## SEVEN INDICTMENTS RETURNED BY GRAND JURY HERE

District court got underway here Monday with the convening of the grand jury at ten o'clock.

Seven men were indicted by the grand jurors. Four pleaded guilty and were sentenced by District Judge Sutton that afternoon.

Erauleo Rodriguez, 20, was given a five-year probated sentence for assault with intent to murder; Jesse Coy Martin and Robert Louis Szymarek, two years each in the penitentiary for theft of saddles; and Charles Edgar Carrell, 55, three years on probation on charges of second offense of driving while intoxicated.

Others indicted and set for trial next week are: Christopher Herrera, 23-year-old Colorado Mexican, on a charge of statutory rape of a 14-year old Latin-American girl; E. P. Sullivan and Robert Owens, each charged with passing a forged check. District Attorney Ralph Logan said Sullivan was in the state penitentiary and Owens was in a jail in Kentucky on a similar charge. Set for trial Monday are these three cases.

Also set for trial are three Hobbs, N.M. men previously indicted on a charge of burglary. They are Tim Baird, H. F. Whitley, and Otis McCreary. Their indictment arises out of a burglary of a Sterling City grocery store.

Judge Sutton granted a divorce to Eula Mae Robbins from Leo T. Robbins Monday morning. He deferred action on a similar suit in the case of Mrs. Maudine Myers until a military waiver was filed.

O.T. Jones, school superintendent of the Sterling City schools, was installed as president of the Concho Unit of the Texas State Teachers Association in a meeting at the LakeView school Monday night of this week.

Jones, superintendent here for almost ten years, has been active in state circles concerning education improvement and is well known over the state as an educator.

## Lions Club Luncheon

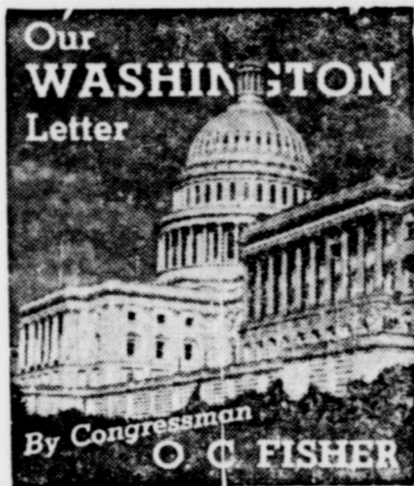

BEFORE A HUSHED AND TENSE joint session of the House and Senate, General Douglas MacArthur appeared last week to make a dramatic report to the country on his stewardship in the Pacific.

It was estimated that a million people lined the streets to cheer the Pacific hero, and around 18 million witnessed the performance on television. So, although others have had receptions somewhat comparable, none approached the total who saw and heard MacArthur because television is of recent origin.

Mrs. MacArthur, dressed in blue with a white orchid given her by the Tennessee DAR, of which she is a member, preceded the General into the House. She sat in a gallery seat, looked down on the Senators and military attaches as they were announced. Then at exactly 12:30 the arrival of MacArthur was announced amid a tumult of cheers and applause. He spoke for 35 minutes.

This occasion was reminiscent of the other returning heroes of the war—Eisenhower, Nimitz, Bradley, Clay and Wainwright. Each of them were received in Washington when victory was fresh and gratitude was abundant. It is difficult to pick out any one and say he was received with the most enthusiasm, but the post-war triumphal entry of Admiral Nimitz into the Capitol will be recalled for generations. It was probably the most grandiose of all history, and this is no reflection on the others.

The MacArthur message was firm, dramatic and challenging. He defended his belief that Chinese bases in Manchuria should be bombed, that Formosa must be defended, that Chinese Nationalists on Formosa should be aided and encouraged, and that an effective naval blockade be thrown around the Chinese Coast.

The speech has set the stage for House and Senate committee hearings on the over-all Far Eastern policies. The General himself will have a chance to detail his plans and his strategic concepts in meeting the global challenge of Communist aggression.

THE MORALE OF TROOPS in Korea is running high these days. At least that is true with the 5th Marine Division now engaged in the vicinity of Hongchon, according to a letter I just received from my former secretary, Lt. Latham Ables of Brownwood. He was a Marine reservist and was recalled last August.

"I landed in Korea on February 16 (my birthday)" he reported, "and was assigned to 'B' company, 5th Marines. Upon reporting in I was given command of a rifle platoon and told that we were moving up in the attack . . .

"Our movement toward the 38th parallel has been slow and cautious in accordance with General Ridgeway's policy of keeping the line in-

## "Covering the County"

This is a warning to all auto drivers that park around the county courthouse. Levi Martin has been trying to get grass established on the lawn and he needs your help. It is rather hard to establish and produce a pretty lawn in this dry country.

