## A. G. Hobbs Found Dead

Funeral services for Addron G. Hobbs, 52, of Sterling City, who was employed at the John Reed ranch eight miles northwest of Sterling City and who was found dead on the ranch about 8:30 o'clock Friday morning, were held at 4 o'clock Saturday afternoon from Johnson Chapel, with the Bro. R. H. Stanley and Bro. Williams officiating. Interment was in Belvedere Cemetery.

Hobbs body was found by Perry Matthews, Sterling City, about 300 yards from the rodeo pens on the Reed ranch. Matthews was to get delivery on a horse at the Reed ranch, having purchased the horse from Martin Reed, Sterling City.

An inquest conducted by A. W. Dearen, justice of the peace, Sheriff Vern Davis, Dr. W. J. Swann, and Hinton Emery, deputy sheriff, revealed Hobbs died accidentally. His neck had been broken.

Matthews had passed the pens about 15 minutes before he found Hobbs' body, he told the investigators. At that time he said he saw Hobbs opening a gate with three horses nearby. When Matthews returned to the rodeo pens, he did not see Hobbs or the horses. Climbing atop his pickup, he said, he saw the horses about 300 yards from the pens and drove down there where he found Hobbs' body. One of the horses was saddled and a rope was around the neck of another horse.

Hobbs who had worked at the ranch for eight years and who was a World War I veteran, had several survivors including: the widow: two sons, David and George, both of Sterling City; the mother, Mrs. Ida Hobbs, San Angelo; six sisters, Mrs. Gladys Chaney, Mrs. Ollie Brock, Mrs. Lillie McCleery, and Mrs. Addie King, all of San Angelo, Mrs. Ruby Corkish, Bisbee, Ariz. and Mrs. Edna Cockburn, Holiday, and two brothers, Raymond and Eldridge, both of San Angelo.

Mrs. Billy Davis, daughter of Mrs. Roy Martin, arrived here from Denver last week-end. Her husband with the Army stationed at Denver, brought her here and flew back to Denver Sunday.

## Willard Cole Killed in Racing Accident Sunday

Willard Eugene Cole, son of Mrs. Martin Brown of Sterling and Eugene Cole of Tulsa, Okla. was killed last Sunday afternoon at the racing speedway near San Angelo as he participated in a motorcycle race.

The accident occurred about 2:30 p. m. Sunday in the first race before a large crowd. Cole failed to negotiate a curve and took a spill. He was getting to his feet when the motorcycle driven by Ed Casanova, 20, of San Antonio crashed into him, knocking him to the ground. He died about two hours later in the Shannon hospital with head and internal injuries.

Funeral services were held at 3:00 p. m. Tuesday evening at the First Baptist Church here with Rev. W. J. McCawley officiating. Burial was in the Sterling City Cemetery.

Pallbearers were Alvin Miller, Jesse York, Fallis Carson, Mason Chapman, A. K. Wallace and Bill Rudolph.

Survivors include the mother and father, and two brothers, Alvie and Billy, both of Sterling City.

Cole served with the U. S. Marines in the Pacific area all through the war.

