## School Bond Issue Passes 140 To 37

The voters of Sterling County voted a \$250,000 school bond improvement at the polls last Saturday 140 to 37. The money will be used to build some new classrooms and improve the whole existing structure. Work will probably get underway around June 15, it has been estimated.

The bonds have been sold to a Dallas bond house at a very low rate of interest. The rate runs just above 2% for the total.

Wyatt C. Hedrick, architect, has done preliminary work on the improving, and will handle the job from that angle.

A new nine room elementary school will be built with washrooms in the first three grades, and washrooms for boys and girls grades 4 through 8. A new ground floor auditorium with seating capacity of 400 and an additional 150 seats if needed. A new cafeteria is to be constructed with seating capacity of 100. New boys and girls dressing rooms will be built to add to the gym. The present gym will have the old floors done over or new maple flooring added. The H. E. Laboratory will be improved with cabinets, etc.

The main building will have all the upper story removed and be remodelled into a new high school, with shop, science laboratory, commercial room, teachers' lounge, and proof music room, book rooms, storage rooms, and four classrooms. A study hall with lockers will be built. All doors and windows will be new, asphalt tile will be put on floors, and a complete new heating and lighting unit will be installed.

All the new building will follow the trend of having all floors on the ground—no second floors. Such is the case for public schools and can be done quickly in case of an emergency.

**Bonds Taken Here**  
\$10,000.00 of the bonds were taken locally. J. T. Davis, president of the First National Bank, \$100,000, and the bank took \$100,000 from the bond company.

**NOISE MAKERS DON'T** usually get very far up here. The members who are listened to are those who are well-prepared when they speak and who are sincere and consistent in the positions they take on various issues. Members soon learn who can be depended upon for accuracy and reliability. It has been my observation that while a few bad apples show up now and then, most of the members are sincere, able, courageous and patriotic. And if they don't measure up, the people have a chance to change hired hands every two years.

About all one can do here is to keep as well informed on pending issues as possible, vote independently on issues involving principle, get along with other members, measure expenditures in terms of what is essential and what is non-essential, work hard for the welfare of one's district and try to reconcile every issue with what is best for the nation.

## Going Strong at 93 Years Young

Henry (Uncle Hank) Davis, pioneer settler here, will be 93 years old on May 31. In spite of the 93 years, Uncle Hank, on the day of the interview, was a little red from the exertion of mowing the lawn around his place. (He did use a power lawn mower on it.) Never a day hardly passes but what he gets in his car and goes down to the post office after his mail and perhaps attends to other little matters.

Born in Dade County, Missouri on May 31, 1857, Mr. Davis was one of six children of F. A. Davis and Rebecca Kendall Davis. A resident of McClellan County from 1863 to 1889, Uncle Hank came to Sterling in January 1889. Montvale was the only town in the county then, or really there was no Sterling County—it was a part of Tom Green. The county of Sterling was organized in 1892, he said.

Mr. Davis served as county commissioner for three terms in the early history of this county.

Mrs. Davis, who died July 11, 1946, was the former Frances Elizabeth Kellis. They would have been married for 65 years had she lived almost another year. Nine children were born to Mr. and Mrs. Davis, three of whom are deceased. They are Mrs. Mary Emma Rosser of Hot Springs, N. M., Mrs. Clara Frances Bynum of Abilene, John Dee Davis, deceased, Mrs. Ada Bell Aiken, deceased, Vern E. Davis of Sterling, Mrs. Winnie Mae Neill of Sterling, T. Jeff Davis of Sterling, Henry Bowden Davis, deceased, and Mrs. Nannie B. Amburgey of Odessa. Mr. Davis has fourteen grandchildren and twelve great-grandchildren (one dead).

Uncle Hank recalls when the Concho River was full of water all year, Sterling Creek and Willow, Lacy and Hackberry had running water. He said he guessed he trapped the last two beaver from the county "way back", which was the last of such until the restocking again here in the thirties.

