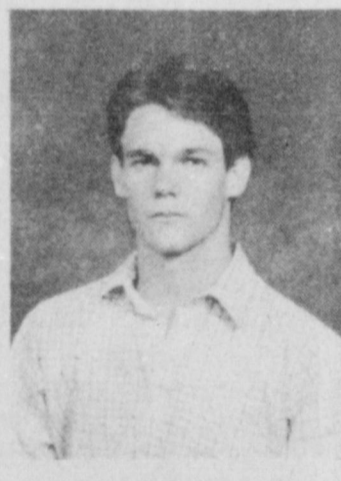

## Farmers Reminded Of Sign-Up Dates

Bailey County Agriculture Stabilization office director, Rusty Williamson has issued a newsletter for all Bailey County farmers.

In reference to destroying crops, Williamson advises: "Remember to file a disaster application before you destroy or make other use of a crop. This must be done if a farmer expects to retain disaster benefits."

Wheat farmers should file a low yield application no later than 15 days after harvest, if there is a possibility of being eligible for low yield assistance.

August 1 is the last day to certify crops after replanting. Williamson said: "we are going to be a little short-handed that week and would appreciate everyone's cooperation in

getting this done before hand."

If any questions come up regarding the 1981 programs, they can be solved by contacting the ASCS office.

The 1981 loan rates have been set and will carry a 14.5 percent interest rate with a variable rate to be reviewed on April 1 and October 1. The loan rates are as follows: Barley - \$1.97 bu.; Corn - \$2.51 bu.; Wheat - \$3.21 bu.; Grain Sorghum - \$4.09 cwt.; Cotton - \$.5246 (national rate).

The ASCS office will be closed July 3 in observance of Independence Day.

**STATEMENT OF INTENT TO CHANGE RATES**  
 General Telephone Company of the Southwest, in accordance with the Rules of the Public Utility Commission of Texas, hereby gives notice of the Company's intent to implement a new schedule of rates in Texas effective October 1, 1981.

On April 28, 1981, the Public Utility Commission of Texas issued its order in Docket 3690, creating a separate Docket 3861 to consider the impact and effect of the accounting changes ordered by the Federal Communications Commission (CC Docket 79-105).

The Federal Communications Commission has changed the method of accounting for inside wiring costs associated with the one-time station connection, move, or change activity. The new rate schedule will increase the Company's gross annual revenue derived from local service by no more than three percent. 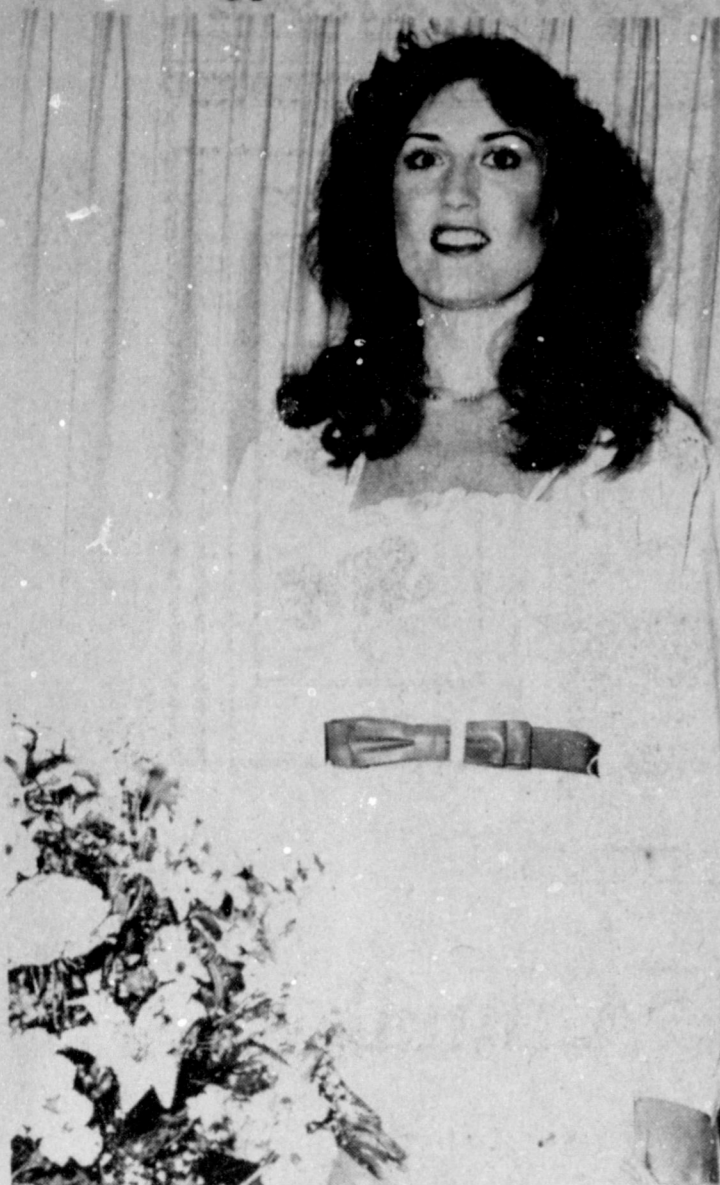

