Frozen Locker Plant Started

Work on the new frozen locker plant was begun here this week. The Bade brothers, Julius and Louis, said that the plant should be open for business by the middle of July. The various contractors say the plant should be ready by the first of July, but Julius allows two weeks for extra time.

One of the city's most colorful spectacles is the annual Decoration Day Czechoslovak parade in native costume.

The Latin-American colony on Saturday nights is alive with excitement. Dance dens are throbbing with rumba rhythms. Watch these lithe people weave their ball-bearing torsos during the tantalizing tempos. They make the rumba a fine art.

Famed Chinatown is packed with more happy orientals than you can find in Asia. Here are unique joss houses where Chinese Buddhists worship. Shops hawk exotic herbs at fantastic fees. And if you listen closely, you can pick up the jive lingo and swift patter of the almond-eyed jitterbugs.

At the foot of Washington Street you will appreciate New York's cosmopolitan rep. This is the Syrian Quarter where newsstands feature Arabic dailies.

Turks, Armenians and Greeks also make their homes here. Shops glitter with vivid Syrian silks of rainbow hues. Coffee houses and confectioneries of the Levantines add a picturesque touch. Occasionally, you can be startled by the sight of an old man in a fez.

Little Italy's rollicking fiestas are among the town's wow scenes. The streets are strung with lights, and happiness gets a workout. The people sing and dance and toss inhibitions to the winds.

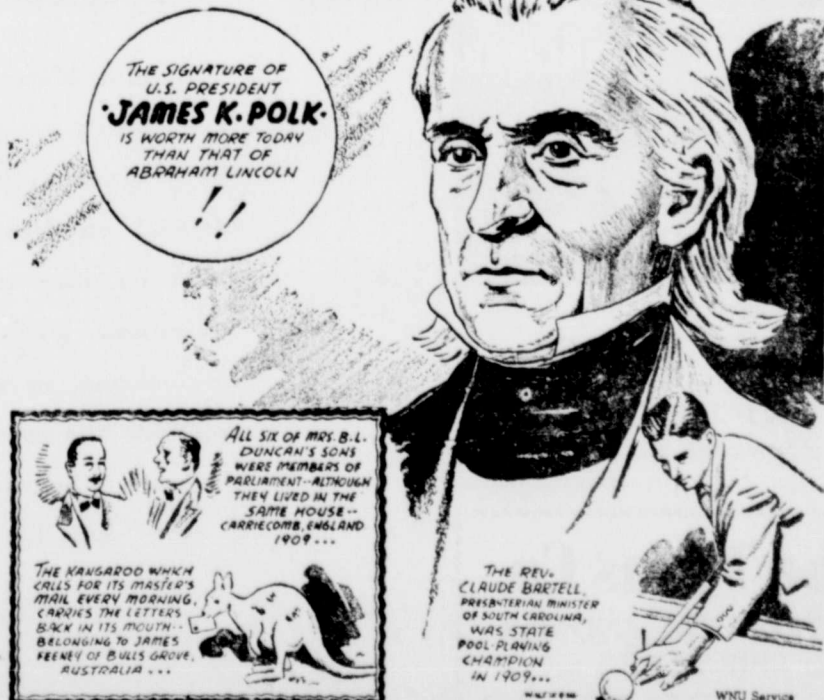

Good Lighting Adds to Comfortable Living



GOOD home lighting not only adds to cheerful and comfortable living but also provides a cheap form of accident prevention, writes Myrtle Fabsbender, director of home lighting for Westinghouse in Capper's Farmer, a magazine of national circulation.

"To say 'home is what the abc's of good lighting help to make it' is to take considerable liberty with a very tender expression," she points out in the magazine read by 1,250,000 farm families. "But it's paraphrased with real sincerity. For unless a home is cheerful and comfortable by night, as well as during daylight, it has sacrificed some of the livability good lighting can give. Good light can bring an almost sunlight quality of illumination to after-

dark eye tasks. It can make or mar the beauty of a home."

Among the basic principles for good lighting are: 1—A carefully thought-out-over-all plan for the job; 2—Having enough light when and where you need it; 3—Avoiding harmful glares; 4—Avoiding shadows in the room.

The above photograph demonstrates basic principles for good lighting. The floor and table lamps with reflector bowls give light where the family sits to read, sew or write. Such a pleasing over-all glow of light cheers up the room as sunlight does. Wall brackets and fluorescent tubes behind windows window valances are mainly for decorative effect.

