STERLING VOTES THE DEMO TICKET; FOR AMENDMENTS

Sterling County voted the Democratic ticket, and voted for all three of the amendments here on Tuesday at the general election.

Jester got 134 votes to Nolte's 5. Connally received 133 votes with Sells getting 7. The John Tarleton building payment amendment carried 103 to 18; the good roads amendment carried 102 to 21; and the state employees retirement amendment carried 77 to 50.

EAGLES GO DOWN BEFORE WILDCATS 22 TO 0

Water Valley's big backs proved too much power for Sterling City Friday night as they continued unbeaten thus far in the season, and with the defeat laid on Sterling it would appear that their last obstacle had been removed. Fielding a veteran team of Seniors featuring Gene Cope, Oscar Dorsey and Dick Miers, the Wildcats appear to be the class of the loop. However, might-have-beens keep creeping up which say things could have been different had Sterling connected on its first surge down the field. Brown sneaked out behind the last Water Valley defender by twenty yards, but the ball sailed a mile over his head. On at least four occasions the Eagles let scoring opportunities slip from them. Water Valley scored in the first quarter on a pass play from Banister to Miers, and Cope added 2 points with his toe. They scored again in the second quarter on a pass from Cope to Dorsey, but this time the try for the extra point was missed. The half ended 14-0 in favor of Water Valley. The last score came in the fourth quarter after the referee ruled pass interference and set the ball deep in Sterling territory. Miers lugged it across and Cope added two more points to end the night's scoring. The Sterling coaches feel that their boys played a superior ball club and did not deserve to win, but could have been victorious had they connected in the clutch. Otherwise, the Eagles played a great defensive game as no one else has been able to hold Water Valley to less than 32 points.

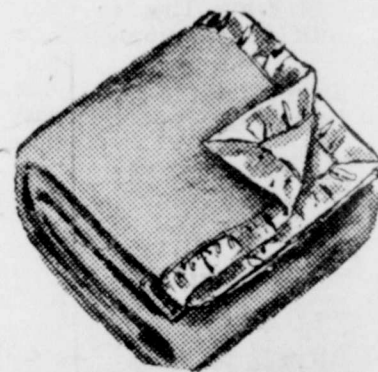

Grass Tests On Mims Ranch

An area of buffalo grass, which was clipped May 21, 1946, located on a plot excluded from grazing on Jack Mims ranch showed practically no further growth during the year. As a result of the exposure to the hot sun and extreme drought conditions this summer, less than fifty per cent of the grass plants on this area survived. All grazing has been excluded from the area on which the clipping was made since 1943. The yield of the clipping on May 21 shows a per acreage production of over one and one half tons of buffalo grass, including current spring growth and old grass. Without the protective cover afforded by top growth, more

than fifty per cent of these vigorous buffalo plants died.

Since root growth is directly proportional to top growth, continued grazing, which has the same effect on grass plants as close clipping, brings the roots close to the surface of the ground, where they exposed to high surface temperatures and have to compete with such climatic factors as sun and wind for moisture, a primary essential to survival and growth of plants. Surface temperature of 130 degrees on bare areas not uncommon during hot summer days. During continued drought only those plants with deeply established root systems that do not depend solely upon surface moisture can survive.

More growth on the ground means lower surface temperature, increased moisture penetration, less evaporation, less run-off, less

soil erosion and increased production.

What are the prospects of your getting a new firepot to replace the one in your furnace if it should burn out? Not so good, according to all reports from furnace manufacturers, at least for the present heating season.

The demand for new furnaces is so much greater than present production can possibly handle that all manufacturers are concentrating all of their efforts on the making of furnace units, unable to give over any of their production to the making of spare parts.

Confronted with this situation, it behooves every furnace user to treat it carefully. It might even be that the maker of your furnace is not now in the business of furnace manufacturing, so that repair parts are non-existent. Call in a competent heating man for inspection of your furnace and follow his advice as to the care of it.

If your furnace is in need of cleaning, have that done. If it needs a general overhauling, then look before you leap. Once the furnace is taken down it may be discovered that the parts are in such bad shape that they cannot with safety be put back together again. No replacement parts being available, your only alternative is to buy a new furnace, and for that you may have to wait some time for delivery. The only safe course is to make sure that the heating dealer has a new furnace in stock that he can sell you in case the old furnace proves to be beyond repair. Under existing circumstances it is more imperative than ever that when you do call somebody in to service your furnace, that he be absolutely reliable and trustworthy, fully able to do what is right and necessary to your best interests.

