Free Chest X-Rays Today and Tomorrow

Today and tomorrow, July 22 and 23, all persons over 15 years of age, may receive a free chest X-ray at the Hefley Motor Co. building here in Sterling City. The X-raying is done by the Texas State Department of Health. The campaign is one to get early detection of the disease in people. When the disease is found early, a cure can be effected in shorter time, and the spread of the disease is not likely.

\$50 Award To Lucky Person

An award of \$50 has been put up by the clubs of the town to be given away to some lucky person. Each person being x-rayed will fill out a card and following the two days of x-raying, the names will be shaken up and a lucky name will be drawn. The name drawn will receive the \$50. This prize or award is strictly to stimulate interest in getting people to have their chests x-rayed.

Hours for x-raying are from 9 to 6 on Friday, the 22nd, and from 10 to 5 on Saturday, the 23rd. Be on hand one of these days for your x-ray if you are 15 years or older. No children under 15 will be allowed to be x-rayed.

"Covering the County"

Claude Collins, Jr. recently used Stillesterol, a hormone stimulator, on 350 old ewes which he will lamb in November on irrigated pasture near Pecos. He reports that he is well pleased with the apparent results, and thinks he will get a good lamb crop.

Jack Bickerton of the Du Pont Company, recently came here by request and sprayed some prickly pear with T.C.A. The pear that was sprayed are on John Brock's lots adjoining the Robert Lee road.

If this chemical proves successful and is put into mass production, it may prove entirely practical to eradicate pear with your cattle spray machines and T.C.A. The chemical sterilizes the ground against all growth for 30 to 90 days. Experimental work in this field was done at Kansas State College Experiment Station.

About 15 sections of the Spade country has been cabled during recent months. Long range results are difficult to forecast, so far as the mesquite are concerned, but Otto Jones is pleased with results up to now. Two large crawler type tractors drag the cable between them. SWING OF SOUTHWEST FARM MARKETS

By United States Department of Agriculture

(USDA—Livestock, grain and cotton markets revealed the past week's typical mixed price trends, the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Production and Marketing Administration points out in the weekly market summary.

Cotton varied from \$5.25 a bale lower at New Orleans to \$1.25 higher at Little Rock. New Orleans closed Monday at 31.25 cents a pound; Little Rock 32.75.

Sorghums advanced 5 to 10 cents a hundred pounds for the week, and yellow corn 2 to 3 cents a bushel. White corn lost 7 to 14 cents, and other grains 3 to 5. No. 1 hard ordinary wheat closed Monday at \$2.16½ cents a bushel at Texas common points. No. 2 white corn brought \$1.88½ to \$1.99½, and milo \$2.15 to \$2.25.

Rice markets weakened under prospects for a record new crop added to large remaining stocks and slow demand. Most feedstuffs revealed a strong tone, with demand unusually good for the summer season. Hay markets also showed a firmer tone. Peanuts found slow demand, as favorable weather aided the new crop.

Sheep receipts fell off sharply from a week ago Monday as prices of spring lambs stood at \$2 to \$3 lower levels. Ewes closed about unchanged, ranging from \$6.50 to \$9.50 for medium to choice. Goats lost 25 cents to \$1 at San Antonio on heavier receipts. Dressed spring lamb lost \$6 to \$9 for the week at New York.

Wool markets felt the summer slump and little trading took place.

With hog prices mostly \$1 higher than a week earlier, more hogs arrived at southwest markets this Monday but fewer came in to mid-west terminals. Pigs lost \$1 at Oklahoma City. Closing top was \$24 at Denver and around \$22.50 in Oklahoma and Texas. Pork loins gained \$9 to \$10 and Boston Butts \$3 for the week at New York.

Slightly smaller offerings of cattle and calves in the southwest and midwest soild unchanged to mostly lower than a week ago Monday. Bulls showed the only real strength while calves recorded the greatest weakness with losses of 50 cents to \$2 or more. Some cow beef sold lower for the week at New York, and some steer beef and veal went higher. Best slaughter calves reached \$25 at San Antonio and Denver, \$23.50 at Fort Worth, and \$22 at Oklahoma City Monday.

