Don't Lose Pigs Your Sows Farrow

Pigs lost before weaning rob many hog raisers of their chance to make a profit

Results, both at the Purina Re- irritate the sow's udder and make search Farm at Gray Summit, Mo., her restless. Clip them with side and on the farms of hundreds of nipping plyers and paint gums with good hog raisers in the South, show iodine to avoid infection. heavy pig losses are unnecessary when good management is followed.

At the Research Farm, approximately 75 sows are on a 2-litter-ayear farrowing schedule. They normally wean 81/2 to 9 pigs per litter. The good management practices fol-lowed so successfully there should result in low pig losses for other hog raisers, too.

First, a clean sow should be put in a clean, properly disinfected pen. Bring her in two or three days before she is due to farrow so she will be quiet and comfortable. Two, plan to

be with the sow when she farrows. Pick up

Four, unless the navel cord sluffed off at proper length, clip it back about one and one-half inches. Dip the stump in an iodine solution to minimize the danger of infection and profit-robbing ruptures.



Five, have guard rails in place As each pig comes, put it in a basket or crate. It is best not to let any pig suck until farrowing is completed. Then let the pigs nurse every 2 or 3 hours. Keep bedding dry.

Finally, keep the pigs clean and dry and don't let them chill. Where electricity is available, it is easy to make a pig brooder. You need only a light bulb, a bell-shaped reflector, and a box. Be sure to destroy the
