### Still Room for Improvement

COLLEGE STATION, August 15 —Farmers and others interested in long time improvement of agriculture are urged to take part in the meetings now being held throughout the state for the purpose of reviewing the programs and policies of the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

County Agricultural Mobilization Committees are in charge of the meetings and discussions in the counties. Membership on these committees is composed of representatives from state and federal agencies who work with rural families. Officials of the USDA point out that the population of the nation is growing steadily and by the end of the century is expected to be near 200 million, or approximately double the 1900 total. Then, too, most of the country's arable land already is under cultivation and the extra food and fiber needed to feed a clothe the growing population must come from increased acreage yields and more efficient production.

This increased agricultural production must come from the family farms for they make up almost 98 percent of the Nation's total. These are the farms which are operated by family units and supply the bulke of the family's income with the family providing most of the labor needed on the farm.

It is the family farm operators and their families, therefore, that are now being asked to make suggestions for improving the services and programs of the USDA. The best suggestions for dealing with local farm problems come from local farmers and all are urged to attend and participate in the meetings being called in the communities. The recommendations from these meetings and discussions may form the basis for improved farm programs and assurances to the millions that America's family farms can provide the nation's future needs of food and fiber.

## Range Management Contest Winners

Delmar Radde and Clinton Hodges took the two first place \$50 prizes for their respective groups at the Range Management Contest here last Saturday. The event was sponsored by the North Concho River Soil Conservation District Board of Supervisors.

For 12 months the boys kept detailed records on specific range sites, measuring their improvement or decline, testing moisture penetration and studying grasses native to their region.

The records they kept were the most important point in judging their scorings. A final grass identification contest Saturday wound up the year's work.

### Winners Announced

Delmar Radde was first place winner in the first-year contest. Second was Charles Probandt who got a \$40 prize. The boys points were 556 and 524 points respectively, out of a possible 700.

The second year boys, who were in the contest last year, were headed by Clinton Hodges, with 573 points for the \$50 prize. Larry Glass followed with 569 points and a \$40 prize. The other two were Henry Bliznak, 530 points and \$30, and Billy Humble, 488 points and \$20.

The Field Day was held on the Concho River at the Foster & Hildebrand Ranch. Tom Humble's Rio Concho Ranch served barbecue to the crowd.

### Cover Crop Factor

Demonstrating the importance of good grass cover on range for best utilization of rain, the group dug holes in two spots only a few feet apart. One, on bare ground, showed moisture to have penetrated only two inches from Friday night's rain of more than one inch. The other, on ground covered by thick grass, showed penetration of six inches.

Despite Friday night's rain, ground in bare spots was already dry by noon Saturday. Under grass, however, it was still damp on top.

Judges of the contest were Joe Johnston, assistant Runnels County farm agent; Forrest Runge of Christoval, member of the board of supervisors of the Eldorado-Divide Soil Conservation District; and E. J. Hughes, Assistant State Soil Conservationist, now at Temple.

## Our WASHINGTON Letter



WITH THE TEMPO of the preparedness program gaining momentum, the House last week voted the largest peace-time appropriation of funds for the national defense in American history. The figure for this fiscal year is \$56 billion, and there is more to come. An additional \$4½ billion will soon be provided for land acquisition, activation and reactivation of training camps over the nation and around the world. In addition, there is the request for some \$7 billion for helping arm the Atlantic Pact armies.

So we are faced with the problem of national defense on the one hand and of national solvency on the other.

In terms of actual expenditure, it is estimated that we will spend about \$39 billion during the current fiscal year as compared with \$19 billion in the last year. Commitments for additional procurement contracts are expected.

By way of a brief break-down, it may be of interest to note that of the vast amount to be spent this year 49% will be for major procurement and production; operation and maintenance calls for 20%; military personnel for about 17%; acquisition of land and construction 8% research and development, 3%.

The program is to be built around a 3½ million-man armed force, including about 1,550,000 in the Army, 800,000 in the Navy, with 1,162 ships; 175,000 in the Marine Corps; and an Air Force of about 1,061,000 working toward a goal of 95 wings. About 1,400,000 civilian personnel will support this expansion, a reduction of about 75,000 under military requests.

Roughly, \$30 billion will be spent during the year for procurement of planes, ships, tanks, artillery, ammunition and guided missiles. A billion and a half will be expended for research and development in the race for better and improved warming equipment.

THE BIG PROBLEM now will be for the Congress to ferret out waste and extravagance and through committee investigations to keep a close watch on just how the money is spent in an attempt to protect this gigantic investment by the taxpayers in the future defense and security of the nation.

