HORSE SHOW HERE APRIL 22

The 1950 Sterling City Horse Show will be held here April 22 at the local rodeo grounds from 9:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. Ed Heller of Dundee will be the judge of the show. The deadline on entries is April 15, and the entry fee is \$3 per head.

Foster S. Price is chairman of the show this year. The entry committee is composed of Temp Foster, Pete Hanson, W. R. Davis and Foster Conger. The pens committee includes John Blair, Bill Blair, Taylor Garrett, George Davis, Joe Whitley, and Thurman Rich.

Garlyn Hoffman is secretary of the show. Rules of the American Quarterhorse Association apply to Quarterhorse Division. All horses are welcome, but there are no stall facilities available. Feed and water troughs must be brought by owners.

HOSPITAL PLANS APPROVED BY U. S.

The U. S. Public Health Service has approved the initial application for the construction of a 15-bed general hospital at Sterling City.

Such was the word from Congressman O. C. Fisher, to this newspaper last Friday. Already the State Department of Texas had approved the application. Money forthcoming from these departments will pay for 50% of the construction and furnishing costs of the local hospital.

Since the bonds were voted last fall by the citizens, the amount of aid has been increased by the federal government.

The next action will be by the Commissioners Court in letting the bids for the physical plant. The site was donated by W. L. Foster last year.

The Sterling feminine cage aggregation was nosed out of the State T.A.A.F. Meet in San Angelo by the Al Wooten Motorettes of Fort Worth, defending state champions.

Coach Gordon Lowe's crew got off to a shaky start Friday, March 17th at 9:00 A.M. by being beaten 24-23 by a mediocre Mrs. Howard's Bakery crew from Brownwood. The Sterling lassies had a hard time adjusting themselves to the strict calling by the referees, and Christine Whitley and Aleta Duff fouled out. The Brownwood ladies were very lucky to win this one.

As the tournament was a double elimination affair, Sterling then went into the loser's bracket.

The Sterling girls, now accustomed to close calling, fought their way back at 4:00 P.M. the same day with a close, hard-earned victory over Centennial. The score was 39 to 38. Yvonne Avery, from her pivot position, tallied 23 of these points. Avery scored in the last five seconds of an over-time period to put the game on ice.

Friday night Sterling beat Cactus, a team the high plains, with a score of 33-22. The game was closer than the score indicates. Cactus had a good club and fought hard, but they were no match for the ball handling and all around good play of the Sterling crew.

On Saturday afternoon at 1:30 the local lassies got another chance at Mrs. Howard's Bakery. This time the Sterling girls played smooth ball and sent the Brownwood crew home to the tune of 20 to 10.

At 2:00 o'clock, Coach Lowe's six met the mighty Motorettes of Fort Worth. This team, although too confident for their own good, are clearly first class in feminine basketball. The first half of the game was all Fort Worth's with the apparently exhausted Sterling girls being on the court and that is about all. The last half, however, was a different story. With Christine Whitley and Aleta Duff keeping Wanda Edwards, the tournament's outstanding player, from doing anything under either basket, the Fort Worth crew did not do much. 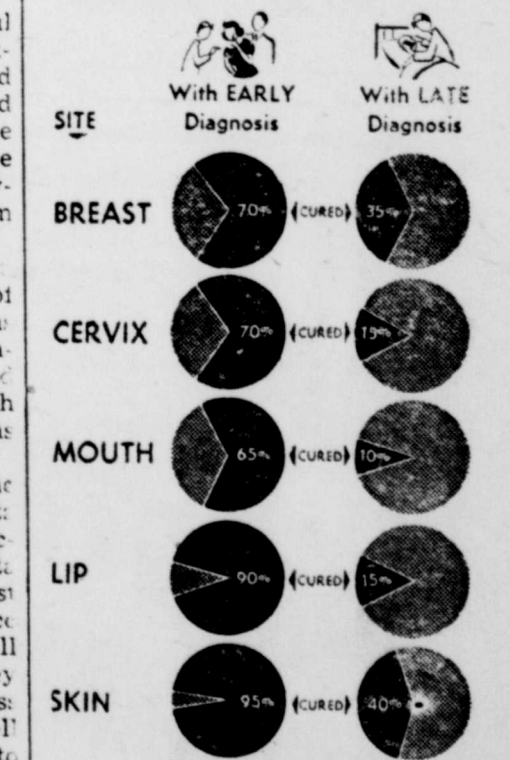
"Papa" Bratton is head of the U. S. Soil Conservation Work Unit here in Sterling.