Mr. Davis attends to his own business matters, is regular in his attendance at the Baptist Church, where he is the senior deacon. In the past years he has served as treasurer and held other offices in the church. He said he did not take a nap in the day-time unless he accidentally fell asleep in his chair. He tends to his chicken, right down to shooting the birds that try to snitch the feed and traps the ground squirrels that would get the eggs. He takes and reads two daily papers, keeping up with the world in his home at the edge of town west.

## Final School Exercises Held This Week

### "Covering the County"

Spraying of bitterweed is still in progress. Weeds that have been sprayed look as if a good rate of kill is being gotten. The bitterweed plants have some old flowers which may produce matured seed heads, but the unmatured seed heads run as high as 15 to 1 matured head. Two things can be accomplished by spraying now. They are: (1) getting a reduction of seed and (2) giving the grass extra moisture now being used by bitterweed plants. The extra moisture can help the turf to increase and the grass will stand more drouth.

At present apparently good kills have been obtained by using one pint or one-half pound of acid per acre applied with a turbine. Some weeds have been sprayed with 1 qt. or 1 lb. of acid. This application appears to kill the weeds faster. It also appears that it requires a high degree of soil moisture before good kill rates can be obtained. In dry weather kills could not be obtained. About 800 acres of bitterweeds have been sprayed.

An experimental plot of mesquite and cedar was sprayed on N. H. Reed's Kennibrew place using 245T and 24D mixed with water and oil. Some was sprayed with 245T with straight oil and some with oil and water. The 245T and 24D mixture appears to affect bitterweed, cedar, mesquite and prickly pear. The bitterweed had begun to curl up at the end of 24 hours and the brown on the mesquite had increased considerably at the end of 48 hours. This was seedling mesquite about 5 to 6 feet tall. The prickly pear had turned brown spotted and the cedar was beginning to turn brown after 48 hours. The 245T mixtures appear to be the most favorable killer for mesquite, but more work will have to be done before definite recommendations can be set.

The Enoch Bros. of San Angelo did the application.

At present there has not been any sign of pecan nut casebearer, but it is about time that they begin to do damage. Inspections of pecan trees should be made every few days. The casebearer usually lays its eggs at the base of the small pecans. The egg is white and a little smaller than the head of a pin. When the eggs are first seen on the pecans is the time to spray.

The spray should contain 3 lbs. of 50% wettable DDT, 8 lbs. of wettable sulphur, and 2 lbs. of zinc sulphate. The sulphur is added to take care of the red spiders, mites and aphids. The zinc sulphate will help prevent the pecan tree from taking "rosette." Even after spraying inspection of trees should be made so that if another crop hatches out they can be controlled before the pecan crop is damaged too badly.