If you park on a runner of bermuda grass and Levi sees it, he will give you a big red ticket as a reminder to keep off the grass. When you get two tickets you have to mow the entire lawn once. If you get three tickets, you have to mow it twice. Also Levi is cranky about his lawn mowers too. He has a big mower run by an engine. From the way he talks the grass stomper-outs will have to use the old push type mower without any grease.

Let us all help Levi by not parking cars on grass or cutting corners when walking to and from the courthouse.

The cattle insecticide supply may be limited for some of our better sprays this year. Toxaphene, our best all-around livestock spray, is in low supply. Only early season prayers will be able to use toxaphene. As you know toxaphene is refined from pine knots. The report is that there will be enough DDT; BHC; Chlordane and Methoxychlor, and all are good insecticides when used properly. All insecticides are toxic when used in excessive amounts. Use according to directions.

To get the best results for lice control spray twice at 14 day intervals. Usually one good wetting of DDT or BHC will kill lice, but the two sprayings are a sure shot. BHC appears to be the better for lice control. BHC should be used in combination with some other insecticide as it does not have a very long lasting effect. Lindane, derived from BHC, does have a long lasting effect. Rotenone is good for lice, but it takes two sprayings at 14 day intervals.

For control of ear ticks, BHC in pine oil seems to give excellent results. This mixture can be used with a squirt can. It is less messy than stock 1029. It takes about 1 oz. of liquid per animal to get best results. Stock 1029 should also be used 1 oz. per head.

For screw worm control EQ335 appears to be one of the best. EQ-335 can be bought in both the smear and liquid types. Use EQ335 according to directions as you put as much percent BHC on the wound as you would if it were mixed at .03% and sprayed over the entire body.

**KITCHEN MEMO**

**G**REAT grandmother was right when she fed her family old fashioned Molasses Pie for the iron and calcium in molasses are important daily needs in anybody's diet. Combine 4 slightly beaten eggs, 3/4 cup molasses, 1 cup corn syrup, 1/4 tsp. salt, 1 tsp. vanilla, 1 cup melted butter or margarine. Mix well and pour into a 9-inch unbaked pie crust. Bake 35 mins. in a gas oven set at 350° F. For Molasses-Pecan Pie, add 1 cup chopped pecans to mixture before pouring into pie crust.

Grease may splash onto the wall behind your range. Cut a sheet of plastic to fasten on the wall. Then a quick wipe with a soapy cloth will keep it clean.

Quilted coverlets are precious possessions and need to be washed and dried with care. The sagging weight of a wet coverlet causes uneven drying on the line and distorts its shape. If you haven't an automatic gas dryer, borrow the use of one for drying your coverlets. Set the dial at high temperature to completely dry for 20 to 25 minutes and the coverlet will be soft, fluffy and perfectly shaped.

To prevent the flowerettes from breaking off as you lift cauliflower from the pan, put the vegetable into a clean cloth tied to form a bag. Cook, of course, over a low gentle simmer flame.

Spill your pins and needles? A dime-store magnet in your sewing box will pick them up in a flash.

If food is burned on the bottom of a pan, soak with baking soda and water overnight. When you're in a hurry to use the pan, bring cold water and soda to a boil over a high flame until burned residue falls off.

**"VIRUSES"**

"I guess I've got a virus" seems to be the by-word these days for any degree of ailment from an intestinal upset to complete prostration. Your guess on viruses isn't as good as your doctor's; where viruses are concerned, he does sometimes have to guess but he knows more about what he's guessing at, even as elusive as viruses are.

Those viruses that can be pinned down aren't a guessing matter, however. The virus that causes dengue fever is carried by mosquitoes in warm climates and can be traced in its spread. The mosquito picks it up by biting someone who is going through the first three days of the fever; eight days later the mosquito is capable of injecting the dengue fever virus into whomever he bites.

Dengue fever is also known as breakbone fever, which term aptly describes the aching muscles and feeling of breaking bones when you have it. The germ incubates after the mosquito bite for three to 15 days before those bad aches start up along with headaches and eye pains. You do feel very sick and you usually need no encouragement to go to bed, particularly since the fever may shoot up as high as 106 degrees and you break out with a rash over the neck, shoulders, face and body.

If you don't go to bed at that point, one of the peculiarities of the disease is the stiff, rigid walk you affect like putting on air; in fact, that has led to one of the popular names of the disease, dandy fever, walking like a dandy.

After that first bout of fever suddenly drops, you may feel somewhat better until five or six days later when the fever shoots up again and the rash breaks out this time on the hands, arms, and legs.

