In the whole of district races. only one is contested. R. E. (Pepw) Blount has Cecil Barnes as his ponent for the third time.



A replica of the San Jacinto monument, the Alamo, and several maps of the United States with Texas superimposed so as to make it look bigger than all the rest combined, were much in evidence.

Ivana Pierleoni was only a few months old when her father was executed by a Nazi firing squad. His crime: He was a member of the Italian underground resist-

ance movement Today Ivana, her brother and sister, Gabriella, nine, live with their mother in one squalid room in Rome. As the widow of a resistance soldier, Ivana's mother receives a \$9 monthly governmental pension. She earns another \$62 a month by working as a charwoman in a hospital.

A total monthly income of \$71 is far from enough to keep the family going. Lunch for the Pierleoni children is soup and a crust of bread. Dinner is a few vegetables. Meat? Ivana had scarcely tasted it until a \$10 CARE food package was delivered to her home.

The Pierleonis are one of more than 200 needy cases urgently recommended for help in reports recently received at CARE's New York headquarters from its mission chiefs in Europe and Asia. Most of the cases are welfare in-



ing Tapioca Cherry Sundae Quick - cooking tapioca always makes a creamy pudding which is delightful enough in itself.

But topped with a scoop of ice cream and a generous helping of sweetened fresh cherries, it becomes an extra delicious, colorful dessert - and a perfect climax for a Fourth of July party.

Tapioca Cherry Sundae

1 egg white; 2 tablespoons sugar. 1 egg yolk; 2 cups milk; 2 or 3 tablespoons sugar; 1/8 teaspoon salt; 3 tablespoons quick-cooking tapioca; ½ teaspoon vanilla; vanilla ice cream; sweetened fresh cherries.

Beat egg white until foamy throughout; add 2 tablespoons sugar, 1 table-spoon at a time, and continue beating with rotary egg beater until mixture will stand in very soft peaks. Set

Mix egg yolk with small amount of the milk in saucepan. Add 2 or 3 tablespoons sugar, salt, quick-cooking tapioca, and remaining milk. Place over medium heat. Cook until mixture comes to a boil, stirring constant-ly. This takes 5 to 8 minutes. Pour small amount of hot mixture gradually on egg-white meringue; blend. Add remaining mixture, stirring constantly. (The hotter the tapioca and the faster it is blended in, the thicker the pudding will be.) Add vanilla. Cool, stirring once after 15 to 26 minutes. Chill. Serve tapioca cream in sherbet glasses. Top each serving with a spoonful of vanilla ice cream and sweetened fresh red cherries for sauce. Makes 4 or 5 serving


