



1 teaspoon salt teaspoon pepper cup Mazola Salad Oil (for frying)

Have butcher cut frying chicken into serving pieces, Wash; drain. Put flour, salt and pepper in paper bag. Place chicken in bag and shake well to coat each piece of chicken with seasoned flour. Heat 1 cup salad oil in heavy skillet, over medium heat for about 3 minutese (oil should be 1/4 inch deep in pan). With fork, carefully place chicken into hot salad oil. (The use of two pans will greatly simplify the cooking.) Fry, turning frequently, until tender and well browned, 15 to 30 minutes. Remove chicken; drain on absorbent paper. If chicken is larger - cover after browning and allow to cook slowly until tender. Delicious served plain or with hot Cream Gravy. Makes

Cream Gravy: Pour off all but 1/3 cup salad oil used for frying. Add 4 cup of the seasoned flour left from coating chicken. Blend well. Gradually add 3 cups milk, stirring constantly with wooden spoon. Bring to a boil and boil 2 minutes. Add additional salt and pepper to taste. Makes 4 to 5 servings.