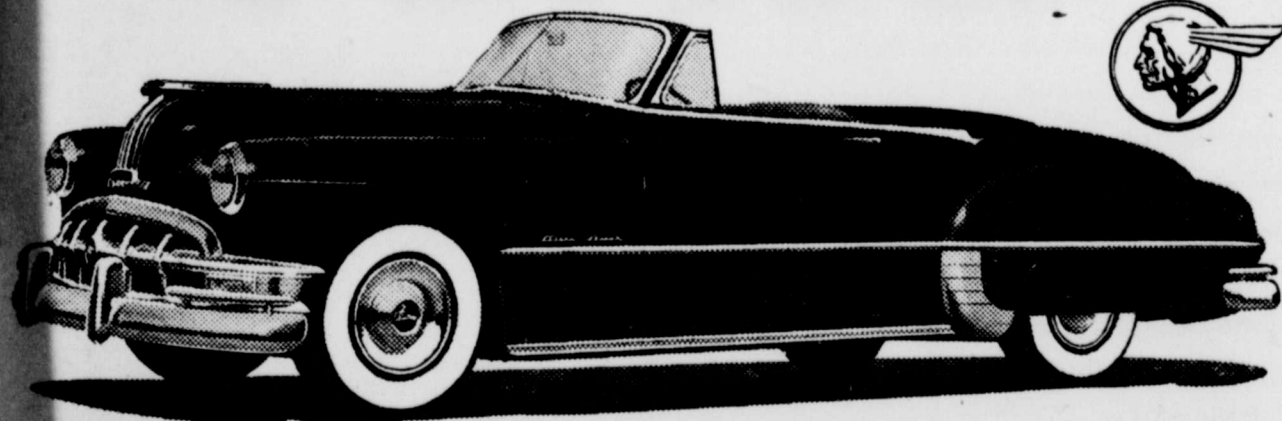

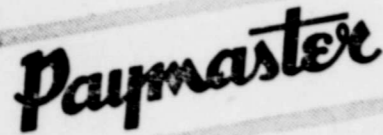

I have always been a strong admirer of Hash with Potatoes. Who hasn't? It is one of those dishes that has remained a favorite of all members of the family throughout the years. And when a teaspoon of Lea & Perrins Sauce is added, this hash becomes even more delicious. **Hash with Potatoes**

- 1/2 cup cooked, diced potatoes
- 1/2 cup cooked, diced onions
- 1/2 cup seeded, sliced green peppers
- 3 tablespoons diced pimientos
- 2 cups cold, cooked meat cut into 1/2 inch cubes
- 1 cup left-over gravy
- 1/2 cup tomato purée
- 1 tablespoon butter
- Paprika
- Salt
- 1 teaspoon Worcestershire Sauce
- Bread crumbs
- Grated cheese

This is an excellent combination. If it is not feasible to use all of the ingredients given, it will still be good. Prepare potatoes, onions, peppers, pimientos and meat. Combine these with gravy, tomato purée and butter. Season with paprika, salt and Worcestershire Sauce. Heat the sauce and add the meat and vegetables. Pour the hash into one large baking dish or into six individual baking dishes. Sprinkle with bread crumbs and cheese. Dot lightly with butter. Brown the dish in a moderate oven (350° F.) Serves 6.

