Not only that, said Straub, "honey has small quantities of Vitamin K. That is the vitamin which prevents hemorrhages, which hurries coagulation of the blood in case of wounds." It was carried, he continued, by a good many of our troops in a little capsule to give them first aid if they happened to be wounded and could not get aid or help otherwise.

"We found in our experiments that infants who began to hemorrhage right after birth, that hemorrhage was stopped by the adminis-






