## Rheumatic Fever

When you approach a highway sign saying "Road repairs ahead, drive slowly", you automatically reduce your speed and watch out for the hazards which may be present along the route. Sometimes you find only minor repairs going on, sometimes you find the going really rough; but if the hazards along that highway are too great for travel, the sign will be "Detour," and you find yourself on an auxiliary road until the highway is in sufficiently good shape for regular traffic again.

In medical terms, rheumatic fever fits more closely, perhaps, than any other infectious disease into the "proceed with caution" category of road repairs. Most other diseases due to infectious agents will immediately send you on a detour, sometimes brief and sometimes crooked and rough, but rheumatic fever may assume so many different manifestations, affecting so many different parts of the body, that the road ahead isn't always clear.

At best, rheumatic fever means a long period of careful watching for hazards that may suddenly appear. One slight attack never means that the germ has been whipped; it only means the germ or germs may come back at any time with renewed fervor.

Medical science has not yet discovered what causes rheumatic fever, the disease that strikes most often at 4 to 15 year-olds but may appear at practically any age. There are many theories as to the possible onset of the first attack of the disease but none hold true in the majority of cases and research goes on to try to unravel the secret.

After the first attack, the one or many following attacks of the disease seem to be linked with streptococcal infections in the nose or throat, so that only recently doctors have found in many cases they can prevent those infections by constant dosage with sulfa drugs and avoid the second and third attacks. Such is the nature of the disease that the damage it can do seems to become greater with each attack.

If rheumatic fever could be easily recognized, it wouldn't be possible for the disease to do so much harm in the first place. Growing pains such as aching joints are supposedly the most common symptom of rheumatic fever, but even this signal of disease is not always present. The aches are present, shifting from different parts of the body in what is called a migratory arthritis, when the millions of strings that hold you together are affected by the spread of the disease through the body. These strings, such as ligaments and tendons and the like, swell and fail to function properly because the fluids that keep them pliable change from their natural state into a harder, stringy mass. Sometimes these "masses" can be seen as little knobs around the joints that hurt; they last a few days then disappear, possibly showing up again in another joint that is painful.

Though the pain of such affected joints may be quite intense, it is not the joints which are permanently damaged as a result of the acute attacks of rheumatic fever; the heart is the most likely spot to be damaged permanently.

Practically any part of that very complex heart organ may be affected, but most often the damage is inside the heart, to the valves which shut off the flow of blood through the chambers of the heart. The name, rheumatic endocarditis, means an inflammation of the inside of the heart due to rheumatic fever.

The usual pattern of heart damage is something like this:

The left side of the heart, which receives blood purified by the lungs has two trap doors which close off as the two chambers of the left

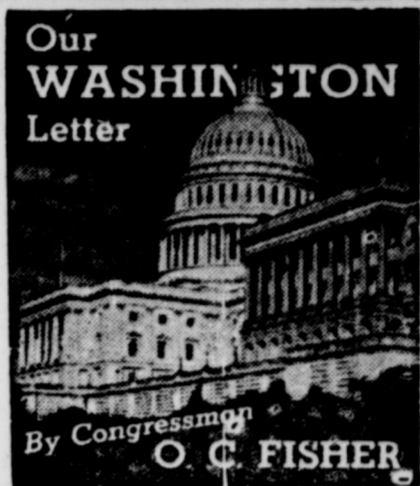

side of the heart are filled. When the first chamber sends the blood into the second part, one of the trap doors closes and shuts off the supply. In rheumatic fever, there are frequently long-stemmed warts which develop on the edges of those trap doors which keep them from closing properly, permitting the blood to still seep seep through into the other chamber. Your doctor can hear the sound of that leak of blood, he knows which trap door is most likely to be affected, and from other signs of changes in the body he can tell whether it was due to rheumatic fever or to something else.

As the acute phase of rheumatic fever disappears, those wart-like growths usually shrink into that trap door, permanently changing the shape of the flap and throwing it out of shape. With new attacks of the disease, the flap gets more and more out of shape until it may become so deformed as to not function at all.

This is one of the pictures of rheumatic fever though there are many other paths it may cut and create serious damage. Since it may progress through the body so slowly that its presence is not made evident, the regular health check-up for all youngsters should by all means be continued through teen age. A doctor who checks your child regularly will know if any change in the child may be a signal of rheumatic fever.

There is nothing specific, aside from the general rules of good health, that you can do to keep a child from having rheumatic fever. But there is much your doctor can do to prevent its making an invalid of your child by early detection of the signs and heeding the warning. "Road repairs ahead, drive slowly."



IN A HISTORIC DECISION, the Supreme Court last week upheld the conviction of the 11 Communist leaders for conspiracy to overthrow the United States government. Heretofore there has been constant confusion regarding the legal status of American communists and what could be done about them without bumping into constitutional road blocks.

The opinion written by the Supreme Court does not make it illegal for a person to be a member of the Communist party, but it does make it a violation for such party members to conspire together by words and deeds with a design to overthrow the government by force or violence.

