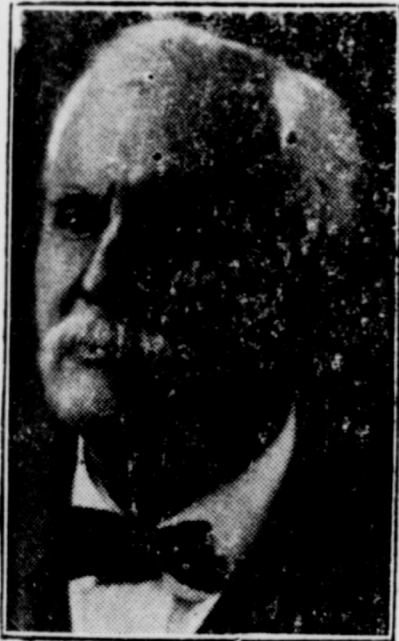

## NORTH CONCHO RIVER SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT

Litter on range land is an important factor for providing seed bed conditions necessary for germination and growth of the more desirable grasses. A recent clipping of tobosa grass on W. N and L. R. Reed's ranch showed four tons of tobosa grass clipped one inch above the ground and four tons of litter per acre. With this accumulation of dead grass leaves and stems, soil condition and moisture relationships are favorable for the establishment of side oats grama and other highly palatable plants. This soil condition also promotes the growth of winter weeds.

Robert Foster noted the increased vigor and size of the winter weeds on his bomb target area this fall. T. H. Humble stated that the weeds on his 736 acre pasture showed quick vigorous growth following the rain this pasture received in the fall. Mr. Humble has made detail study of the range condition of this pasture since January 1944. Deferment and lighter use of range land have been the major factors in improving the soil condition on these areas which in turn is responsible for more vigorous vegetative growth.

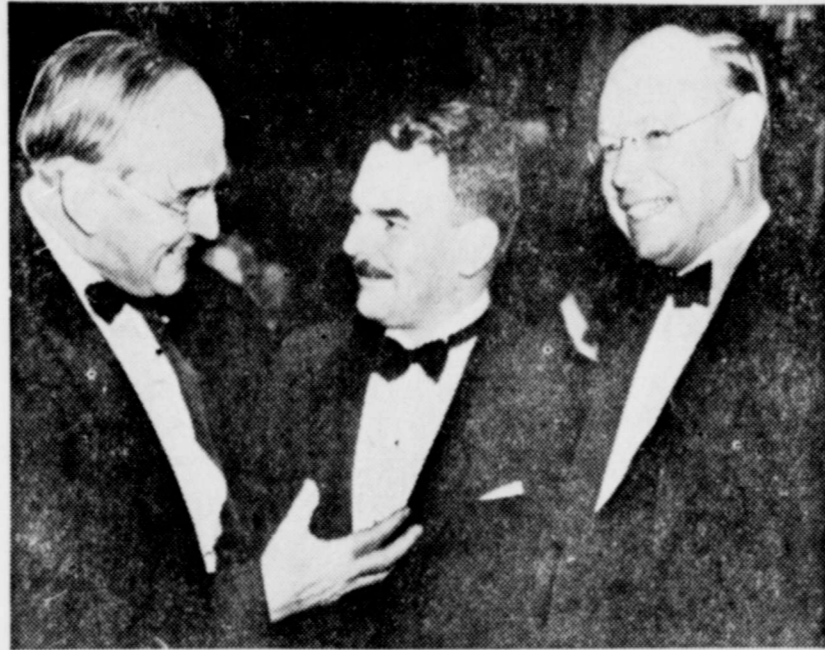

## SWING OF SOUTHWEST FARM MARKETS

Southwest markets saw improved holiday demand up the prices of livestock, eggs, cotton and sweet potatoes to offset the lower tendency taken by most grains, turkeys and some vegetables last week, USDA's Production and Marketing Administration reports.

Thanksgiving found plenty of turkeys at southwest markets but demand slow and prices weak. Young toms brought mostly 23 to 25 cents per pound and young hens 34 to 37 cents. Demand for chickens was brisk. Heavy hens held steady at 22 to 25 cents per pound and fryers at 37 to 40 cents.

Egg prices strengthened as fresh supplies were too small to meet the increased holiday demand last week. Current receipts ranged from 45 to 50 cents per dozen, depending on market locale.

Light cattle receipts accounted for the active trading at most southwest markets last week. Prices were steady to stronger under the pressure of increased demand. Small offerings of medium and good slaughter steers brought \$17.50 to \$21.00 per hundred at Wichita and \$18.75 to \$24.50 at Denver. Medium and good steers and yearlings ranged from \$15 to \$18.50 at Oklahoma City. Good slaughter steers and yearlings realized \$20 to \$25 at Fort Worth while cutter and common lightweight yearlings and steers brought \$9.50 to \$11 at San Antonio. Houston sold common and medium steers and yearlings \$11 to \$15.

