Mercury Hits 107°

The mercury in Muleshoe was boiling at 107 degrees in Muleshoe Monday and 107 degrees on Tuesday according to our national weatherman, Jeff Peeler.

Peeler checked his records and these scorching days are the hotest recorded on these dates for the last two years.

With such extreme heat and so many people out working in the sun, there are several things to keep in mind to protect one's health.

Two of the main health problems of summer are dehydration and heat exposure, says Johannes Steenkamp, D.O., acting chairman of Texas College of Osteopathic Medicine's department of public health and preventive medicine.

"All of us are somewhat dehydrated in extremely hot weather," he said. "Our bodies perceive this need for liquids as a need for salt, a false perception. We all ought to drink more during the hot summer months than we think we need to."

Axle Breaks-8ATSF Cars Derail Locally

At approximately 12:30 p.m. last Saturday, a Santa Fe freight train derailed near the old Barrett Produce building on American Blvd.

The two engine, 41 car train was damaged to the extent of eight cars according to Susan Metcalf, director of public relations in Amarillo for Santa Fe. Metcalf stated that the derailment was apparently caused by a broken axle on the first of the eight cars.

Witnesses reported a car windshield was broken by flying debris as the train passed the Muleshoe Livestock Auction Barn. Although there were no injuries, traffic was tied up along the intersections from American Blvd. north for some time while workers attempted to clear the wreckage.

The flat and piggy back trailers were overturned on either side of the tracks littering the sideways with their contents.

One railroad employee was questioned by a Journal reporter as to his feelings when the train derailed. He stated: "It felt like hell; here I was in the front car and all these cars behind me just kept coming at me, stacking up. It was a pretty weird experience."

A Santa Fe clean-up crew was dispatched to Muleshoe from Clovis to assist in clearing the tracks which was completed around 9:30 p.m. Saturday.

Ms. Metcalf reported \$95,000 of damage to equipment and \$10,000 to the track. Workmen replaced railroad ties and the road bed is in "good condition," she said.

"Derailments are just a

fact of life to us," said Ms. Metcalf who stated Santa Fe does everything it can to minimize the possibility of an accident, but accidents do happen. This was an equipment failure. This type of failure is similar to driving a new car out of the shop and getting a flat tire."





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

Researchers are investigating the question, and they're paying special attention to caffeine, says Cass Ryan-Crowe, a foods and nutrition specialist.

Dr. Ryan-Crowe is on the home economics staff of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A & M University System.

"Most researchers agree that coffee containing caffeine should be consumed moderation," specialist notes.

Whether caffeine was the cause of the miscarriages is not known for sure, vet, but researchers do know that caffeine in the coffee goes through the human placenta and enters

the fetus. So, for now, researchers are advising pregnant women to limit their intake of coffee and to be careful about their intake of caffeine overall.

Caffeine also is present in other foods and beverages, including tea, many soft drinks and chocolate. In addition, caffeine is present in headache medications, stay-awake aids, and over-the-counter cold medicines, the specialist





A short overview of the recent airport hearing was also given. Marr stated J.D. Cage had been concerned with milk production of his dairy cows. Marr stated this was a concern because there have been studies which showed both dairy cattle and chicken were affected by aircraft noise.

The Council gave Marr the okay to request a release from the Texas Aeronautics Commission of the golf land. Release of this land, which has never been used as part of the airport, would have a bearing on finances available for the city which could be used for the airport.

That doesn't mean more beer, however. According to Dr. Steenkamp, two beers a day should be considered a maximum. Alcohol of any kind dehydrates the body's liquids instead of replenishing

Guarding against heat exhaustion is usually a matter of common sense. "Limit your exposure to high temperatures and the sun to an hour at a time at first," the TCOM faculty member advised, "or to half of that if your skin if very fair.

'Gradually get used to the heat before doing strenuous exercise in it. The old and the very young have less tolerance to heat and should limit their exposure even more."

Persons using certain drugs such as tetracycline expose themselves to the risk of sunburn and heat exhaustion because the drugs sensitize the skin, Dr. Steenkamp added. Amphetamines and drugs with drying effects alter the temperature-regulating mechanisms of the body. Check with a physician if you think your medication may expose you to greater risk of heat exhaustion.



Local Library Extends Service To Handicapped

Last year, Texans who cannot reat ordinary printed material because of poor vision or other physical handicap, read about 900,000 books and magazines. The 35,000 readers were able to do so because of a cooperative program between the Texas State Library and the Library of Congress that is noting its 50th anniversary this year. Under this program the Library of Congress furnishes recorded and braille materials, and the State Library provides space, staff, and other costs of the program.

"Service to the blind and physically handicapped represents effective cooperation between the State Library, the Library of Congress, the Postal Service that carries the materials at no charge, and publishers and authors who allow the 'publication' of their material in special formats without payment of additional royalties," said Dr. Dorman H. Winfrey, director of the Texas State Library.

Ann Camp, librarian for the Muleshoe Library, points out that the local library not only has these records and cassettes but also large print books.

"We have complete books that are marvelously read," she said, adding that many check out these talking books and play them at home. Still others order books through the Library of Congress catalogs. "We are willing to help the person out in any way we can," the librarian

Ms. Camp named the motivation series, "The Sky's The Limit" as excellent and the Bible records as very popular. "We also have tapes by the 'Old Timers' on the early days in Bailey County that are

real interesting," she said. In the Large Print Book Catalog, the reader is able to find both fiction and nonfiction books as well as recently printed books. The "Reader's Digest" condensed books are also available at the local libra-