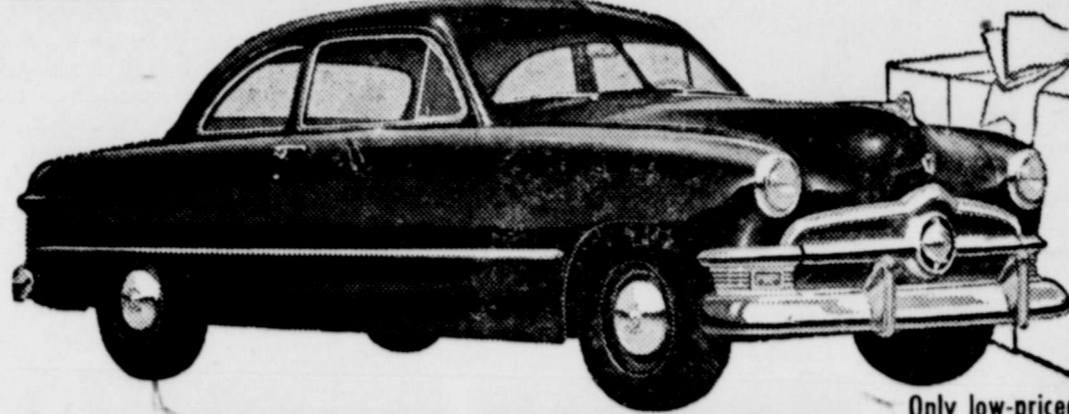

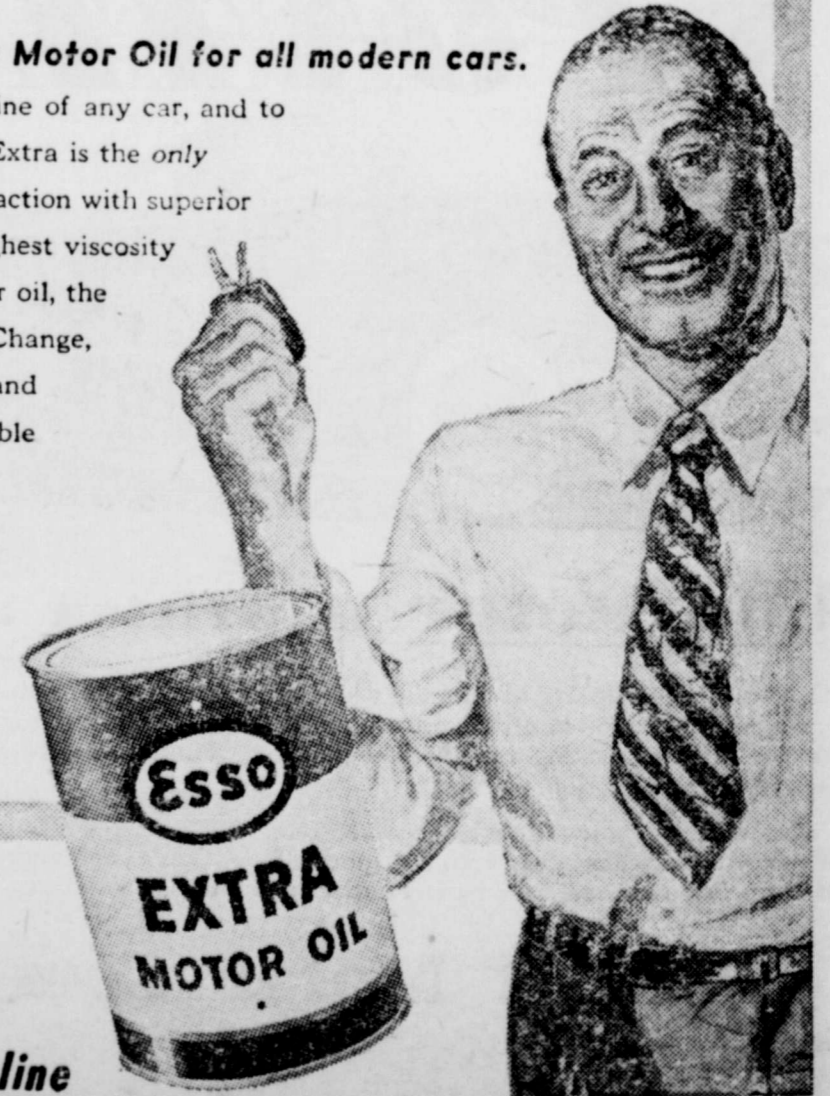

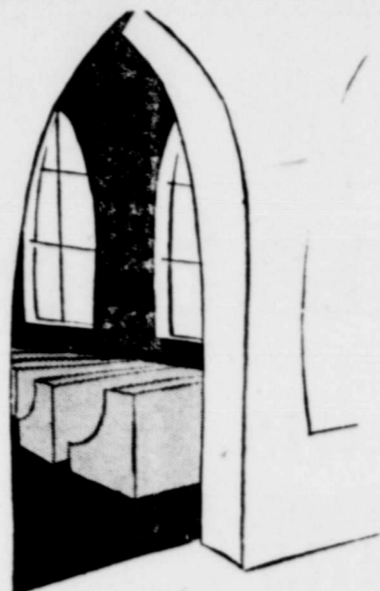

Toxaphene emulsion can be used in sprays although not in dipping vats. The strength to apply to cattle is .5 of 1%, and for sheep .25 of 1%. Toxaphene will control flies, ticks, lice, and horn flies on all livestock for a longer period than most of the other insecticides. The blow fly is very hard to kill, but the spraying will help control it.

Some of the trade names for toxaphene are Cooper-tox, X25EM, Checker-R-Tox, Mar-Tox and others. The various dealers can tell you about. Choose the one you prefer to use and spray. It is better to alternate the different spraying materials, but be sure and observe the recommendations.