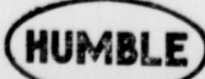

PLANES FOR FARMERS

WASHINGTON — The airplane will benefit the farmers of the United States as much in the near future as did the railroad in the last half of the 19th century and the automobile in the 20th century, according to surveys reported by the Air Transport Association of America.

The Department of Agriculture estimates that at least 3,000 post-war surplus planes may become air trucks to transport produce. Already air delivery of several varieties to markets over long distances has proved feasible. Present plans of the airlines call for the encouragement of farmers in all sections of the country to raise vegetables and crops which heretofore have been confined within a market radius of 200 miles. Henceforth distances are likely to become a secondary factor.

Air parcel post, if and when adopted, as provided in a bill before Congress, will greatly increase the rural value of the airplane, not only to ship produce, but also to bring back manufactured articles, including machinery parts. The extension of parcel post to the airlines would mean that more than 42,000 postal offices would be added to the 23,000 express offices now delivering air express.

Possibilities appear limited only by individual ingenuity. Uses foreseen for the airplane include the transportation of flying doctors and medicine, and of patients to hospitals; the flying in of grain and feed to farms isolated by floods or blizzards; spreading of germicides, dusting, inspecting and checking crops, cattle, sheep and fences, shooting coyotes, wolves and other pests, fertilizing, and seeding.

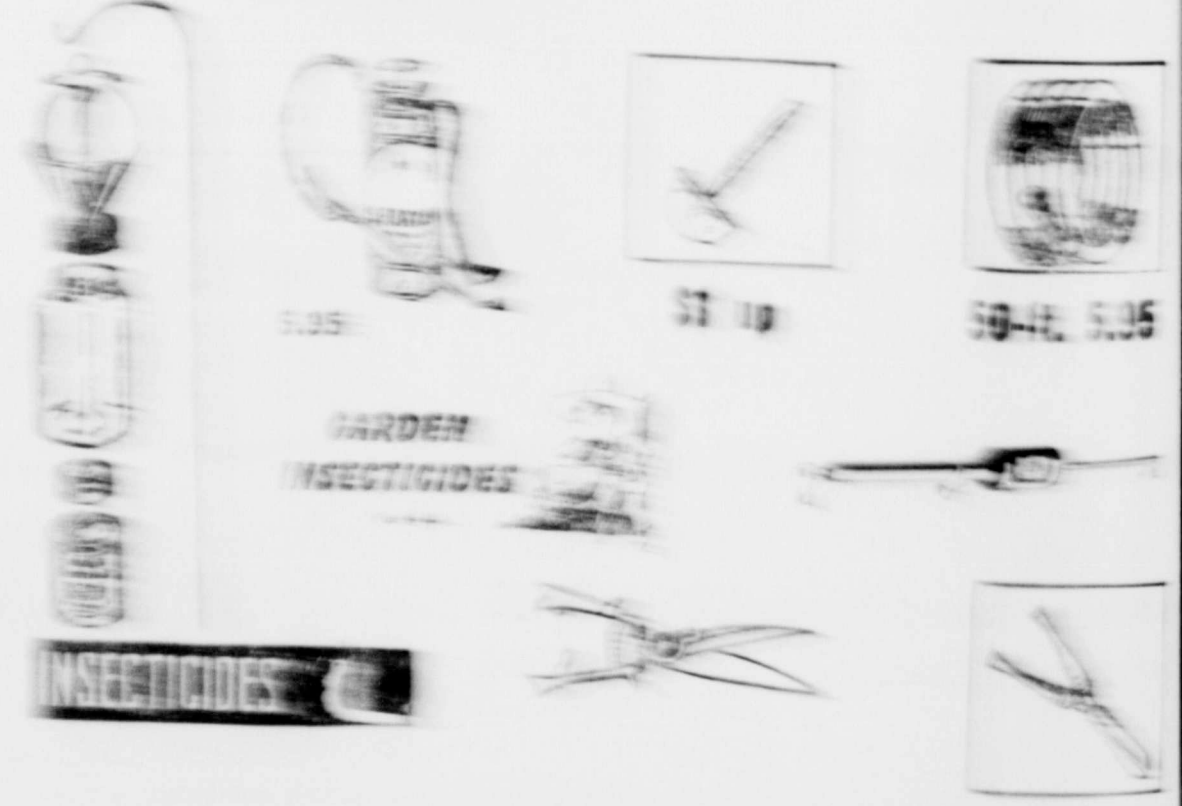

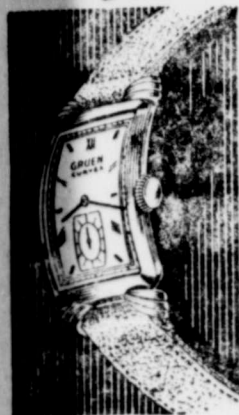

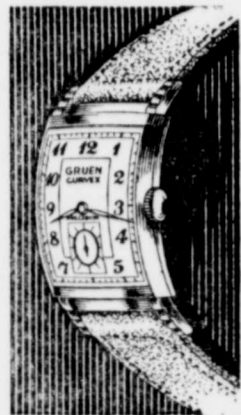

Q. If a disabled veteran is rated totally disabled by the Veterans Administration is it permissible for him to take part-time employment?