Good quality large candled eggs brought higher premiums this week. Dallas and Fort Worth paid around 50 cents a dozen for whites and mostly 45 for mixed colors. Denver took large whites at 44 to 47. Extras of 60 per cent A quality arrived at New Orleans at 51½ cents. Undergrades found little demand except for processing. Poultry held about steady last week but weakened slightly at Fort Worth Monday.

Liberal supplies of watermelons kept prices on the downgrade, but cantaloupes sold higher. Tomatoes and peaches remained plentiful at slightly lower prices. Sweet potato prices declined with increased diggings. Most markets paid higher prices for potatoes. Texas and New Mexico onions sold firm at Fort Worth.

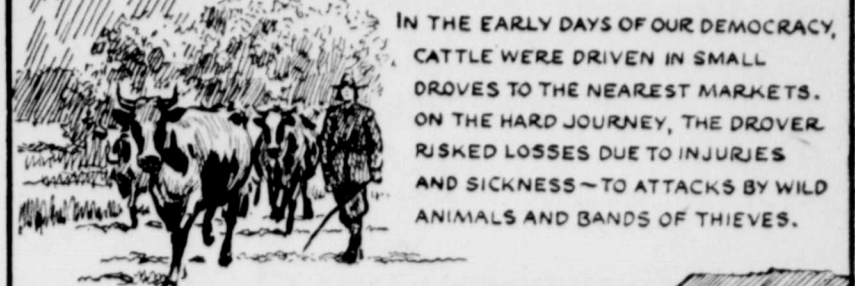

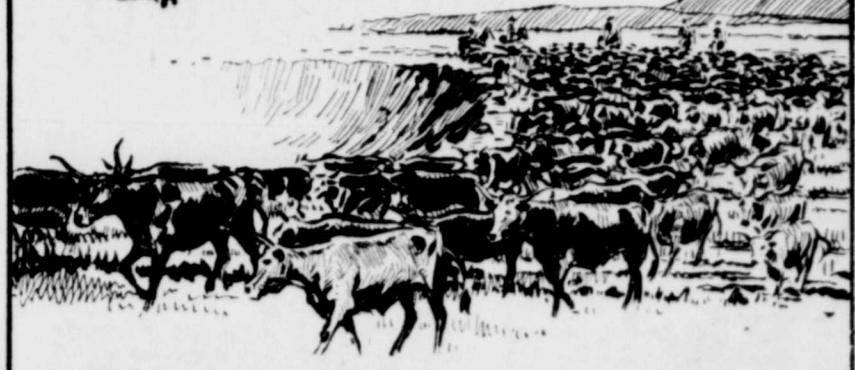

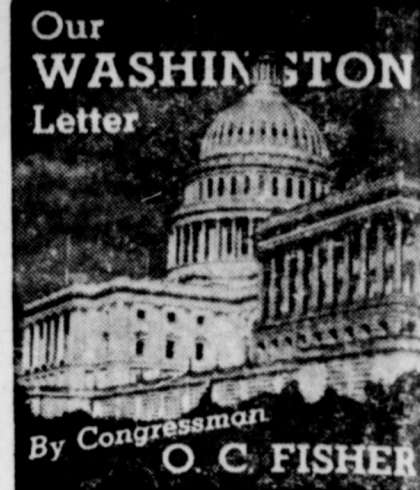

A measure designed to go a long way toward meeting the need for more adequate rural telephone service passed the House last week. The bill authorizes the Rural Electrification Administration to make loans for the expansion and improvement of rural telephone service under the same terms and conditions which REA has employed for many years in making loans for rural electrification. It is not a bill for government ownership or operation of telephone facilities. On the contrary, it provides that funds shall be made available on identical terms to private corporations, public agencies, and cooperatives, gives persons now operating telephone facilities a clear preference over all other types of applicants, and preserves to the utmost the authority of State regulatory bodies over rates, service, and service areas.

The Committee hearings disclosed that only 42% of American farms now have telephones. In Texas the percentage is only 17.6%, as of 1945, according to the U.S. Census of Agriculture.

Under this proposal, sponsored by Rep. Bob Poage of Waco, the money for loans would be handled exactly as REA loans are now made. The money is borrowed by the Government at a low rate of interest and then reloaned to the rural telephone applicants. The program will, therefore not cost the taxpayers anything, and will be administered by the present REA set-up.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 19

Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for Civil Service in certain counties upon a vote of the people therein.