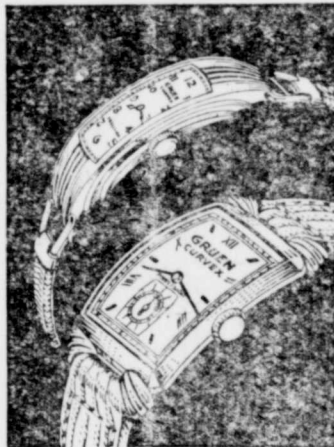

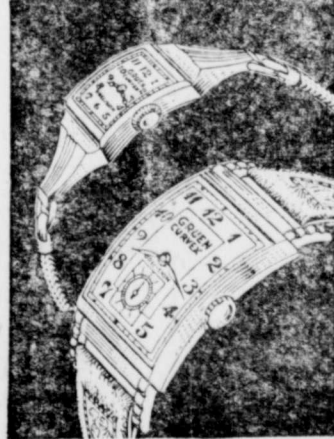

Crown Fruit Salad Is 'Fit for a King'

"Fit for a king" is what home makers say about crown shaped fruit salad, according to the Country Cooking editor of Capper's Farmer, nationally-circulated farm magazine.

"Studded with jewel-colored pieces of fruit, it makes a lovely picture on your prettiest glass plate," she writes in the magazine read by 1,250,000 farm families. "Cool and tartly sweet it offers flavor contrast to the meat-and-potato



part of a meal. It's a delightful afternoon snack with a cup of hot coffee."

Crown Fruit Salad
1 tbs. unflavored gelatin 1/2 c. light cream
2 tbs. cold water 1/2 c. mayonnaise
1 c. fruit juice 2 canned peaches or pears, sliced
(peach, cherry, orange or pineapple) 1 orange, sliced
Lettuce 1/2 c. maraschino cherries

Soak gelatin in cold water. Heat fruit juice or juices to boiling; remove from heat and dissolve gelatin in hot juice. Cool. Add the light cream and mayonnaise and stir until mixture is smooth. Cool until mixture is slightly thickened; then add sliced fruit and halved cherries. Pour into a mold rinsed in cold water. Chill until firm. Unmold on glass plate or platter. Arrange lettuce leaves around the edge of the salad. Garnish with clusters of grapes, halves of bananas or slices of canned fruit. Serves six. This molded fruit salad is lovely to serve at a buffet supper.