About the only good thing that can be said of dengue fever is that even as bad as the disease makes you feel and as long as it takes to get to feeling good again after the disease is over, dengue fever seldom ever leads to the development of some other disease, some complication.

Now the flu is entirely different.

It can get awfully complicated. Everything about the flu is complicated, in fact. If all the viruses got together and conducted a poll on which one of their number is the one most likely to succeed in creating disturbances in human beings, there's no doubt that the flu would win by many noses.

The flu isn't just one brand of diseases but many different kinds, some of which are known and some of which aren't. It can change itself into all kinds of different manifestations; all of which are guaranteed to make you sick.

Bedrest and liquids to drink should be the first actions when you think you've got the flu. For the headache that may accompany the flu, the cough that's frequently a part of the picture, and the general feeling of meanness that's nearly always present, your doctor can prescribe medications that will

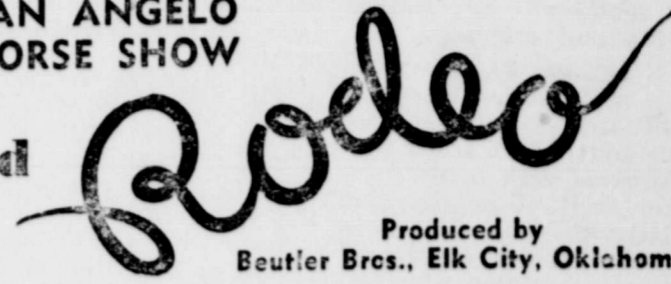

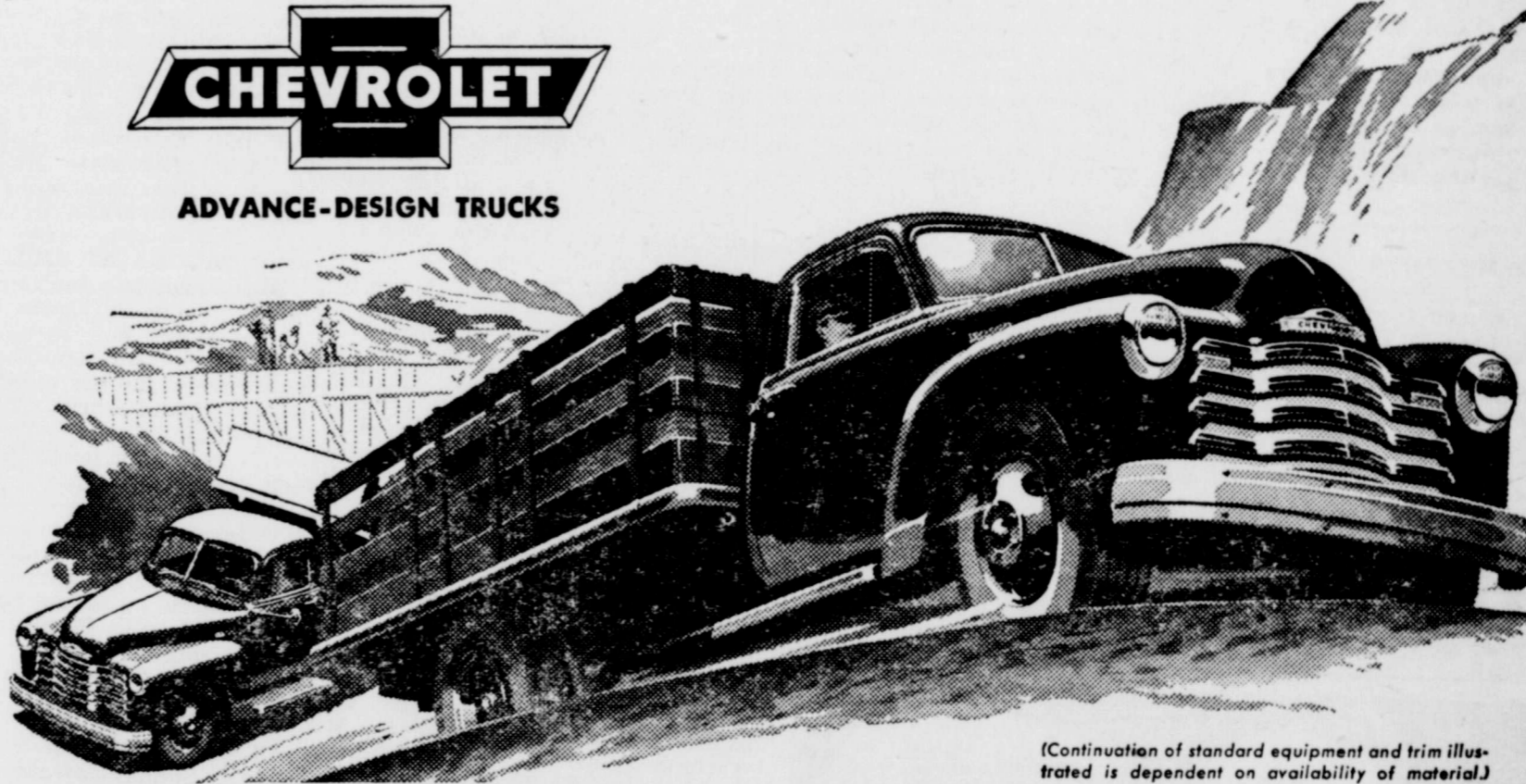

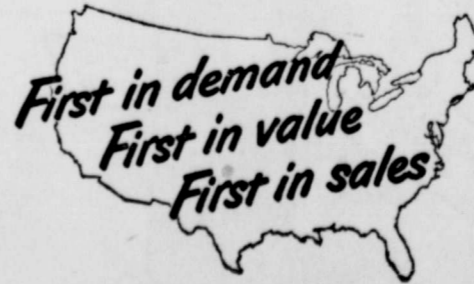

(Continued from Preceding Page) make you more comfortable and easier to get along with until the virus runs its course.

Without rest in bed you are running a risk of complications with the flu, not to mention the fact that you are spreading it to others.