Be It Resolved By the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Article XVI of Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding to said Article a new Section, to be known and designated as Section 62-c, reading as follows:

"Section 62-c The Legislature is authorized to provide for the creation of Civil Service Systems for county employees in the respective counties of this State, but any system so authorized and established shall be approved by a vote of the people in said county. Any Civil service System established by virtue of this Section shall apply to appointive offices only, and the limitations on term of office heretofore provided by Section 30 of this Article shall not apply, but the duration of such offices shall be governed by the provisions of such Civil Service System. This Section shall

not apply to counties having a population less than seventy-five thousand (75,000) people."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the State at an election to be held on the fourth Saturday in September, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed or written thereon (or in counties using voting machines the said

machines shall provide for) the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for Civil Service in counties upon a vote of the people therein"; and

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for Civil Service in counties upon a vote of the people therein."

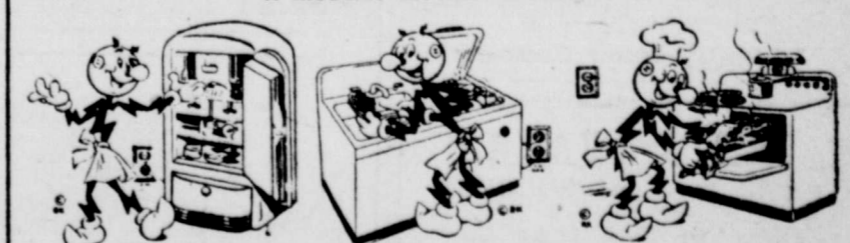

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION
NO. 5**

Proposing an Amendment to Sec-
tion 5 of Article III of the Constitu-
tion relating to sessions of the Leg-
islature and what may be consid-
ered thereat and an Amendment to
Section 24 of Article III relating to
compensation of Members of the
Legislature; specifying the time
when the Amendment shall take
effect if ratified; and providing for
the submission of the proposed
Amendment to a vote of the people.
**Be It Resolved by the Legislature
of the State of Texas:**

Section 1. That Section 24 of Ar-
ticle III of the State Constitution,
be amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 24. Members of the State
Senate and House of Representa-
tives shall receive from the State
Treasury an annual salary of Three
Thousand Six Hundred Dollars
(\$3600), to be paid in monthly in-
stallments on the first of each
month.

"They shall also be entitled to
mileage in going to the seat of gov-
ernment for each session of the
Legislature and returning there-
from, which mileage shall not ex-
ceed Two Dollars and Fifty Cents
(\$2.50), for every twenty-five (25)
miles, the distance to be computed
by the nearest and most direct
route of travel from a table of dis-
tances to each county seat pre-
pared by the State Comptroller."

Sec. 2. That Section 5 of Article
III of the Constitution be amended
to read as follows:

"Sec. 5. Two (2) regular sessions
of each Legislature shall be held,
and until otherwise provided by
law, the time of the convening of
the first regular session shall be at
noon on the second Tuesday in
January of each odd-numbered
year, and of the second regular ses-
sion, at noon on the second Tuesday
in January of each even-numbered

year.
"At other times, when called by
the Governor, the Legislature shall
convene in special session.

"Appropriations for monthly re-
curring expenses and salaries paid
by the State shall be made for a
period of not more than twelve (12)
months.

"At the second regular session of
each Legislature, only proposals to
amend the Constitution and to
make appropriations to pay month-
ly recurring expenses and salaries

and such other measures only as
four-fifths (4/5) of the Membership
of each House may determine shall
be considered."

Sec. 3. The Amendments propos-
ed herein, if ratified by the people,
shall become effective January
first, A. D. 1950.

Sec. 4. The foregoing Constitu-
tional Amendments shall be sub-
mitted to a vote of the qualified
voters of this State at a General
Election to be held throughout this
State on the fourth Saturday in

September, 1949, the same being
September 24, 1949, at which elec-
tion all ballots shall have printed
thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amend-
ments relative to sessions of the
Legislature and to compensation of
its members."

"AGAINST the Constitutional
Amendments relative to sessions of

the Legislature and to compensa-
tion of its members."

Each voter shall express his vote
on the proposed Amendment in the
manner provided by law.

Sec. 5. The Governor of this
State shall issue the necessary pro-
clamation for said election and shall
have same published as required
by the Constitution and laws of
this State.