BROADWAY AND MAIN STREET Pierre, Great Hunter, Found Something He Could Not Kill

From the province of Manitoba in Canada comes the strange tale of Pierre Montevilain, the hunter. Your acceptance or rejection of it will depend on the kind of pixies under your hat.

For many years, Pierre, a man with the strength of a caribou, lived in almost medieval splendor in a chateau overlooking Lake Winnipeg. Only two things interested him—hunting and drinking, and the measure of the man was that he was more concerned with the potency than the taste of his liquor, and cared little what it was he shot as long as he made the kill.

When he was forty, he married Emile d'Arbesine, a girl of good family from the Winnipegosis district, and when she presented him with a son a year later he toasted his heir in Hudson Bay rum and predicted that he, too, would some day be a great hunter.

His wife, however, hated the continual killing, and as the child grew older she was happy that he showed no inclination for the hunt. To encourage his love of wild life, she gave him a silver medallion of St. Francis of Assisi, patron saint of birds and beasts, and hung it around his neck on a thin gold chain. "I've heard it said that when people die their souls enter other living things, sometimes an animal," she told him.

A FEW MONTHS before the boy's ninth birthday, his father found a new-born fawn in the forest and presented it to his son. The lad named it Francois, bottle-fed it until the shakiness went out of its legs, and trained it until it followed him around like a puppy.

On his birthday a few weeks later, Pierre gave his son another present, a specially constructed rifle, small enough for a boy to carry but in all other respects an efficient instrument of destruction.

"Tomorrow," he said, "we will go hunting."
The youngster said nothing, but later asked his mother what he should do.

"You must go with your father," said Emile.
"You told me that when people die their souls go into animals," said the boy. "Wouldn't it be like killing a person?"

"Your father thinks differently," said the lad.
Pierre, who had been drinking on the porch, overheard the conversation. Addressing himself to his son, he said, "There will be no more women's talk. You will become a man and a hunter like your father. Tomorrow we go to the woods, but your first lesson will be tonight.

Take your rifle and shoot the fawn."

Terrified, the boy nodded and went to the barn. He prodded the fawn with a stick and tried to frighten it into the forest, but the pet, thinking it was a new game, took a few playful leaps and then frisked back for more sport. Finally, the boy placed the medallion of St. Francis around the fawn's neck. It needed divine protection more than he.

HALF AN HOUR later, Pierre back on the porch, was roused from his rum by a shot and walked out to the barn, certain that the boy, like a true Montevilain, had obeyed his order. Instead, on the earth floor he found his son's body, blood oozing through the shirt, while the fawn, the medallion dangling from its neck, stood near by.

Crazed, Pierre picked up the rifle and pumped the remaining bullets into the animal's heart. Then he tore the talisman from the carcass.

Next day the boy was buried with the medallion of St. Francis again around his neck, and after the funeral Emile went back to her own village.

From then on, the great hunter became the great butcher. Day after day, he killed as if bent on exterminating every animal in the forest, and at night he drank and cursed his wife for her ideas about souls and animals.

One evening the following summer he saw a giant stag at the far end of the garden. He reached for his gun and followed it down to the lake. At the water's edge the animal paused and Pierre lifted the gun to his shoulder, but instead of a giant stag he saw a frightened fawn. Its eyes reminded him of two other sets of eyes, but he fired, and the animal gave a little jump and fell dead. Attracted by something on its neck, he walked over to see what it was.

