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AIR CARGO

CHICAGO—The zooming growth of air cargo is seen in steps taken by the 19 domestic airlines of the United States to set up equipment and schedules that will raise their capacity in the immediate post-war years by five-fold over the 1944 level, according to a survey by the Air Transport Association of America.

The airlines last year carried 202,879,006 pounds of mail, express and excess baggage, whereas the use of added planes on order or option will provide cargo space sufficient to handle about one billion pounds of cargo, ranging from jewelry and drugs to perishable foodstuff and machinery parts.

The expanded fleet of passenger planes will provide much additional cargo space, with some of them having compartments for mail and freight which can be made larger as any particular passenger load grows smaller. All-cargo planes of war-time types are increasing in numbers, to be supplemented very soon by planes designed exclusively for cargo carrying, with features which will greatly expedite the speed and economy of loading and unloading.

Meanwhile plans are underway for expanding present pick-up systems, which operate without landings. New methods are being studied by airlines and manufacturers.

Already a unit has been developed allowing a plane in flight to pick up a loaded glider from the ground, making peacetime routine of one of the war's most dramatic exploits.

All babies are not alike; they are individuals. They do not all reach the stage in their development when they want to feed themselves at anywhere near the same age. If your child shows signs of wanting to hold his own cup or spoon, let him think he is holding it himself. As soon as possible, let him do it all without your help.

Even after he starts feeding himself there will be a good many times—perhaps for weeks—when he will need help toward the end of the meal. Or he may get tired of doing it himself or just be bored and want you to feed him for several meals.

It may save your time and avoid a mess to do the feeding yourself. But the mess has to come some time because he has to learn to feed himself. Your child will enjoy learning to eat by his own efforts, if you let him do it when he is interested. Should you let that time pass, then you will find yourself trying to get him to do something in which he is not at that time interested.

As your child grows, you will have the joy of watching the changes which are constantly taking place. It is not necessary to forego discipline but it is much easier to maintain discipline if you use your child's developing personality to guide him and thus keep him interested in doing what you want him to do.

When he starts to feed himself, make things as easy for him as you can. A curved-handled baby spoon may be easier for him to handle than the regulation teaspoon. Usually a small cup and preferably one with a lip will fit baby's mouth better.

The first foods he feeds himself should be the thick ones, not the more liquid. If his strained vegetable will fall off the spoon easily, thicken it with some of his cereal. Strained fruit that is too thin can be thickened with some of his cereal as this will help it hold to the spoon.

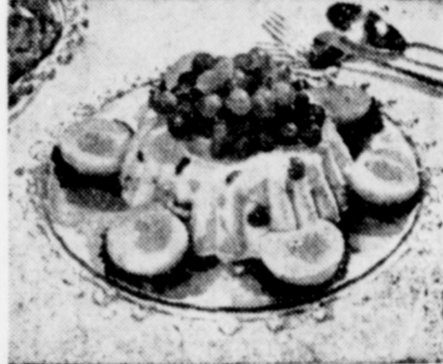

"Studded with jewel-colored pieces of fruit, it makes a lovely picture on your prettiest glass plate," she writes in the magazine read by 1,250,000 farm families. "Cool and tartly sweet it offers flavor contrast to the meat-and-potato

| 1 tbsp. unflavored gelatin | 1/2 c. light cream |
| 2 tsp. cold water | 1/2 c. mayonnaise |
| 1 c. fruit juice (peach, cherry, orange or pineapple) | 2 canned peaches or pears, sliced |
| 1/2 c. maraschino cherries | 1 orange, sliced |
| | 1/2 c. maraschino cherries |

Soak gelatin in cold water. Heat fruit juice or juices to boiling; remove from heat and dissolve gelatin in hot juice. Cool. Add the light cream and mayonnaise and stir until mixture is smooth. Cool until mixture is slightly thickened; then add sliced fruit and halved cherries. Pour into a mold rinsed in cold water. Chill until firm. Unmold on glass plate or platter. Arrange lettuce leaves around the edge of the salad. Garnish with clusters of grapes, halves of bananas or slices of canned fruit. Serves six. Q and A

Q. What to do with burned-out fluorescent light tubes?

A. They can be converted into neat towel racks.

Q. What was X-ray's service to Selective Service?

A. Examinations of 12,000,000 draftees in the first four years resulted in deferments for 120,000 whose lungs showed tubercular infection. Most of the men were not aware that they had tuberculosis.

Q. What is polythene?

A. A tough plastic slated for wide use because of its versatility. Already installed extensively as a covering for electric wiring and cable, it will be used for gaskets and battery parts, for water-proof and chemically-resistant coatings, adhesives and collapsible tubes for food and cosmetics.

Q. What happens when metal airplanes pick up charges of electricity in flight?

A. Generally, when the plane lands the electricity is discharged into the ground. When it becomes excessive as the plane is in flight it manifests itself in the phenomenon known as "St. Elmo's Fire," in which short streams of light appear between the plane and pointed obstructions, usually mountains. Though not dangerous, the static electricity can be virtually eliminated by connecting the various metal parts of a plane with wire so that the charges can be equalized.

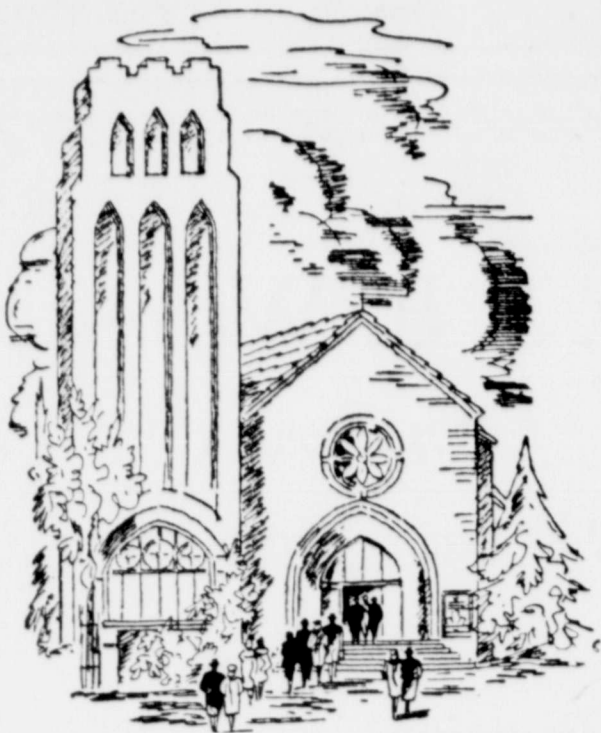
