MARCH OF DIMES DRIVE

Ed. S. Stewart, State Chairman, March of Dimes, stated in a letter this week to A. T. Bratton, local drive chairman, that there were over 2350 cases of polio in Texas this year. There were 41,000 cases of polio in the nation in 1949. Over 32,000 of this number needed help from the March of Dimes fund.

Local funds were exhausted in the National Foundation chapters in 44 states by midsummer and the National Headquarters was sending emergency aid to chapters at the rate of \$100,000 a day. In this one year, the National Foundation and its local chapters paid out \$31,000,000, or more than the entire nation contributed to the 1949 March of Dimes. 'Covering the County'

While everyone is still in a stupor from overeating during the holidays, maybe the subject of income taxes will not be such a hard jolt. Some are still on a soup diet. but we hope they will find the strength to consider the subject as drawing near. The following pointers on income tax apply to farmers, ranchers, and anyone who received at least two-thirds of his total income from farming or ranching. Anyone having an income of six hundred dollars or more must file a return.

You can avoid the filing of a declaration by filing your final return on or before Jan. 31, 1950, with payment of the taxes in full as computed on the return. In the event that you cannot do this, you must file a declaration on or be-fore Jan. 15, and your final return must be filed by March 15.

The forms you should use are 1040 and 1040F. The form 1040 is for all income tax returns, and 1040F is a form that breaks expenses and income down into particular phases such as labor hired, income from cattle, horses, mules, wool, sheep, etc. Form 1040F has to be filed along with the 1040 form. These forms can be obtained by writing the Collector of Internal Revenue at Austin or Dallas or at the branch office at San An-



Sift flour once, measure, add baking powder and salt, and sift together three times. Cream butter, add sugar gradually, and cream together until light and fluffy. Add eggs and beat well. Add flour, alternately with milk, a small amount at a time, beating after each addition until smooth. Add vanilla and coconut and blend. Turn into greased muffin pans, filling each ½ full. Bake in moderate oven (375° F.) 15 minutes, or until done. Makes 16 cupcakes.