A. Each case rests on its own merits. The nature of the disability and the nature of the employment are all important. Employability is usually considered in determining the degree of disability but is not necessarily the deciding factor. Often part-time employment is considered occupational therapy—good medicine. Again employment may be evidence of improvement and a reduction in compensation or pension can be expected. The best advice: See a DAV national service officer.

Q. Does a disabled veteran receive an increase in pension on reaching age 65?

A. Public Law 313 provides an increase when a veteran has been in receipt of pension for a continuous period of ten years or attains

age 65. Contact your nearest Disabled American Veterans service officer for complete information.

Q. Can a veteran who is rated as 100 per cent disabled apply for unemployment compensation under the GI Bill?

A. As long as a veteran is considered unemployable, there might be some question as to whether or not he is entitled to draw this unemployment compensation. Contact your local United States Employment Service for a ruling on this matter.

x x x

Q. If a disabled veteran fails to report for physical examination when ordered by the Veterans Administration does it affect his pension payments?

A. Yes. An award of disability compensation or pension may be suspended when a veteran fails to report for examination without adequate reason.

Actually wheat has never been a large item in the brewing process—only $\frac{8}{10,000}$ of the entire U. S. wheat crop was used in 1945.

In accordance with United States Government policy, the brewing industry has used no wheat whatever since March 1, 1946.

OTHER MATERIALS CUT 30%

The other grains used have been reduced by 30%—that is, to 70% of the 1945 amount.

Wheat alone can solve the problem of feeding the hungry. The grains to which the industry is now restricted, are of a variety and grade not normally consumed by the people of the world as food.

LESS BEER AND ALE

Altogether, the brewing industry is using 30%

less materials than in 1945. This results in a proportionately lower production. But since the current demand for beer and ale is about 25% greater than a year ago, the real shortage is nearer 50%.

Q. If a disabled veteran is rated totally disabled by the Veterans Administration is it permissible for him to take part-time employment?

A. Each case rests on its own merits. The nature of the disability and the nature of the employment are all important. Employability is usually considered in determining the degree of disability but is not necessarily the deciding factor. Often part-time employment is considered occupational therapy—good medicine. Again employment may be evidence of improvement and a reduction in compensation or pension can be expected. The best advice: See a DAV national service officer.

Q. Does a disabled veteran receive an increase in pension on reaching age 65?

A. Public Law 313 provides an increase when a veteran has been in receipt of pension for a continuous period of ten years or attains

age 65. Contact your nearest Disabled American Veterans service officer for complete information.

Q. Can a veteran who is rated as 100 per cent disabled apply for unemployment compensation under the GI Bill?

A. As long as a veteran is considered unemployable, there might be some question as to whether or not he is entitled to draw this unemployment compensation. Contact your local United States Employment Service for a ruling on this matter.

Q. If a disabled veteran fails to report for physical examination when ordered by the Veterans Administration does it affect his pension payments?

A. Yes. An award of disability compensation or pension may be suspended when a veteran fails to report for examination without adequate reason.

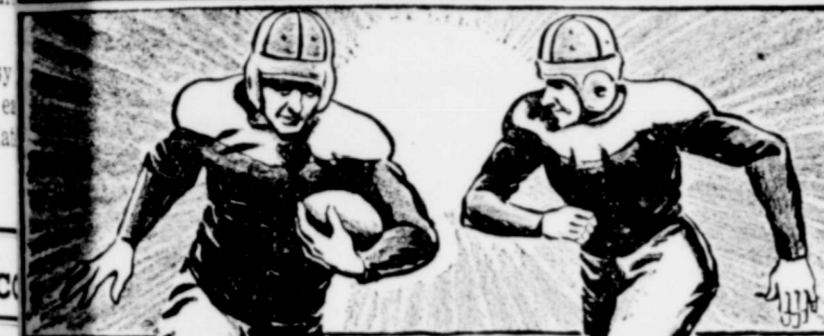