The measles is also one of the "to bed, to bed" virus diseases because of the danger of complications. The real measles, known as the 14-day variety, opens the way to other infections because it lowers the resistance of the body.

Measles spread fast. The virus is coughed around and about 10 days later the symptoms of a cold start up, followed in a day or two by white spots surrounded by red rings along the inside of the cheeks next to the jaw teeth.

There's usually fever and hurting eyes about that time, both of which get worse until in three or four more days the eruption breaks out. The eruption starts around the head, there at the headline and behind the ears, and then moves down the body. That's the sickest period of the measles. After the whole body is broken out, the fever and

the sickness let up until they both fade out.

In all, measles runs about a 14-day course and one case is supposed to make you immune though it evidently doesn't always do so.

The German measles is the three day variety and is much less serious than the 14-day brand as far as possible complications are concerned. It would seem that the three-day measles is just a minor disease were it not for the evidence that it can harm an expected baby when the mother catches the disease during the first three months of pregnancy.

Because of that one possibility of disaster with German measles, doctors firmly state that all girls should have the German measles before they reach the age of child bearing. One case of German measles nearly always keeps you from getting it again so that is one disease from which it is not best to shield a healthy little girl.

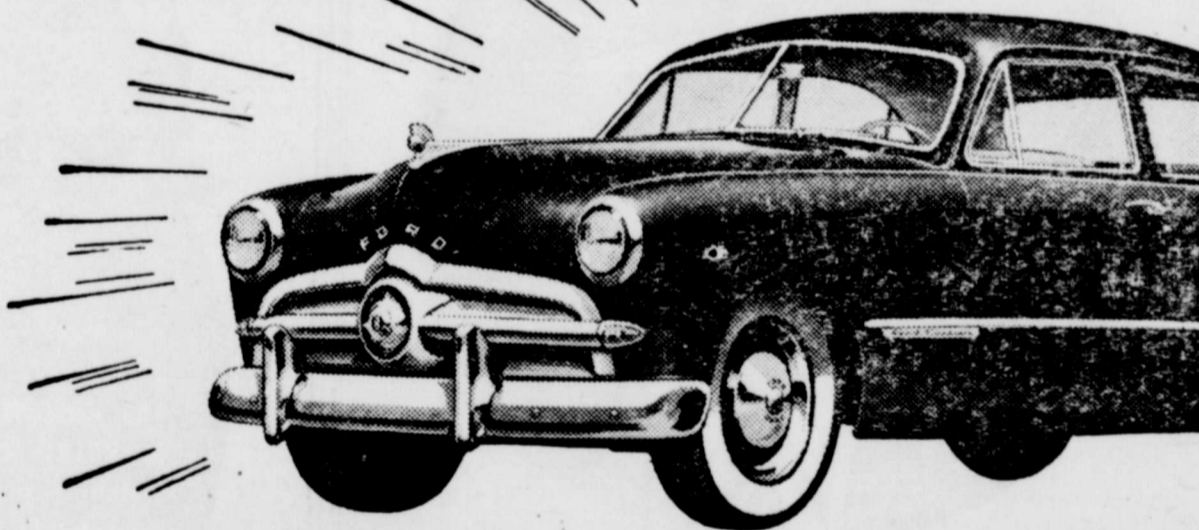