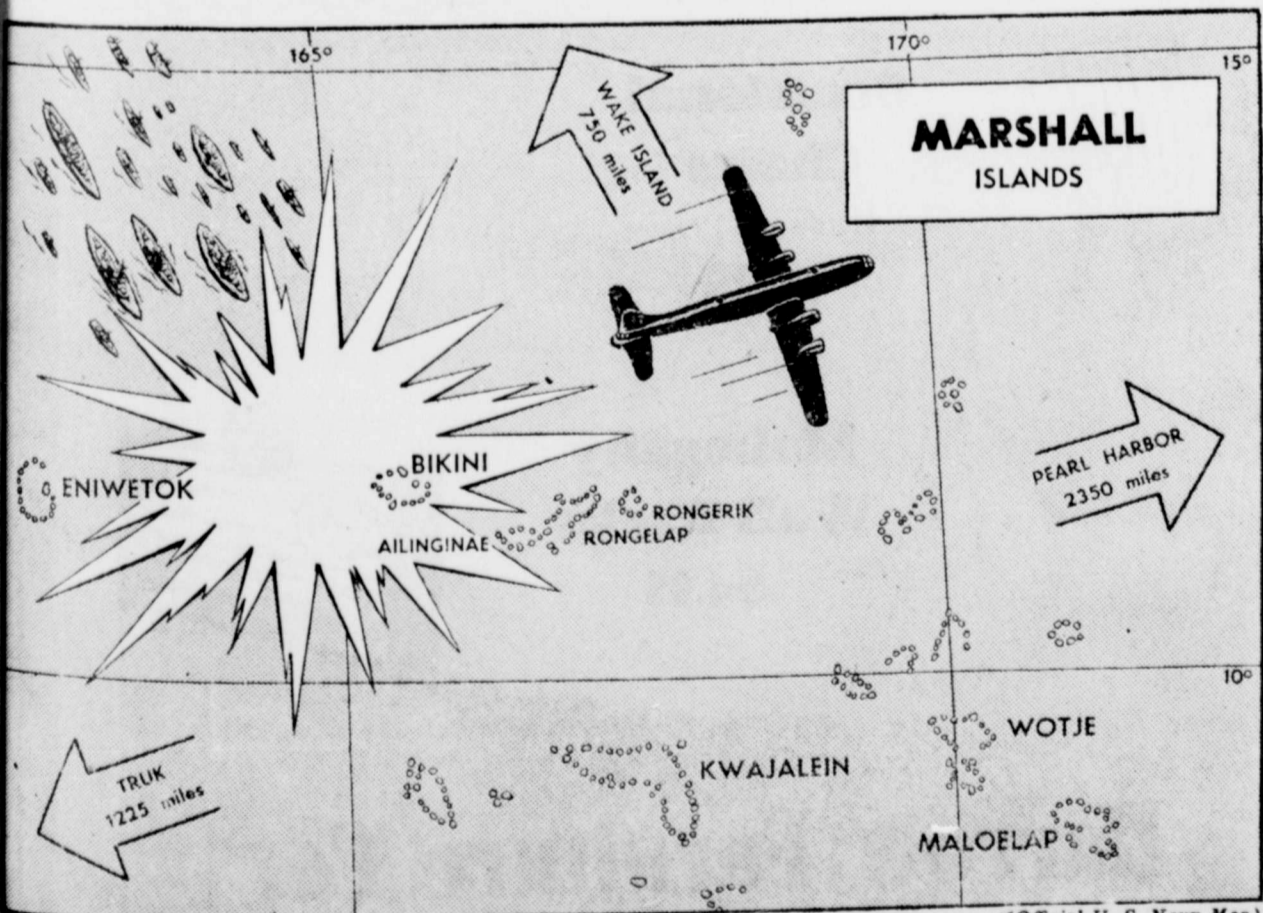

**FAMOUS U. S. ARMY DIVISIONS**

**9th INFANTRY DIVISION**



SOMETIMES REFERRED to as "Hitler's Nemesis" during the recent fighting in Europe, the 9th Infantry Division was assigned occupation duties in Ingolstadt, Germany at the end of World War II. The cessation of hostilities found the 9th with one of the most brilliant campaign records of the fighting infantry divisions in the ETO, with battle credits for Tunisia, Sicily, Normandy, Northern France, Rhineland, Ardennes, and Central Europe.

A Regular Army division, the Ninth was first activated in 1918, inactivated after the first world conflict, reactivated in 1940 at Fort Bragg under the command of General (then Major General) Jacob L. Devers. At this time, the component elements became the 39th, 47th, and 60th Infantry Regiments; the 34th (M), 26th, 60th and 84th (L) Field Artillery Battalions.

