Neither Here Nor There

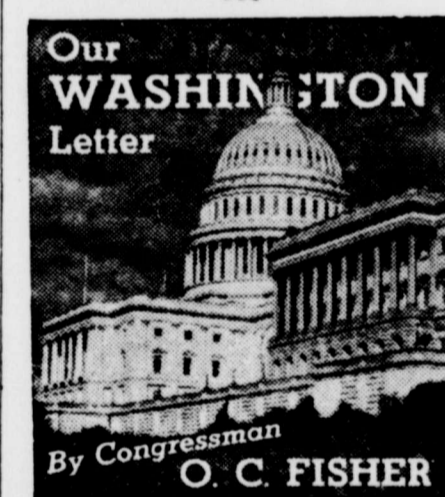

SO S FOR THE HONEY BEE

The honey bee, which sacrifices its life everytime it stings you, has its stinger to the wall and is collectively fighting for its life today, according to testimony given the House Committee on Agriculture last week.

A dozen witnesses from over the nation, including the research specialists from the Department of Agriculture made a dramatic appeal for Uncle Sam to come to the aid of the honey-makers. And, they pointed out, just making honey is but a small part of what Mother Nature has in store for the honey-bee to do if vegetable life is to be properly balanced in this land of ours.

"The decline of honeybees is a threat to the future welfare of American agriculture", warned Dr. Mac A. McCall, research specialist in the Bureau of Plant Industry. And he told a convincing story.

Hand-in-hand with the reduction in number of bees has been an alarming reduction in yields of alfalfa seed, perennial legumes, red clover, and ladino clover, as examples. The average yield of alfalfa seed in the United States in 1925 was 3.59 bushels per acre, while in 1948 it was 1.61 bushels per acre. In the case of red clover the yield dropped from 1.35 bushels to .97 per acre.

"An important factor in this decrease has been lack of cross pollination necessary for fertilizing these crops," the Doctor pointed out. "These plants are self-sterile, requiring the transfer of pollen from plant to plant to obtain a seed set. This pollination is accomplished by wild bees and honey bees in

their search for nectar and pollen." He went on to say that formerly in the United States there was an abundance of wild bees to act as pollinators. But use of insecticides to control harmful insects, along with a disappearance of native pollinating insects, has gummed up the works.

"This is one of the most serious factors in many areas in bringing seed production of the perennial legumes to a dangerously low level", Dr. McCall emphasized.

It all adds up to the fact that the more bees there are, the more of many types of seed production there is. And Dr. J. H. Davis State Inspector of Arkansas, said he could prove the cotton staple is longer and the cotton yield higher in localities where there are lots of honeybees.

Another expert, Walter A. Straub of Chicago, reminded that your baby's health and the presence of honey in the pantry have a real relationship.

"When honey is added as a carbohydrate modifier to milk for bottle-fed babies, the calcium retained from the milk it takes in rises as against any other carbohydrate, including glucose and others. The retention of calcium in a growing infant is very important for bone structure and teeth, and so forth", testified Straub.

Not only that, said Straub, "honey has small quantities of Vitamin K. That is the vitamin which prevents hemorrhages, which hurries coagulation of the blood in case of wounds." It was carried, he continued, by a good many of our troops in a little capsule to give them first aid if they happened to be wounded and could not get aid or help otherwise.

"We found in our experiments that infants who began to hemorrhage right after birth, that hemorrhage was stopped by the administration of honey."

But despite its importance, the bee business is in a slump today. The soil conservationists express concern because of their dependence on legumes to hold erosion-inclined soils. The fruit growers are worried. The beekeepers of the south who last year shipped 1,164,000 pounds of bees and 858,000 queen bees into the northern honey-producing areas, are in a dilemma. Excessive imports, high labor costs, losses from insecticides, and a dozen other factors have combined to take most of the profit away from the producers. And the result is that every year there are fewer and fewer bees.

The Agriculture committee lent a sympathetic ear. In the meantime, the overworked bee population is buzzing along short-handed, trying to fill its part of Nature's bargain.

A gem of thought was included in a letter from a constituent the other day. After commending the stand taken by the Democrats who refuse to vote for certain legislation sponsored by the party leadership where it is not good for the country, he insisted it is the duty of loyal Democrats to vote against such measures. Right-thinking Democrats should think of the country's welfare first, he said, and help hold the party in line. In fact, he said he endorsed the thought contained in this verse:

"Things have come to a wondrous pass
When a man can't wallop his own jackass."