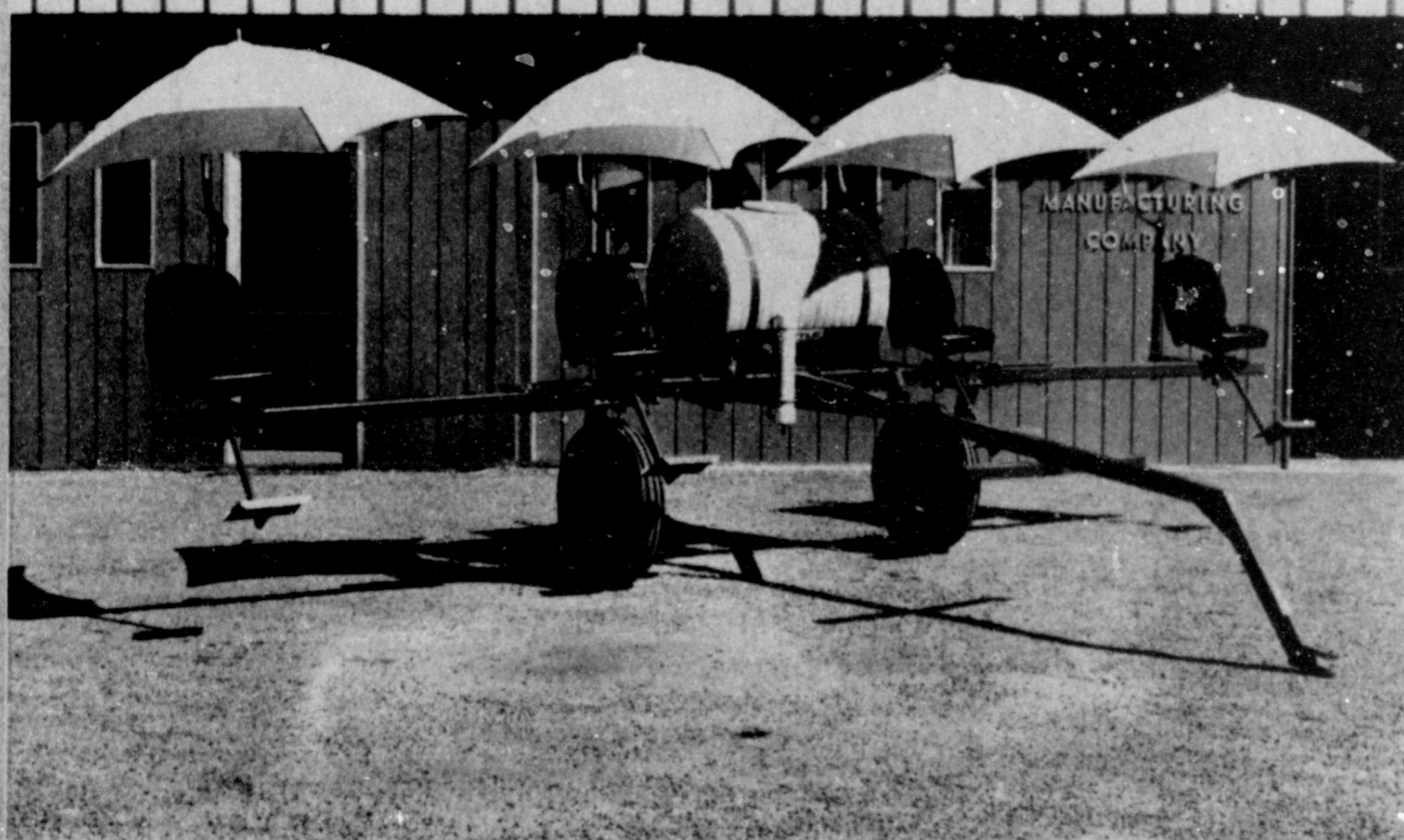

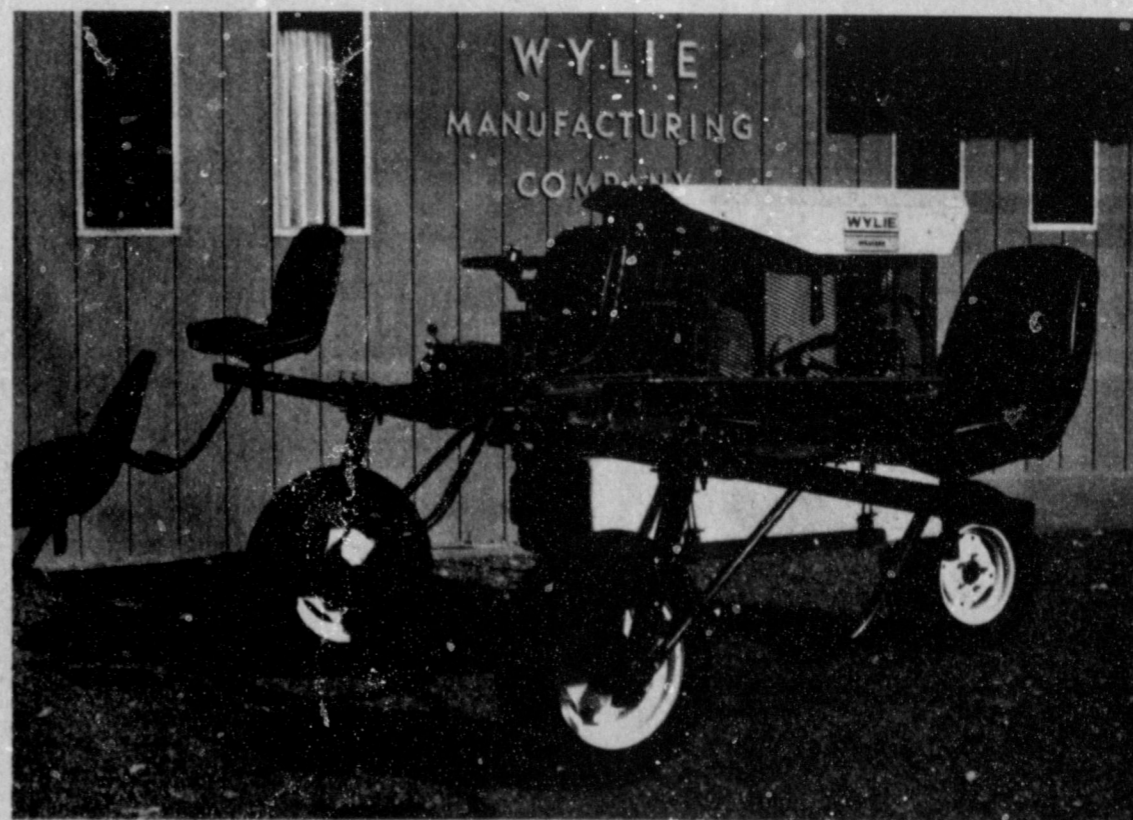

**Astronaut stress**

AUSTIN, Texas (Spl.) — America's Columbia space shuttle succeeded, but as future space flights become more routine and prolonged, more problems in psychological adjustment can be expected, says a University of Texas psychologist.

Dr. Robert Helmreich says stress may arise from the mixture aboard space shuttles of highly trained flight crews and scientists without flight experience.

Also, the reward of world adulation enjoyed by early astronauts will diminish for future space crews—but the high risks won't, he says.

For future flights, he suggests NASA seek persons with non-competitive personalities, who find satisfaction in work for its own sake and who have concern for other people.

**Mexico agreement**

AUSTIN, Texas (Spl.)—A University of Texas unit that produces training aids for the petroleum industry has embarked on a joint venture with an institute in Mexico to develop instructional materials for personnel working in the oil industries of Mexico and other Latin American countries.

### Care Returns To Poland

CARE is returning to Poland to deliver food packages to young children, pregnant women, nursing mothers and the elderly during the current harvest emergency, according to an announcement by Marjorie Pinschmidt, Director of the CARE Regional office in Dallas.

Mrs. Pinschmidt then quoted from a statement by Wallace J. Campbell, President of the international aid and development organization.

