





All babies are not alike; they are individuals. They do not all reach the stage in their development when they want to feed themselves at anywhere near the same age. If your child shows signs of wanting to hold his own cup or spoon, let him think he is holding it himself. As soon as possible, let him do it

Even after he starts feeding himself there will be a good many times — perhaps for weeks — when he will need help toward the end of the meal. Or he may get tired of doing it himself or just be bored and want you to feed him for sev-

It may save your time and avoid a mess to do the feeding yourself. But the mess has to come some time because he has to learn to feed himself. Your child will enjoy fearning to eat by his own efforts, if you let him do it when he is interested. Should you let that time pass, then you will find yourself trying to get him to do something in which he is not at that time in-

terested. As your child grows, you will have the joy of watching the changes which are constantly taking place. It is not necessary to forego discipline but it is much easier to maintain discipline if you use your child's developing personality to guide him and thus keep him interested in doing what you want

When he starts to feed himself, make things as easy for him as you can. A curved-handled baby spoon be easier for him to handle than the regulation teaspoon. Usually a small cup and preferably one with a lip will fit baby's mouth

The first foods he feeds himself should be the thick ones, not the more liquid. If his strained vege-table will fall off the spoon easily,

thicken it with some of his cereal. Strained fruit that is too thin can be thickened with some of his cereal as this will help it hold to the spoon.



Crown Fruit Salad a. Ilpht cream
b. c. mayonnaise

Soak gelatin in cold water. Heat fruit juice or juices to boiling; remove from heat and dissolve gelatin in hot juice. Cool. Add the light cream and mayonnaise and stir until mixture is smooth. Cool until mixture is slightly thickened; then add sliced fruit and halved cherries. Pour into a mold rinsed in cold water. Chill until firm. Unmold on glass plate or platter. Arrange lettuce leaves around the edge of the salad. Garnish with clusters of grapes, halves of bananas or slices of canned fruit. Serves six. This molded fruit salad is lovely to serve at a buffet supper.