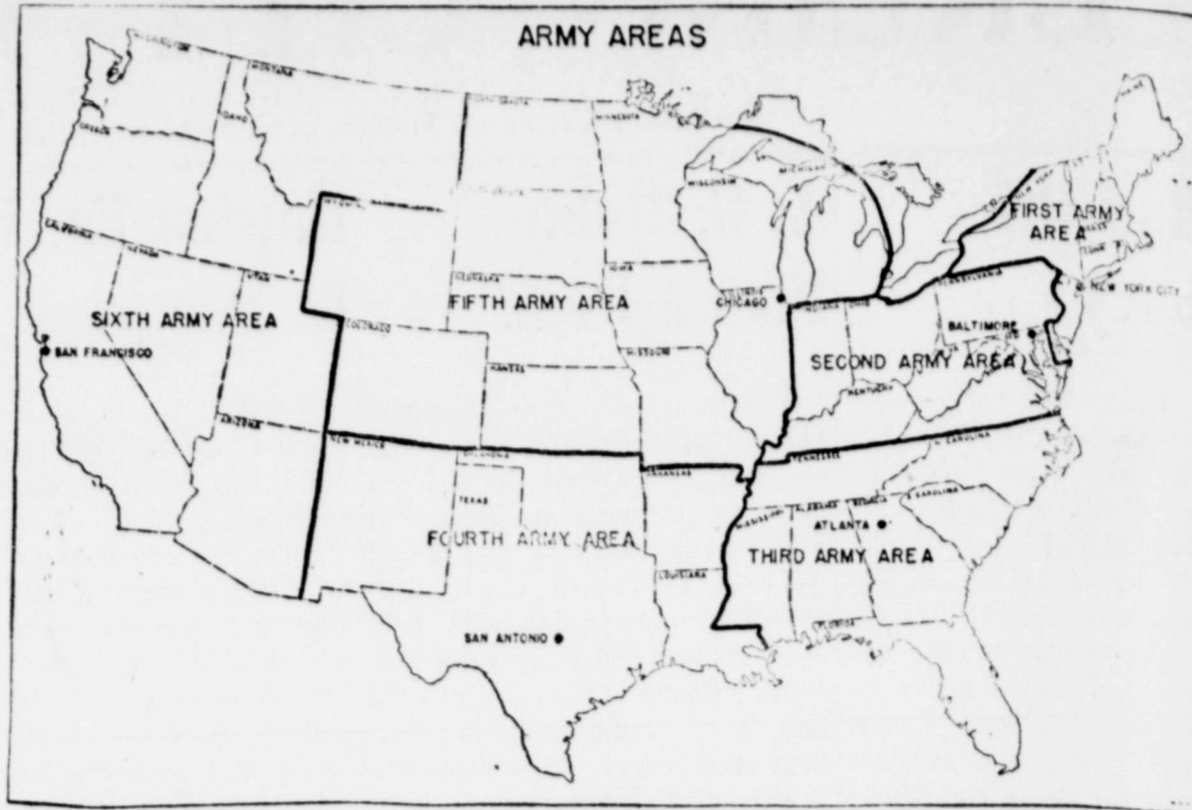
The division went into action November 8, 1942, when its units landed at Algiers, Safi, French Morocco, and at Port Lyautey, Morocco. When hostilities ceased in that area, the 9th was given the job of guarding the Spanish Moroccan border, but it moved into action in Tunisia again in March, 1943. On May 7, it drove toward Bizerte, entering the city to mop up final resistance in Tunisia. Its next combat assignment was in Sicily when, on August 9, it went into action and by August 12 had occupied Randazzo, keypoint of the enemy's last defense before Messina and the final surrender of that area. The division was transferred to the United Kingdom in November of the same year and immediately began preparations for the invasion of the continent.

It landed in Normandy on June 10, 1944, drove hard for the east coast, crossing the Douve River and cutting off the Cotentin Peninsula. With this job done, the division turned north toward Cherbourg liberating the Cap de la Hague by July 1. Later that month it spearheaded the St. Lo breakthrough and joined in the chase which closed the Falaise Gap. On September 2, 1944, the division became the first Allied force to begin the liberation of Belgium, entering the country near Momignies. By September 5 it had crossed the Meuse, and by September 13, it was in Germany south of Roetgen. During the German winter offensive, it relieved the 99th Infantry Division in the Monschau Forest area, and in March, the division became one of the first two units fighting in the Remagen bridgehead area. The closing days of the war found the 9th concentrating on the Ruhr pocket.

Preliminary figures show the Ninth to be fourth among all divisions in the number of casualties—22,185. In commending the 9th Division, General Bradley remarked: "The American Army is studded with splendid divisions, but rarely have two (1st and 9th Inf. Div.) teamed so expertly; never have two divisions fought longer and harder with greater skill or courage."

The patch consists of an octofoil—a design of eight petals—on a khaki background. The upper part of the octofoil is in red, the lower part in blue and there is a white disc in the center.