"Responding to many of our donors' wishes to send help to the Polish people,

CARE held discussions with Polish government officials and received a most favorable reaction." Campbell said. "A formal agreement is being signed in Warsaw by CARE representative, Charles Sykes, and the Polish Ministry of Health.

"The first 10,000 food packages are being procured in Oslo and Hamburg and are expected to be distributed shortly. Our target is to provide 50,000 packages monthly. CARE staff will participate in the selection of recipients and supervise the distribution.

"The cost of the food aid," Campbell indicated, "is to be met by donor support in the US, and by

contributors in other countries through CARE Canada, CARE Germany, and CARE Norway, as well as through the European office of CARE in Bonn. A goal of \$5 million has been set.

"None of our ongoing aid, self-help development and refugee assistance programs in Africa, Asia, Latin America, and the Middle East will be affected in any way. The program in Poland will be funded wholly by special contributions for this purpose.

"CARE people-to-people aid to Poland began in 1946 right after World War II and continued until 1949. It was resumed in 1957.

with CARE supplying not only food but also agricultural, vocational and medical equipment until 1971 when the need was no longer acute. Total aid provided was more than \$65 million."

Mrs. Pinschmidt said, "Those who wish to help can send contributions to CARE--Food For Poland, 109 North Akard Street, Dallas, Texas 75201.