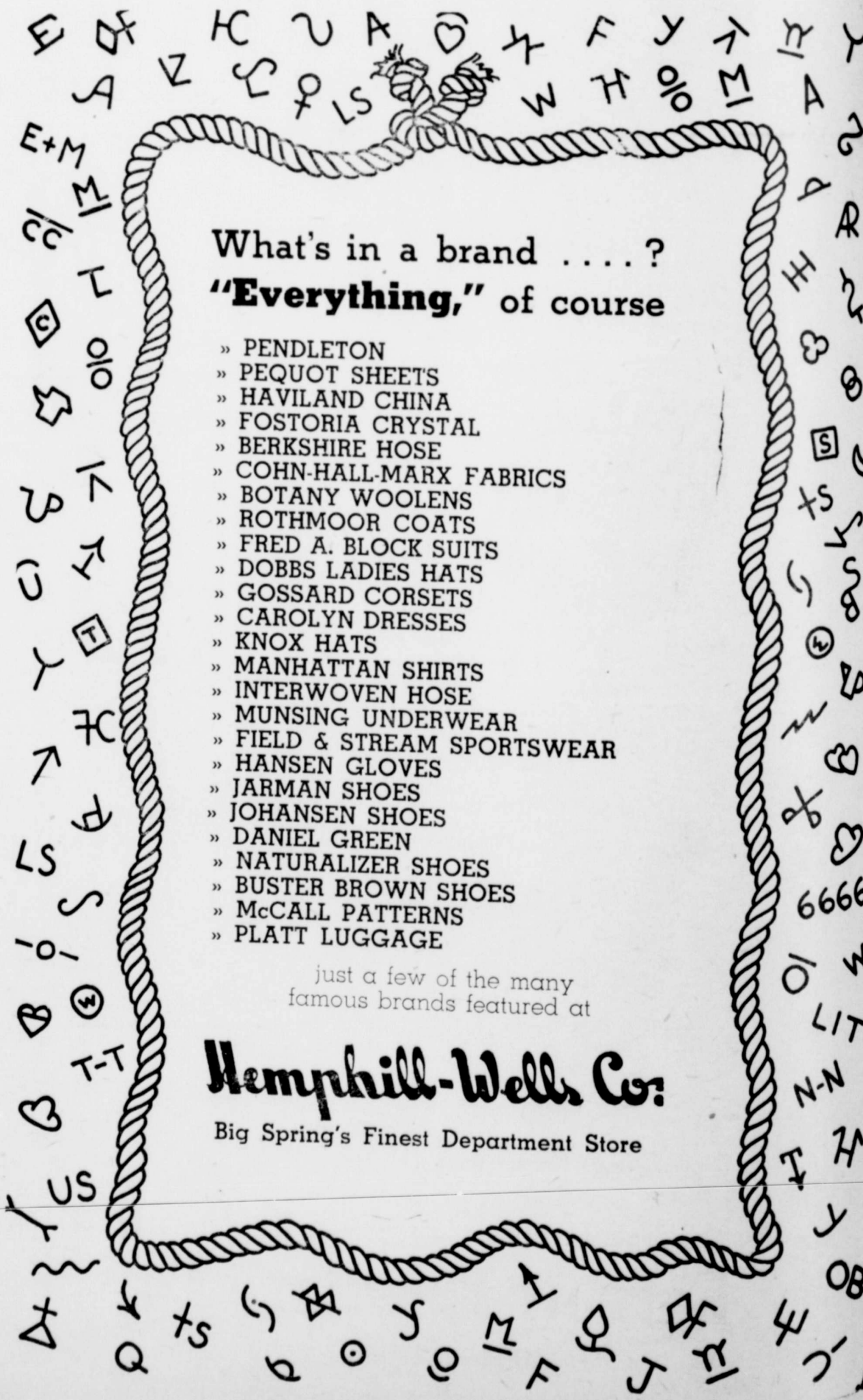

Cattle Grub Treatment

CATTLE GRUB TREATMENT, COLLEGE STATION, Nov. 8.—Although heel flies, the parents of the cattle grub, do most of their damage in the spring, the first treatment against grubs should be given in the early fall, say entomologists of the Texas A. and M.

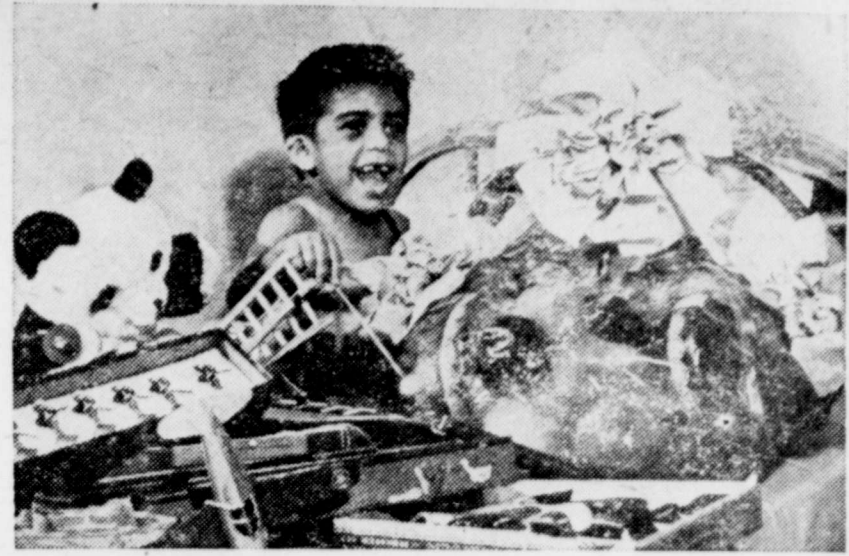
College Extension Service. Loss of weight is the greatest damage that heel flies do the beef cattle. They lose weight by running from the pests or by refusing to feed and standing in water to protect themselves from the flies. The grubs spend seven to eight months tunneling around in an animal's body. From 10 to 15 percent more feed is required to fatten a grubby steer than a healthy animal, and two pounds of choice meat are lost each time a grub infested steer is slaughtered. Grubs

also ruin hides which are valuable for shoe leather and other purposes. Most farmers and ranchmen produce their own heel flies, because the flies do not fly over a half mile, the Extension Service entomologists say. Therefore, a thorough treatment should rid a farm or ranch of the parasites. In the early fall, when the cattle grubs are mature and ready to fall to the ground, the first treatment should be given. Rotenone is the most effective insecticide against the cattle grub, and it can be applied either as a dust for small herds, as a spray for larve herds. An effective treatment, say entomologists, consists of spraying the backs of the cattle with a mixture of seven and a half pounds of five percent rotenone for each 100 gallons of water. J. M. Starr, county agricultural agent, Sterling County, says that local dealers have this five percent rotenon for the control of the cattle grub.
