## Our WASHINGTON Letter

**COWHAND AND THE LADY** is the title of a story last week in Life magazine which features H. C. Kelly of Blanket in Brown County. Kelly, a stock farmer, was "discovered" a year or two back and the art critics soon beat a pathway to the door of his modest farm home. Without benefit of art school or technical training, Kelly's genius began to attract attention after some of his paintings were seen by those who know good art when they see it.

The Life story has attracted considerable attention by art lovers in Washington and folks are asking for more information about Kelly's life and how it could happen that a humble man could achieve such greatness without years of intensive training.

The magazine pictures the Brown County artist as a bowlegged, 65-year-old retired cowpuncher. Last winter his exhibit in the Dallas Museum of Fine Arts attracted 850 visitors, largest opening-day attendance for a one-man show in the museum's history, according to Life. Twenty-seven of the 32 pictures had been sold before the exhibit began, and the remainder were promptly disposed of.

Brown County and West Texas can well be proud of the achievement and recognition at last being given to this great artist. There will be a lot of demand in the future for the handiwork of Blanket's H. O. Kelly.

From Fort Hood comes this news release:

Representative Blount made it clear that his name remains on the ballot, but that he is making no

more campaign speeches. "It is my feeling," he explains, "that the imminent threat of another war holds precedence and alters any personal plans that I might have for the immediate future."