**ARMY STREAMLINES ORGANIZATION**

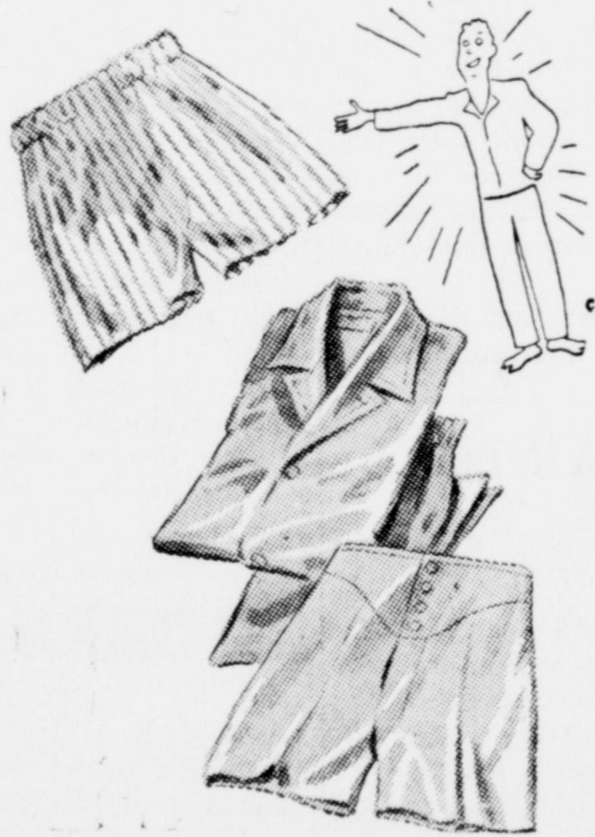

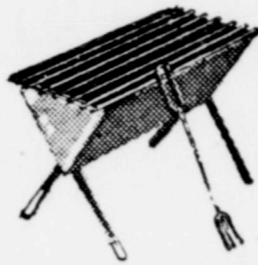

### REPORT ON USE OF D D T For Hornfly Control

ON JOE MIMS' RANCH

About May 5, 1946 Joe Mims sprayed approximately 74 head 2 yr. heifers and 45 head calves with wettable DDT powder in a water suspension. Joe used somewhat stronger suspension than the recommended strength of two tenths of one per cent. In fact, he used a strength of over two and one half per cent in this wettable powder form. Joe wanted to see if the use of DDT in this wettable powder form for the control hornfly would help control the screw worm fly also, if used at a greater strength than the strength recommended for hornfly and lice control.

At this time 30 head of the calves were marked and all of them were given a good wetting with this water suspension of DDT. The cows and the calves were run in two different pastures, each pasture 2-sections in size. There was not a single case of screw worms from the marking or castrating of the calves. Since, there has been only four cases of worms in the entire lot from any cause. Several head of the cattle had bad cases of cattle lice. All of the lice were killed, as well as all of the hornflies; and no hornflies came back for nearly a month duration. Then very few hornflies appeared.

Check lots of cattle were run in separate pastures. The cattle on these check pastures, which were

not sprayed with DDT were all covered with hornflies in very great numbers.