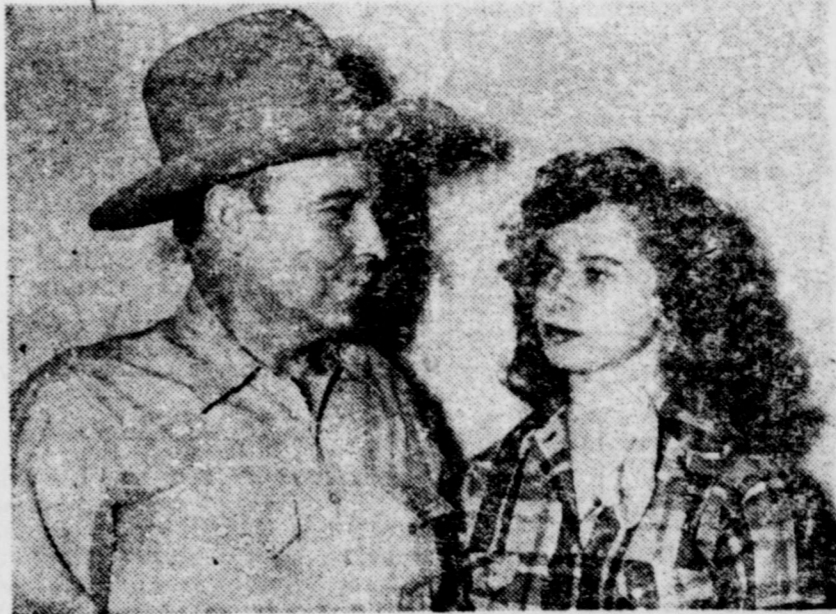

Creamed Tuna and Mushrooms with Rice

1 package (1½ cups) pre-cooked rice; ½ teaspoon salt; 1¼ cups water.

1 can (10½ ounces) condensed mushroom soup; 1 can (7 ounces) tuna, drained; ¼ cup milk.

Combine pre-cooked rice, salt, and water in saucepan. Mix just until all rice is moistened. Bring quickly to a boil over high heat, uncovered, fluffing rice gently once or twice with a fork. (Do not stir.) Cover and remove from heat. Let stand 10 minutes.

Heat soup in saucepan over low heat, stirring constantly. Add tuna and milk; continue to cook until thoroughly heated. Place hot rice on platter. Cover with tuna mixture and serve at once. Makes 4 servings.

POLL TAKES DROP

Poll tax payments in our district took a drop in most of the counties compared with receipts issued two years ago. Of the 23 counties we have reports from, 15 of them show lower payments than two years ago while only 8 showed an increase. The counties reporting a decrease include: Brown, Coke, Coleman, Kendall, Kerr, Kinney, Lampasas, McCullough, Menard, San Saba, Sterling, Uvalde, Schleicher, Gillespie and Runnels. On the other hand, increases were noted in Concho, Irion, Kimble, Mason, Tom Green, Val Verde, Edwards and Real. Figures have not been received from Mills, Llano, Bandera or Sutton.

ECONOMY SIGNS.

The House rose up last week and repulsed two nonessential money bills which would have cost the taxpayers hundreds of millions of dollars. One, to dish out \$37,000,000 to help local communities finance a rural library service was defeated by only three votes. The other, to provide \$80 million annually (\$400,000,000 estimated eventually) to subsidize mining operations, was voted down by a margin of 20 votes. My vote helped to defeat both of these.

It seems to me that library service is purely local in character and should be financed by local communities and the various states, most of which are in better financial condition than is the Federal government. If Uncle Sam is to help on these things, he must borrow the money because he is now operating deep in the red.

ODDS AND ENDS

Texas Congressmen have been getting a certain amount of good-natured ribbing in the cloak rooms about why nearly all of us voted against Statehood for Alaska recently. Some facetiously claim we did it because if Alaska is admitted Texas would no longer be the biggest state in the union!



"...that first eat an oyster," according to Jonathan Swift. Aren't we glad to get the example!



Yet, somehow we never seem to have time between September and April to get our fill. With the Lenten season coming up, however, you can serve oysters often — they are a happy substitute if you observe meatless days. The ways of preparing them are legion. Here's one you will cherish.

Baked Oyster Casserole

3 tablespoons butter; 1/2 cup flour; 1 1/4 cups milk; 1 pint Blue-point oysters; 1/2 cup oyster liquid; 1 teaspoon salt; 1/4 teaspoon pepper; 1 1/2 teaspoons Worcestershire sauce; 3 cups soft bread crumbs; 1 cup canned whole kernel corn; 1/4 cup butter.

Melt 3 tablespoons butter in saucepan. Add flour and blend. Add milk gradually, stirring constantly, and cook until thickened. Drain oysters; add 1/2 cup liquid gradually to thickened sauce mixture. Add seasonings, oysters, 1 cup of the bread crumbs, and corn and turn into greased baking dish.

Melt 1/4 cup butter and add remaining 2 cups bread crumbs. Sprinkle over oyster mixture and bake in moderate oven (375° F.) 25 minutes, or until crumbs are golden brown. Makes 6 to 8 servings.