Heretofore the courts have been hampered by some Supreme Court decisions regarding the rights of individuals who were communists. Only a few years ago an attempt was made to deport Harry Bridges, the West Coast left-wing labor leader on the ground that he was an undesirable alien. A tremendous amount of evidence was collected pointing to his communist status, and the Attorney General ordered him sent back to his native Australia. But the Supreme Court nullified the order and Bridges was released, much to the elation of the CIO and other organizations that fought to keep him here.

Bridges was then given citizenship. But two years ago, as a result of a collection of incriminating evidence collected by Congressional committees and from other sources, the Department of Justice obtained an indictment against Bridges for perjury, claiming he lied when he swore he was not a Communist at the time his citizenship was granted. A jury convicted him and the case is now on appeal.

AN UNFORTUNATE THING about the case of the eleven Communists is the very low penalties meted out to them. Their prison sentences were up to five years and fines of \$10,000 to each. They should be executed or put away for life. I plan to introduce a bill to provide much higher penalties for such treasonable acts when and if others are convicted in the future.

The effect of the Supreme Court ruling should be very helpful in future prosecutions of this character. It will put the fear of God in every communist who collaborates with his fellow-travelers to destroy our government. And it will discourage the millions of Communist sympathizers who blather about civil rights and constitutional rights every time a communist is flushed out of cover and his treasonable plans are exposed.

**HOME OWNERS QUESTION BOX**

**Q**—My kitchen sink edge is covered with aluminum, and when I stand against it my apron and dress front gets black. How can this be prevented?

**A**—Liquid wax, applied periodically, is recommended. If clothing still becomes discolored from contact with the sink edge, you might try roughing up the aluminum with steel wool and then applying shellac.

**Q**—I have been unable to find a small leak in my roof. How can I locate it?

**A**—Examine the under side of the roof in bright daylight. When you find the spot where light shows through, put a piece of wire or a sliver of wood through the hole so it can be located from outside. If your roof is worn, however, other leaks can be expected to develop shortly and it would be economical to put on a new roof rather than to attempt to patch the old one. Asphalt shingles usually can be applied right over the old roofing material.

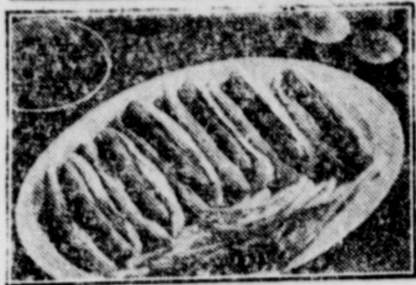
**Q**—Some of the windows in my home are difficult to open and then, once opened, require considerable effort to close. What causes this, and how can the condition be overcome?

**A**—There are several causes of sticking windows. Hardened paint in the grooves in which the window slides may be responsible, and swelling of the sashes or parts of the grooves is another cause. The sash can be made to slide more easily, however, by rubbing paraffin on the grooves.

**Barbecued Frankfurters**

- 1/2 teaspoon pepper
- 4 teaspoons sugar
- 1 teaspoon mustard
- 4 teaspoons Worcestershire Sauce
- 1/2 cup catsup
- 3 teaspoons vinegar

To make sauce, melt butter; add chopped onion and cook until clear. Add all seasonings, sugar and vinegar. With a sharp knife cut 3-inch slit in each frankfurter. Place frankfurters in flat baking pan, slit side up. Pour sauce over all and bake in (350° F.) oven for 20 minutes. Baste frequently. Place frankfurters in split, toasted, buttered buns; garnish with fresh green onions; serve extra sauce separately. Serves 6.

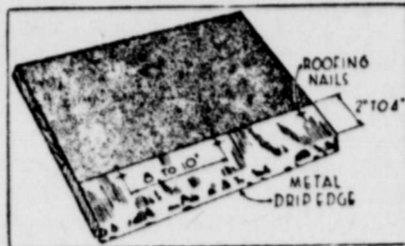

**HOW TO DO IT**

**Drip Edge Blocks Water**

The eaves of a roof can be given extra protection from the weather by application of a metal



drip edge, which keeps water from backing up under the shingle tabs at the edge of the roof deck. As recommended for asphalt shingles, the most widely used roofing material for homes, the metal drip edge is made of corrosion-resistant 26 gauge sheet metal Galvanized steel, painted on both sides, ordinarily is used. The drip edge should extend back 2 to 4 inches over the roof and should be bent down over the eaves far enough to cover the edges of the roof deck sheathing. Nails, placed as shown in the drawing, are spaced 8 to 10 inches apart. Metal drip edges of this kind also should be used to protect a roof at the rakes.

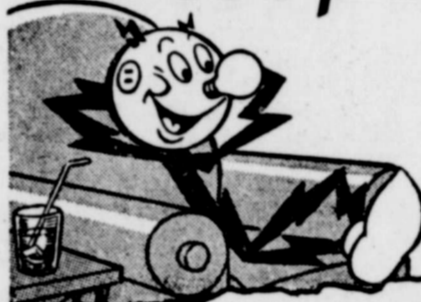

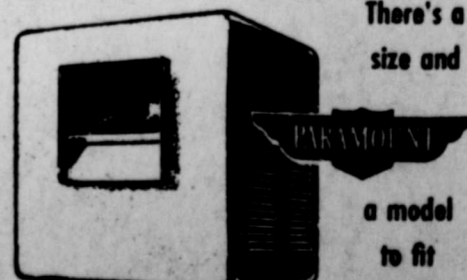

## Hardwood Veneer Cut Thin To Reveal Beauty of Grain

The attractive wood grain patterns found in hardwood veneer are made possible by the thinness of each veneer sheet. The effects achieved cannot be duplicated in thick, solid wood.