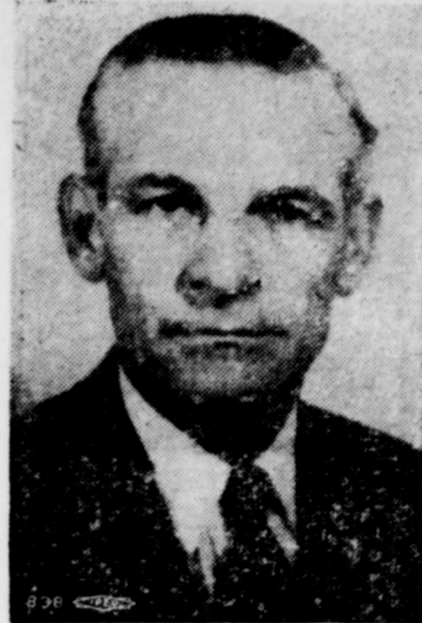

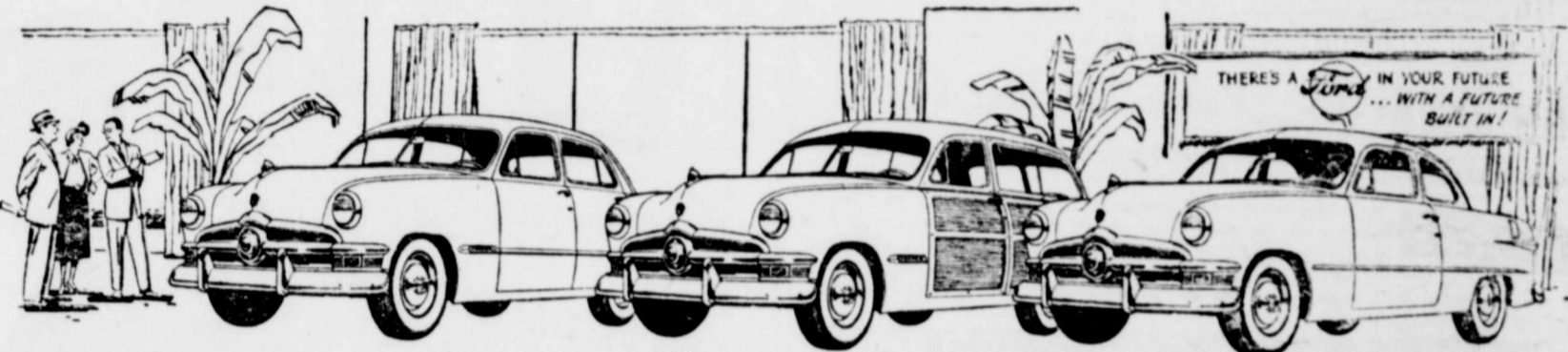

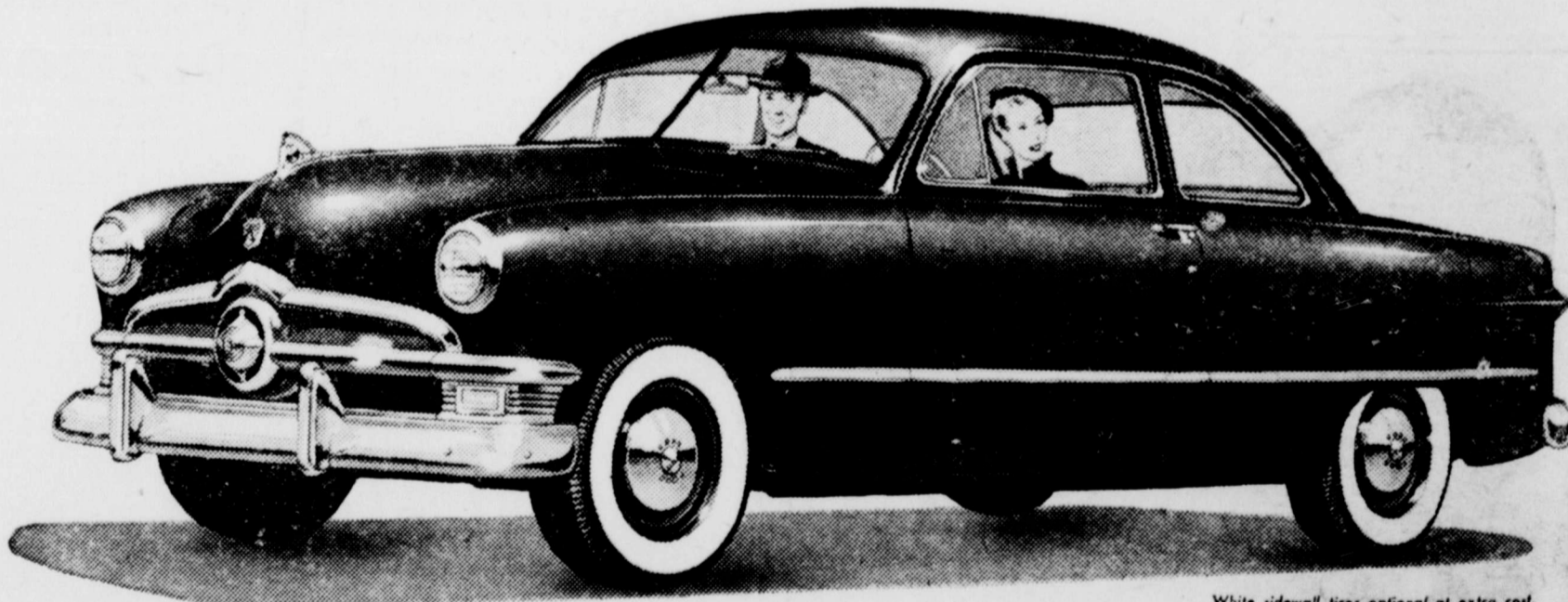

Washington, D. C.—A mild-mannered Congressman from a mighty big city is waging a patient campaign against business bigness.

The lawmaker is Emanuel Celler, a native-born New Yorker from Brooklyn. He's served in Congress since 1924, waiting a chance to run the powerful House Judiciary Committee.

When he became chairman last year, "Manny" Celler set out to fulfill an urge to overhaul the nation's anti-trust laws.

This has brought some of the nation's biggest businessmen before his group. Benjamin F. Fairless, president of U. S. Steel Corporation, largest steel-

maker, quipped a phrase due to take its place among famous sayings. Not long before he appeared before the Celler group, Mr. Fairless met a committee headed by Sen. O'Mahoney of Wyoming. As he came back to Washington to tell the Celler group about his business, Mr. Fairless wise-cracked: "I am moving from O'Mahoney's dog-house into Emanuel's celler." It always brings the laughs from his audience, and the grins around Washington from the remark make it look like a Pepsodent Toothpaste City.

Mr. Celler recalls in private conversations that during the 1920's he was "squeezed" out in a banking deal in Brooklyn by a big bank. It was many a year before he paid off his losses, he recounts.

Mr. Celler thinks the term, "monopoly," doesn't quite apply today as much as a brand new term he likes, "oligopoly." This, he explains when he sees a puzzled shadow flit over your face, means control over the price and supply.

Not all of his committee colleagues share Mr. Celler's fear of bigness. Some commended highly the remarks of Charles White, of Republic Steel Corp.

"We are a big, powerful country," he said. "We have won two big wars. We have a big standard of living. We are a big eating and a big spending country. When you hurt big business, you hurt every little business and every man, woman and child in the country."

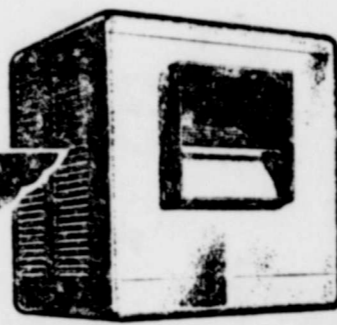
