North Concho River Soil Bank Capital Stock **Conservation** News Column

Ranchers planning to plant native and introduced grasses next spring ought to start checking inte the availability of grass seed. Although seeding doesn't begin until warm weather next spring, getting in the form of a stock dividend, as the seed early is a pretty good idea. is the general practice. Seed is usually cheaper and there is no scarcity now as there will be at planting time. So if you plan to do any seeding, get your seed now and avoid the ruch at planting time and the increase in price. Six spreader dams and three road





Investigations by the Senate Armed Services Preparedness Subcommittee have disclosed how the Air Force paid \$63,000 to repurchase valuable equipment which had been sold by the government as surplus for \$6.89.

This was announced today by Senator Lyndon B. Johnson (D .-Texas, Chairman, who said: "Since its creation, the Senate

Armed Services Preparedness Subcommittee has devoted considerable time to efforts to halt the unwise salesale of valuable defense materials as surplus. We believe that substantial progress has been made toward establishing more prudent and more realistic policies.

"In all our investigations, however, this case of the Air Force spending \$63,000 to re-purchase equipment which had been sold by the government for \$6.00 is perhap: the most astounding case of shortsightedness that we have encountered. We hope that this incident will impress upon all agencies dealing with surplus the great necessity the Air Force Procurement office for exercising the utmost cautior and care in their transactions." 



All mail matter must be plainly and completely addressed, preferably in ink, giving street address, including apartment number, if any, or post office box or rural route and rural box number whenever possible. Mail intended for delivery in the larger cities should be addressed to include the delivery zone number when applicable. It is important that the sender's return card appear in the upper left corner of the address side. Address tags should not be used unless absolutely necessary, in which case a copy of the address and sender's return card should be placed inside the parcel for purpose of identification, if necessary. Address labels and tags should be free of any ex-



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



In fact, doubt if I could. Hands were too cold.



But it was decided before the season got underway that in case of a tie, a flip would decide the one to represent the district, AND both would be champions—co-champions that is!

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

watertight, says American Builder magazine. The fill then should be covered with 15-pound asphaltsaturated felt, which is coated with hot asphalt. The reinforced concrete placed on top of this should be 4 inches thick. American Builder says a frequent practice is to insulate floors with a 4-inch-thick layer of concrete made with vermiculite, or other lightweight aggregate, placed under the top slab. This minimizes heat loss and condensation.
