New York, June 6. - The hungry and starving people of twenty-three countries are eligible to receive the food contributed through the Emergency Food Collection, it was announced today by Secretary of Commerce Henry A. Wallace, national chairman of the drive.

Mr. Wallace said he had been notified by UNRRA (United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation Administration), on whose behalf the appeal is being made, that sixteen countries now receiving UNRRA assistance, six other liberated nations in Europe, and famine-stricken India are eligible to receive the food.

The countries receiving UNRRA assistance are Albania, Austria, Byelorussia, China, Czechoslovakia, Dodecanes, Islands, Ethiopia, Finland, Greece, Hungary, Italy, Korea, Phillipines, Poland, Ukraine and Yugoslavia. The six other liberated countries in Europe eligible to receive the food are: Belgium, France, Netherlands, Denmark, Luxembourg, and Norway.

Temp Foster topped the Ft. Worth lamb market twice last week getting 15 1/2c for approximately 1000 head of crossbred lambs. Rufus, Roy and Lester Foster got 15 1/4c for their offerings on the same market last week.

Pecan Notes

County Agent J. M. Starr reports that 279 pecan trees were sprayed in Sterling City last week with a large pressure sprayer for control of pecan nut case bearer. Roy Scott from Rainey's Nursery did the work at an average cost of 50c to \$1 per tree. One more spraying this month to catch the second generation, will make the work 100 per cent effective, said Starr. Also pecan rosette needs controlling now, he pointed out.

Pecan growers should prepare now to protect their 1946 nut crop against the destructive casebearer. Spraying, according to J. M. Starr, county agricultural agent, Sterling County, gives the most effective control.

The casebearer is a worm hatched from eggs which moths lay on the end of the little nutlets. Usually the peak of the egg laying is closely related with the setting of the nuts. When the tip end of the nutlets turn brown they are said to be set.

The worms appear in five to seven days after the eggs are laid. They move down to the first buds to feed, and after about one week bore into the nuts. This feeding period is the only time that the casebearers can be controlled, because it is impossible to reach them after they enter the nutlets.

A mixture of six pounds of lead arsenate and hundred gallons of water sprayed on the trees with a power sprayer at the right time usually gives effective control of the worms. The grower should check the nutlets on the lower limbs to see whether eggs are present. If eggs are found the spray should be applied at once.

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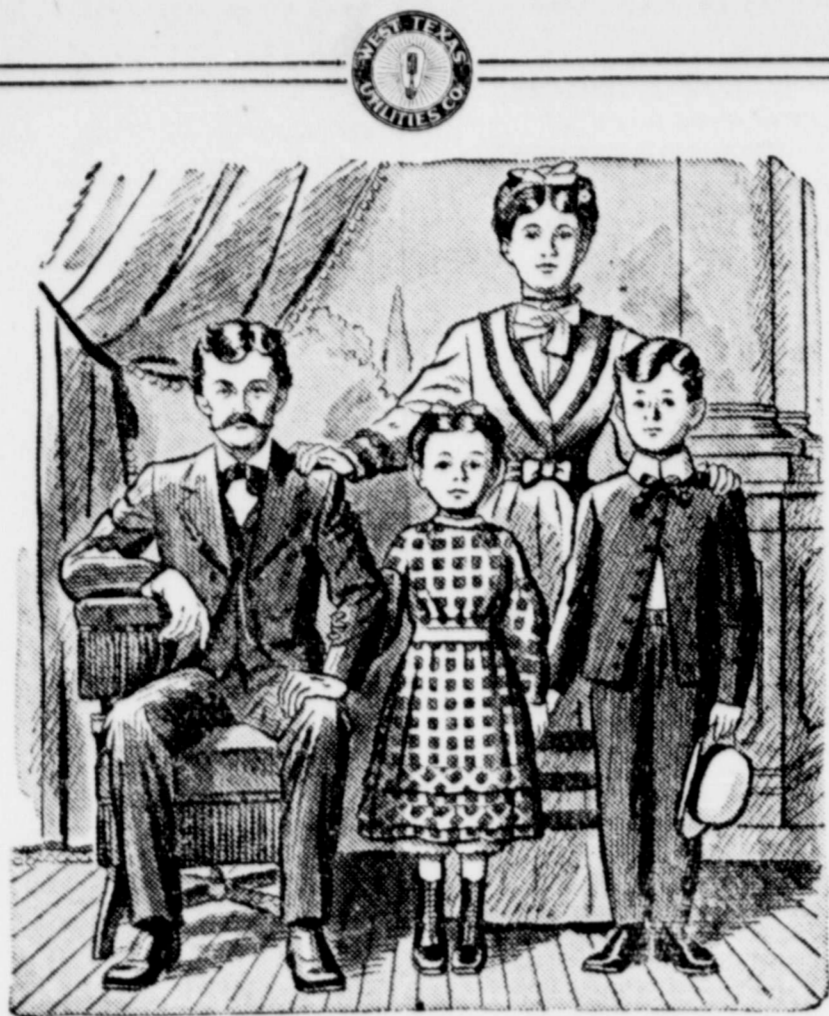

Wouldn't you be incensed if someone inferred that your pride and joy is only an average baby? Of course you would because you know he is a most unusual individual and that there was never another baby just like him.

With this recognition of her baby as a distinct individual, isn't it surprising that a mother can become such a "copy cat" in feeding him? The pattern set by other mothers of her acquaintance is too often her principal guide in this respect.

Many people seem to measure the extent of an infant's development in terms of how early he starts certain supplements to his diet. In an effort to "keep up with the Joneses," some mothers rush into extensive supplementary feeding without the counsel of the baby's physician.

Experience has shown that strained baby foods can be added with safety to the diets of most infants at comparatively early ages. In keeping with these observations, the medical profession has gradually lowered the starting age for most items.

But the doctor maintains a wide flexibility in the recommendations he makes. He recognizes, for instance that one baby's stomach is larger than another's. Such a baby can take more food at less frequent intervals. The physician knows that some babies have more sensitive digestive systems than others and governs the introductory time for solid foods accordingly. He also knows when sufficient teeth are present for efficient chewing and is thus guided in starting the "chopped" and coarser textured foods.