After sheets of veneer are sliced from a log, they are kept in order. Each piece of wood retains the same position it had in the living tree. A stack of veneer sheets is comparable to a loaf of sliced

bread. The standard thickness of veneers is only 1/28 inch. Successive sheets are virtually identical in grain figure. When the sheets later are placed side by side in the manufacture of hardwood plywood, the grain of one sheet matches the grain of adjacent sheets. Symmetrical patterns are created.

The U. S. Department of Commerce says: "Owing to the wide diversity of figure types and to the fact that adjacent veneers from the same log (piece of log from which veneers are cut) can be matched to make symmetrical designs, there is hardly any limitation to the variety of patterns which can be produced."

The art of matching veneers has been developed to such a high degree of perfection that the well-informed designer may obtain almost any desired effect and may realize the full value of every wood. Thus, the exquisite wood panels of modern homes, radio and television cabinets, or fine furniture, which we enjoy, are achieved.

"In the process of matching, the veneers may have to be squared, or clipped at an angle, or cut into a number of small segments, or treated in some other manner, depending upon the result desired. Since each sheet carries a pattern almost identical to that of the sheet next to it, they must all be cut in exactly the same place."

"Sometimes a third, a half, or in rare cases only a fourth of each sheet of veneer can be used, merely because only a small portion of its pattern would help form the perfect design needed for a beautifully matched table top or dresser front."

Despite the thinness of hardwood veneer, in its final form it is stronger than solid wood. The reason for this is that sheets of veneer are combined into hardwood plywood. Full resistance to splitting and warping is a characteristic of hardwood plywood's cross-grain construction.

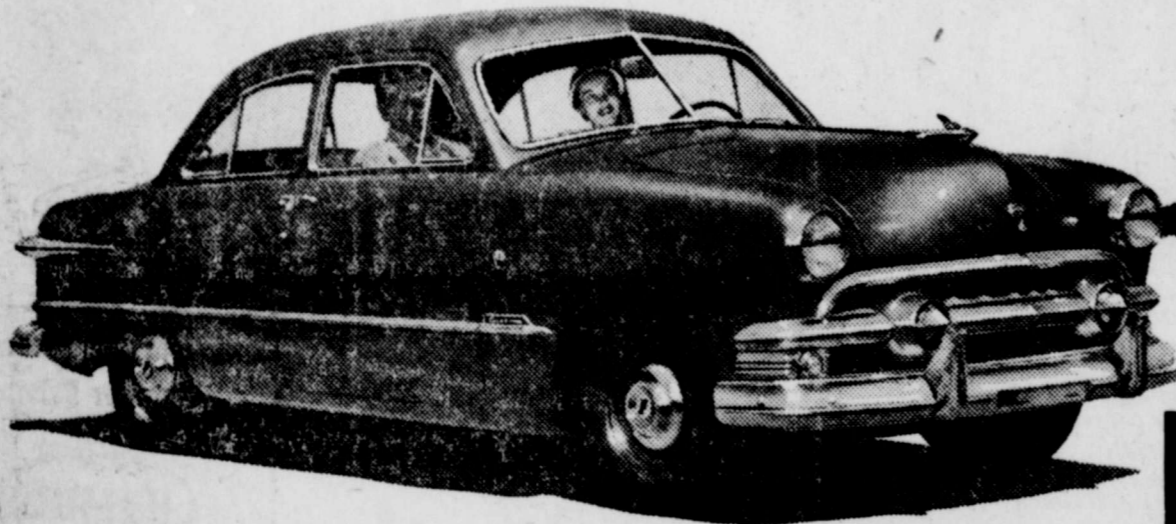

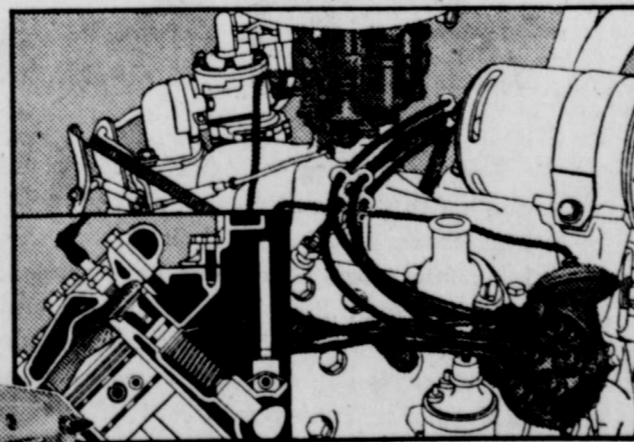