Keen competition for small hog receipts carried prices higher at most markets last week. Top price for good and choice butchers was \$25 to \$25.25 per hundred pounds at Fort Worth, Oklahoma City and Denver, \$25.75 at Wichita, and \$25 at San Antonio.

Sheep and lamb prices were steady to strong at most southwest markets last week. Medium and good lambs with No. 1 and 2 pelts brought \$17 to \$17.75 per hundred pounds at San Antonio. Medium and good fat lambs realized \$17.50 to \$21 at Fort Worth and \$20.25 to \$22.25 at Wichita. Good and choice slaughter lambs sold at \$23.50 to \$24 at Denver and \$22.50 at Oklahoma City. Domestic wools remained quiet. Buyers showed little interest in offerings.

Farmers stock peanuts sold mostly at the CCC support level last week and rice moved quickly under urgent demand at maximum GPA ceilings.

Grain markets were unsettled at the week's close due to the uncertainty of the effect the coal strike will have on transportation and industry. Wheat held about steady, sorghums lost sharply and oats, barley and corn slipped some after the holiday.

Spot cotton prices advanced about \$5 per bale last week as demand from all sources improved. Southwest offerings though small, were larger than the week before, and insufficient to meet the demand.

Bad weather hindered movement of Texas vegetables and citrus last week. Good demand for peppers held prices firm, but dull demand for tomatoes caused prices to weaken. Moderate onion and potato offerings from Colorado shipping points moved slowly at steady to lower prices. Sweet potatoes remained strong at both shipping points and consumer markets.

## Plan Wiring System For Adequacy With Future Requirements in Mind

Planning a farm wiring system which will meet requirements necessary for the efficient and economical operation of electrical production equipment today—and tomorrow—should not be difficult provided certain basic principles are followed.

According to the recently issued Handbook of Farmstead Wiring Design, a properly wired farmstead

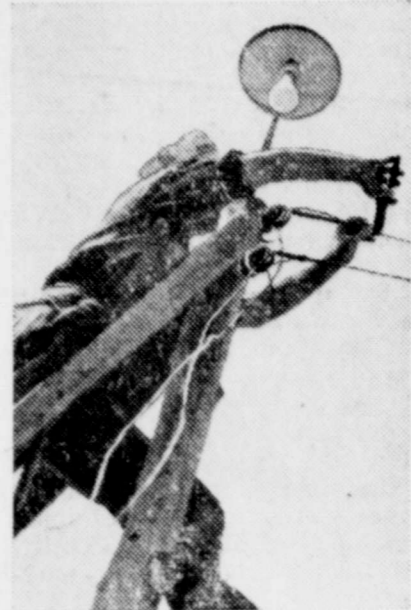
unforeseen electrical needs, and (3) be safe.

The first two requirements depend on careful planning, with a view to future as well as present needs. The wiring system should be installed by a person familiar with electric power and light problems on farms and qualified to do a first-rate wiring job. The third requirement will be satisfied if the wiring system is installed in compliance with the National Electrical Code.

Designing a farmstead wiring system with an eye on future electrical requirements is highly important. It is more economical to install wiring for maximum needs at the outset than to spend additional money for re-wiring when more equipment is added, and larger wires and more outlets are required. Because an electrified farm depends so much on electric power to operate motors and appliances, as well as lights, it is vital that wires be large enough to deliver the necessary amount of current.

Electricity, traveling along wires, can be likened to a load of hay being driven along a hedge-lined lane. The bigger the load and the narrower the lane, the more hay is lost along the hedge rows. So it is with electricity. Wires, which are too small to carry the amount of electricity required, will prevent sufficient power from reaching the electrical equipment, thus reducing its efficiency by as much as 25 percent and more. It is also wise economy to plan for plenty of outlets for lights and "plug-in" appliances and equipment.

Fifteen ampere circuits are needed for lights, 20 ampere circuits for appliances. Special circuits should be provided for motors over 1/3 horsepower and the protection for these circuits should be based on the electric load served.

