasonings and serve.

#### Tomato-Vegetable Cocktail

¾ cup chilled tomato juice  
½ can strained vegetables or soup chilled  
½ teaspoon lemon juice  
Salt

Blend ingredients and serve cold. The strained soups give especially interesting flavors.

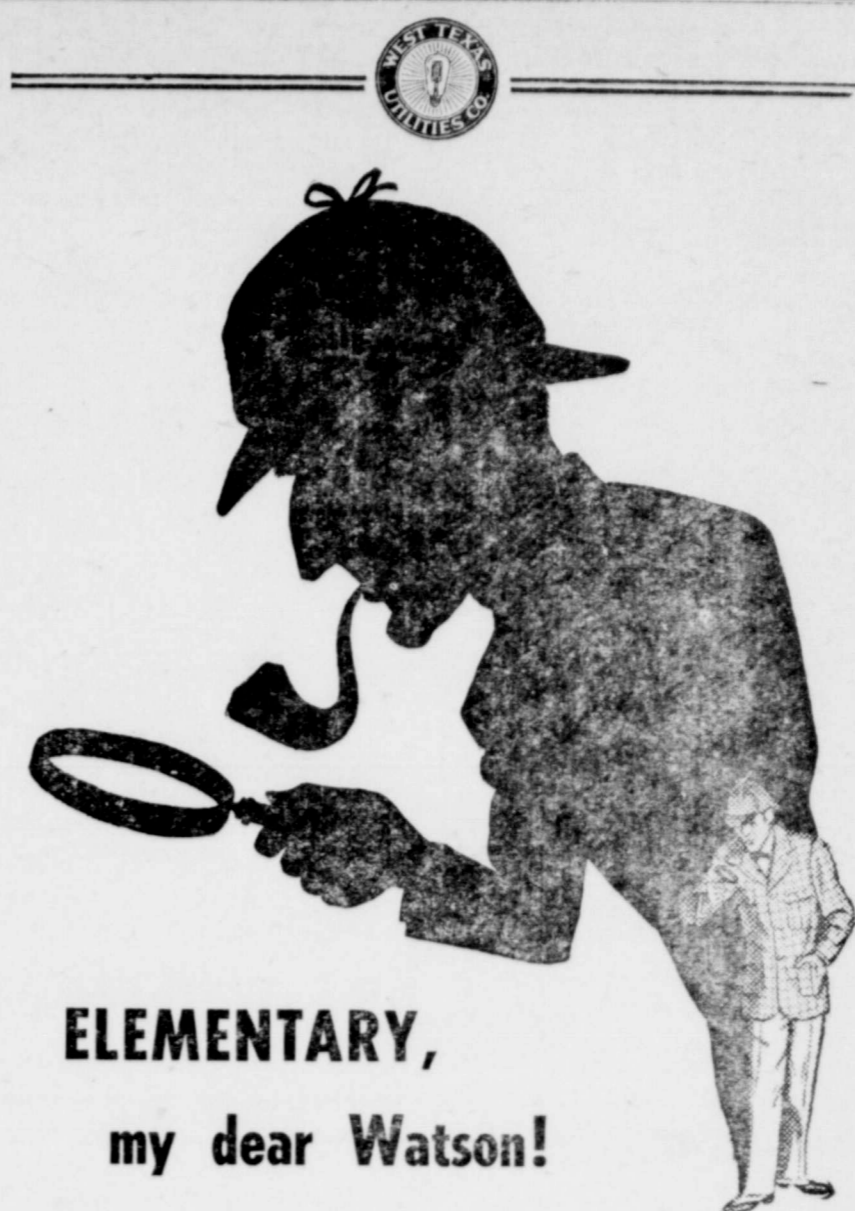
**Hundred Years Old**



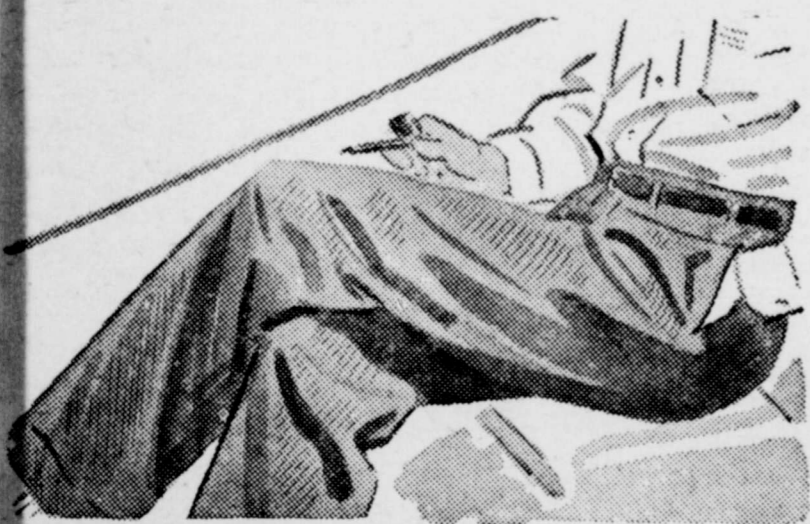

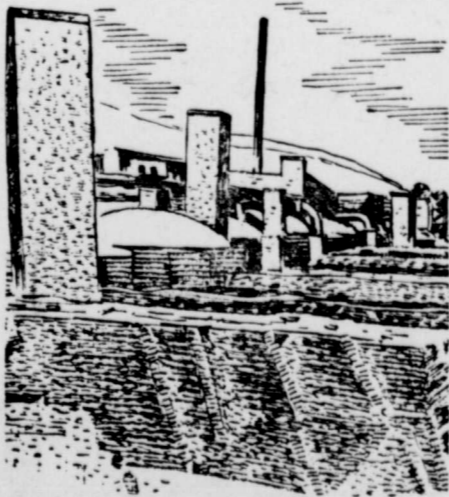