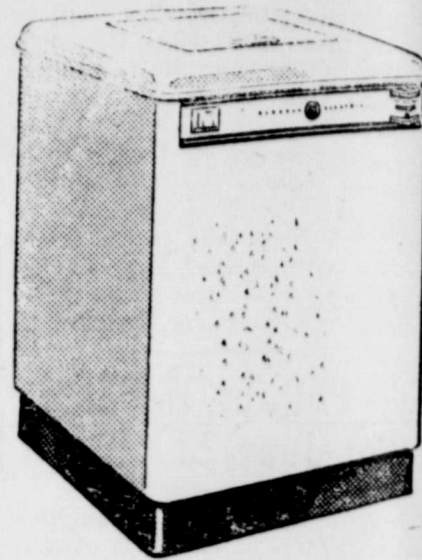

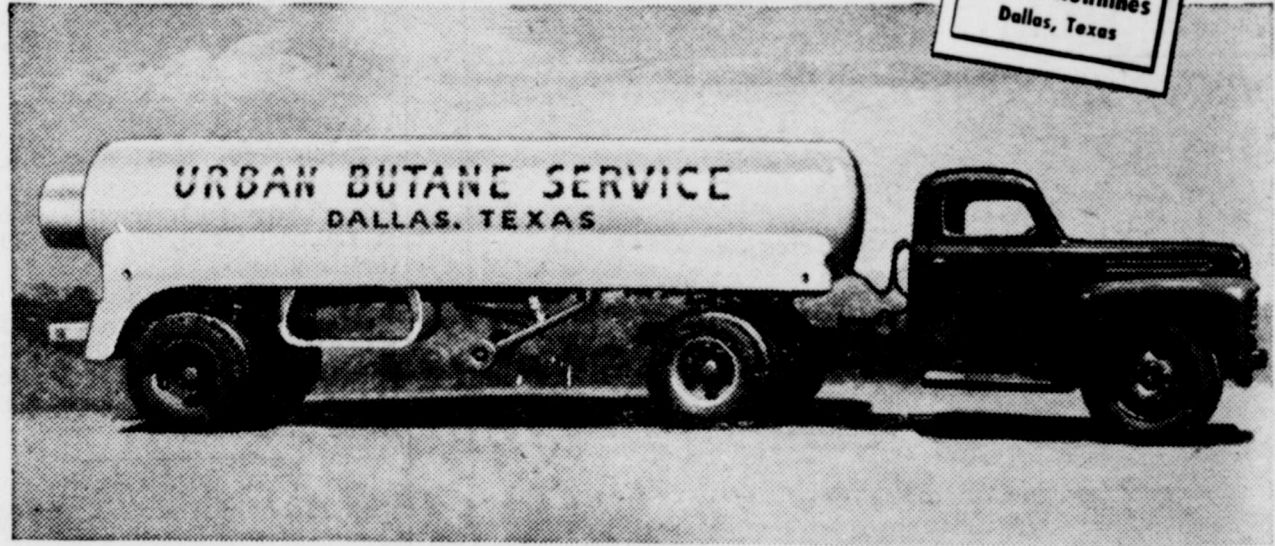

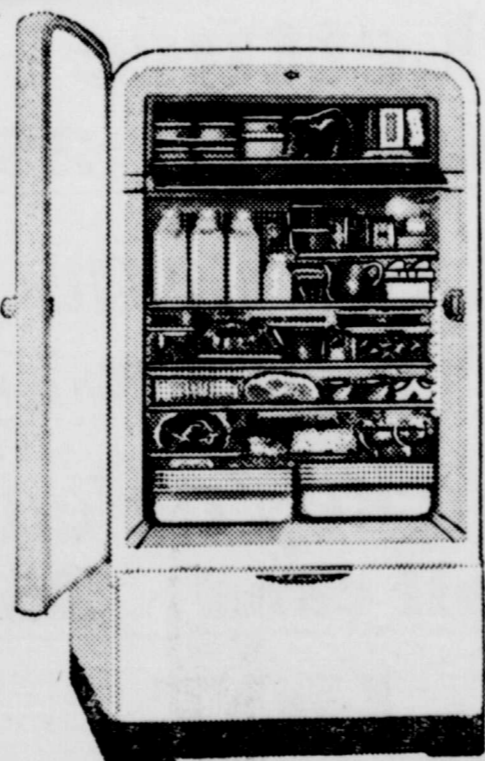

North Concho River Soil Conservation News Column

J. E. Bynum completed the conservation plan on his ranch north of Sterling City last week. As a part of his complete conservation plan Bynum will defer a one section pasture during the growing season for two or three years to speed recovery of the choice range grasses.

Range conservationists are assisting Harvey D. Glass to make site and range condition maps of his ranch this week. Glass will use the information obtained in the preparation of his conservation plan.

Foster S. Price has built up two diversion terraces to turn water

around the headquarters on his Bob's Creek Ranch. He is building blocks on his ranch roads and establishing other mechanical conservation practices to prevent erosion and hold rain where it falls.

Julius Bade has completed two diversion terraces to turn water around a windmill and water troughs near his alfalfa field.

Harold Gober completed two dams on Mrs. James McEntire's ranch.

These mechanical conservation practices were constructed by Ster-

ling County equipment.

Leo Radde has pushed 240 acres of cedar in his Spring Creek pasture. Radde is eradicating this woody invader to give the good grasses a chance to grow.

Claude Collins, Jr. had the road diversions reworked on a half mile section of his ranch this week. These structures pick the water up in the borrow ditch and carry it to flat range land, 150 to 200 feet away from the road. They are built with a 6 to 8 foot flat bottom