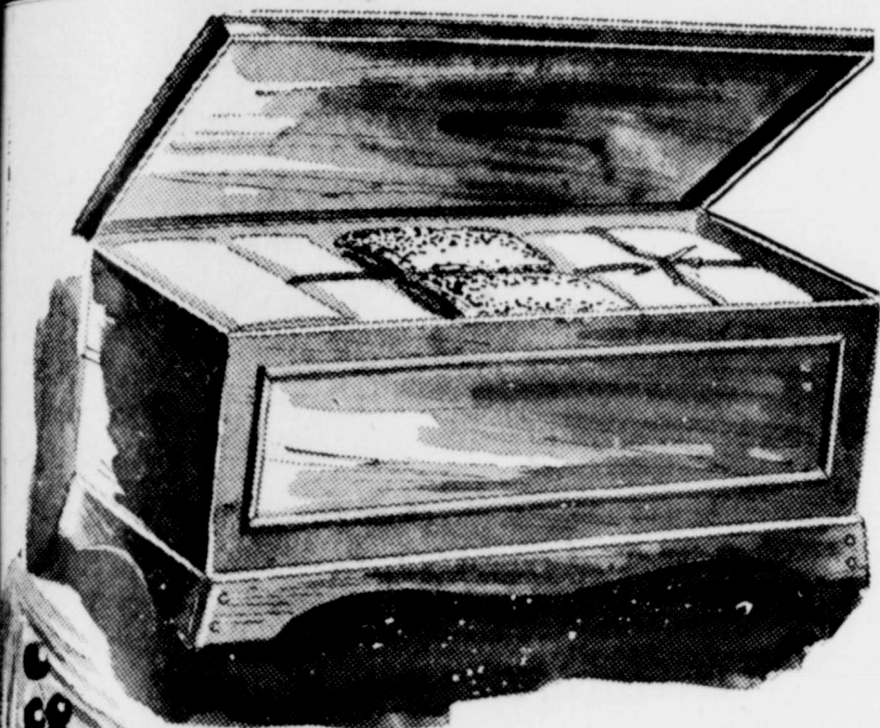

Cross two strips of bacon. Lay on one slice of pineapple. Shape the mashed sweet potato into 4 patties and the ground ham into 4 patties. Top each pineapple slice with a sweet potato patty and a ham patty. Fold over ends of bacon on top of each stack and fasten ends together with a toothpick. Place in baking dish. Bake in 350° F. oven for one hour. Serve while hot.

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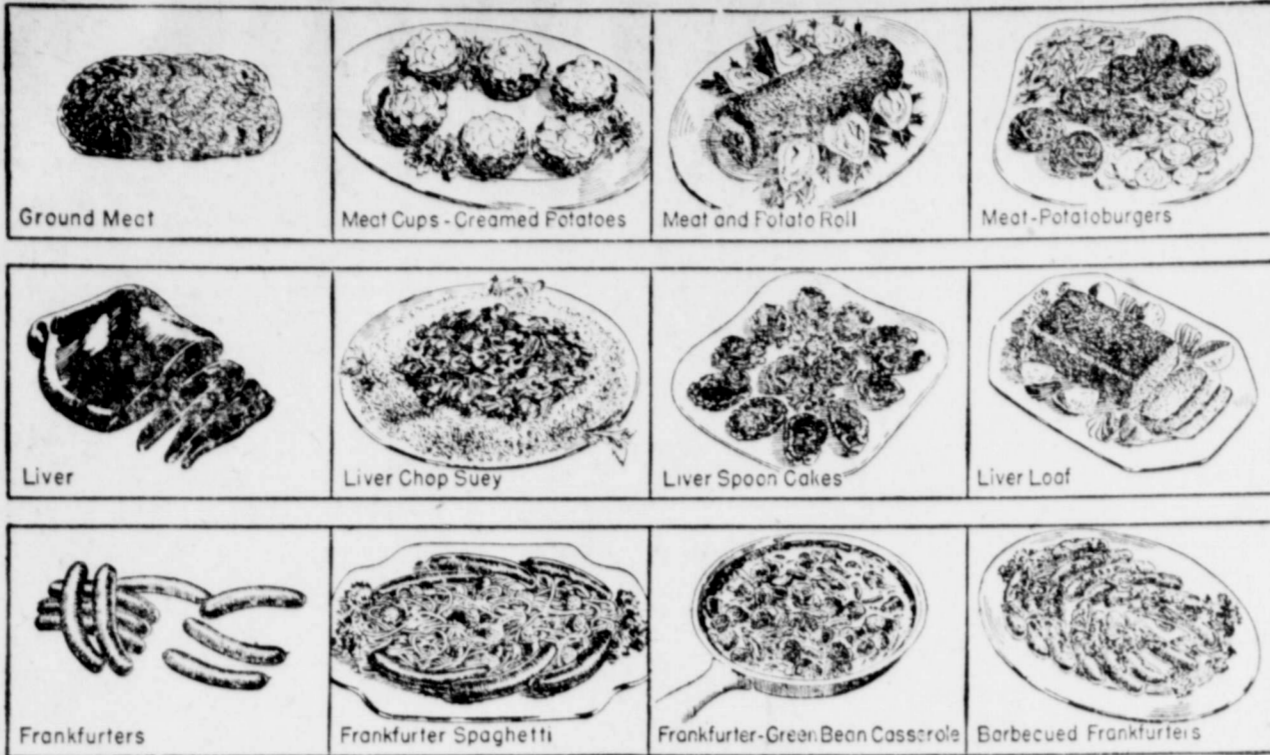

**BUDGET HELPERS FOR THE HOUSEWIFE**



Although more meat is available today, Mrs. Housewife can continue to make good use of the meats she relied on during the period of scarcity. There are a number of these which offer many opportunities for variety and at the same time are easy on the budget.