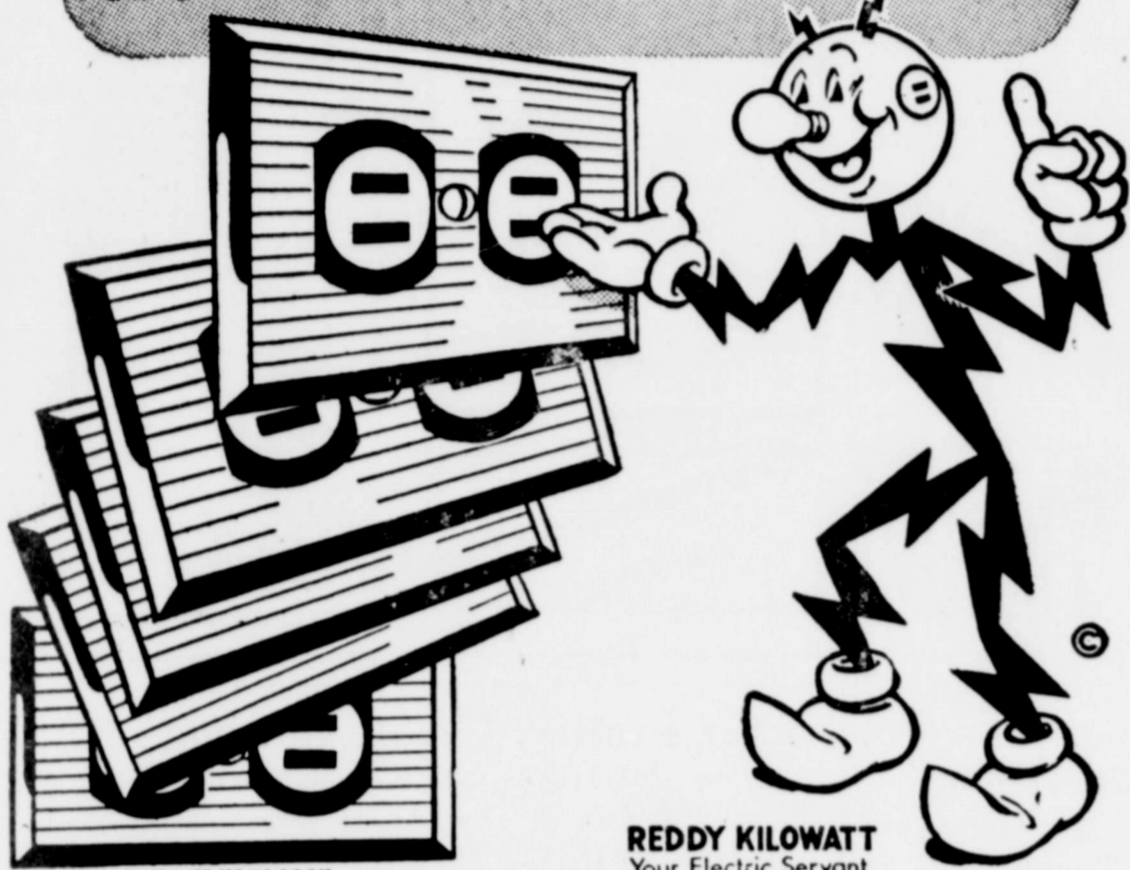

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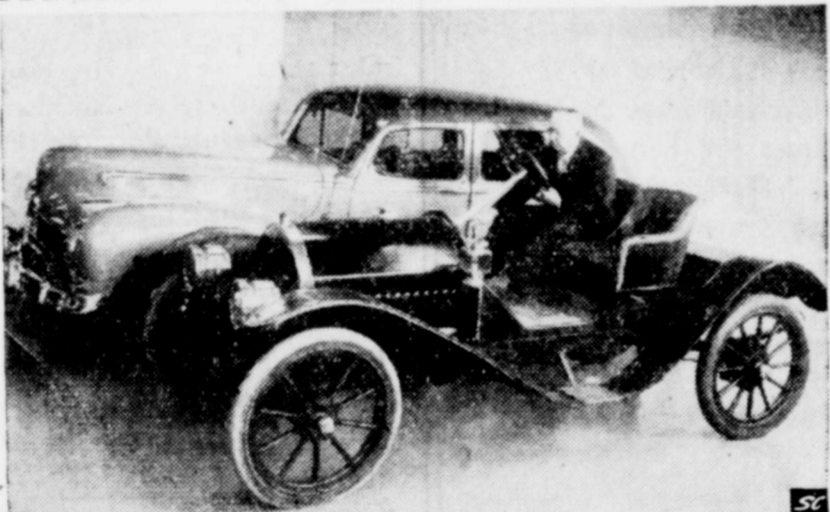

Today, with the government urging us to save precious wheat for shipment to the starving European nations, we are learning of many new kinds of bread—all of which require less flour—or use a wheat-substitute. I enjoy baking a loaf of my own bread once in a while—and the other day in support of UNRRA's plea to use wheat-substitutes, I baked a loaf made of oatmeal. It was delicious, and my family enjoyed it a great deal!

And to keep my home-made bread fresh and tasty—I followed the example of my baker. I wrapped my loaf in several layers of waxed paper folding it tightly at the corners, and tied it with a string. It's really amazing how much fresher bread will stay if wrapped carefully. And by taking this precaution to protect the freshness of bread—and all other foods—we can save money for ourselves—and release food for the millions of people who are actually starving in Europe!



Clove garlic  
Lemon juice

Press cut clove of garlic into the salt to flavor it. Mix the salt with tomato soup. Add one sprig of fresh tarragon, if available, and any other preferred seasonings. Thin mixture to desired consistency for dressing with lemon juice—about 1/2 cup.

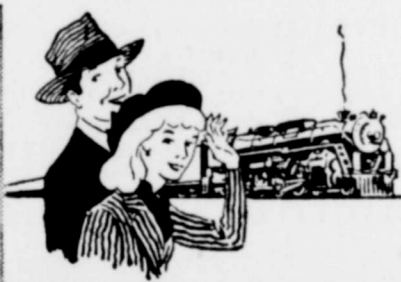