The meats pictured above are excellent examples. Most housewives include them in their family meals, but more often than not the ways in which they are served are very limited.

As a matter of fact there are almost endless possibilities for using these meats in preparing dishes that are different. A few suggestions are given here.

**Meat Cups — Creamed Potatoes**

Combine 1 pound ground beef, 1/4 cup dry bread crumbs, 1/2 cup milk, 1 teaspoon salt and 1/8 teaspoon pepper. Line ungreased muffin pans with meat mixture to a thickness of 1/4-inch. Fill with creamed potatoes and bake in a slow oven 45 minutes.

**Meat and Potato Roll**

Combine 1 1/2 pounds ground meat, 1/2 cup cracker crumbs, 1 egg, 3/4 cup milk and 1/8 teaspoon pepper. Spread on waxed paper to 1/2-inch thickness, making a rectangle about 6 x 10 inches. Spread with 2 cups mashed potatoes (use sweet potatoes if meat is pork). Roll like a jelly roll. Place in roasting pan and bake 1 1/2 hours in a moderate oven.

**Meat-Potatoburgers**

Combine 1 pound hamburger, 2 cups coarsely grated unpeeled potato, 1/4 cup grated onion, 1 1/2 teaspoons salt and 1/4 teaspoon pepper. Mix well. Shape into 8 patties and broil or panbroil slowly until done.

**Liver Chop Suey**

Cut 1 pound liver in 1" x 3/4" strips. Cook in 4 tablespoons lard or drippings 5 minutes. Add 1 cup sliced celery, 1 cup sliced onions. Cook 5 minutes. Add 1 can Chinese vegetables and liquid and 4 teaspoons soy sauce. Simmer until meat is thoroughly cooked, about 1/2 hour. Season, thicken. Serve over hot rice.

**Liver Spoon Cakes**

Cook 1 pound sliced liver in 1 tablespoon drippings in frying-pan about 5 minutes. Grind liver; add 1 teaspoon salt, 1/4 teaspoon pepper, and 2 eggs, well beaten. Mix well. Drop by tablespoonfuls into hot shallow lard or drippings. Brown well on both sides.

**Liver Loaf**

Cook 1 1/2 pounds sliced liver in 2 tablespoons drippings 5 minutes. Grind liver. Combine with 1 cup bread crumbs, 1/4 cup milk, juice of 1/2 lemon, 2 tablespoons tomato catsup, 1/2 cup pork sausage, 1/2 teaspoon paprika, 1 small onion, finely chopped, 1 egg, beaten, 1 teaspoon salt, and 1/4 teaspoon pepper. Mix well. Turn into a loaf pan lined with bacon. Place bacon strips on top. Bake in moderate oven, 1 hour.

**Frankfurter Spaghetti**

Slice 1 pound frankfurters in 1/2-inch pieces. Brown frankfurters and 1/3 cup diced onion in 1 tablespoon lard or drippings. Add 1 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon allspice, 1/2 teaspoon cloves, 1/4 teaspoon pepper, 1 1/2 cups tomato juice and 3 cups cooked spaghetti. Simmer until thickened. Brown 1/2 pound whole frankfurters. Serve around spaghetti.

**Frankfurter — Green Bean Casserole**

Slice 1 pound frankfurters, 1/2-inch thick. Brown in 3 tablespoons drippings. Stir 5 tablespoons flour into drippings, add 2 cups milk and 1 teaspoon salt. Cook until thickened. Add 1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce, 1/4 cup grated cheese and 2 cups green beans. Combine with frankfurters. Bake in moderate oven 40 minutes.

**Barbecued Frankfurters**

Arrange 1 1/2 pounds frankfurters in shallow pan. Pour Barbecue Sauce over them. Bake uncovered for 30 minutes in a moderate oven. To make Barbecue Sauce: Brown 1 medium onion, chopped, in 2 tablespoons margarine or butter. Add 2 tablespoons vinegar, 2 tablespoons brown sugar, 4 tablespoons lemon juice, 1 cup catsup, 3 tablespoons Worcestershire sauce, 1/2 tablespoon prepared mustard, 1/2 cup water, 1/2 cup chopped celery, salt and red pepper. Simmer 30 minutes.