Stationed in the San Antonio office, Mr. Coulter was called to Washington for a two weeks training course. Other visitors have included Ralph P. Mayer, son of the Edwin Mayers of Sonora. Stationed at Westover AFB in Massachusetts, Ralph spent a few days leave in Washington. While here he visited with Walter McCabe, formerly of San Angelo. The latter, a son of Lt. Col. Chas. Dwight McCabe, is a veteran of the recent conflict and spent three years in intelligence service in Berlin at the end of the war. He talks the Russian language, and took an important part in contacts with the Russians in the German capital as well as with those in the Eastern Zone. His father, Col. 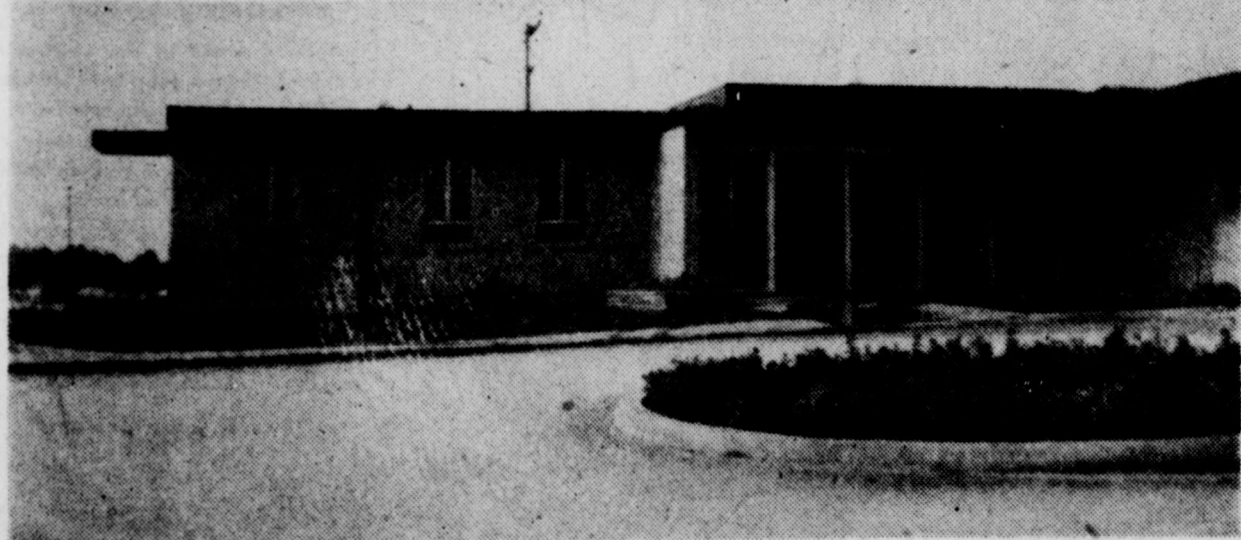

The formal opening and dedication of the new Sterling County Hospital has been set for Sunday afternoon, from 2 to 5 p.m. Such has been announced by the hospital board of directors and the administrator. A short dedication ceremony will be held at 2 o'clock and the remainder of the afternoon will be taken up in showing visitors through the new plant, it was said. Invitations were mailed to out-of-town doctors, former residents, and other interested people. No invitations were mailed to local citi-

zens, as the announcement of the formal opening in the News-Record was considered sufficient as an invitation. All are welcome and urged to visit the hospital from 2 to 5.

Costing around \$180,000, the hospital has twelve beds. Included in the plant proper are locker rooms, storage rooms, kitchen, pantry X-ray room, developing room, laboratory room, doctor's lounge, doctor's laboratory room, delivery room, operating room, emergency room, fracture room, nursery, dining room, 6 double patient rooms, drug room, business office, nurses station, lobby or lounge room, rest room for

general public, isolation room, nurses lounge room, and the usual service rooms and boiler room.

The lawn has been sodded with St. Augustine grass and trees and shrubs have been set. Flowers grace the entrance parkway.

The whole hospital plant is one of modernity, utility and convenience. It has to be seen to be appreciated. Visit the new plant on open house day.

Members of the hospital board include Rufus W. Foster, chairman, H. L. Hildebrand, secretary, and Foster Sims Price, Worth B. Durham, E. L. Bailey and Dr. W. J. Swann.



**LEGAL NOTICES  
HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION  
NO. 6**

Proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas amending Article III, Section 51a, providing that the Legislature shall have the power to provide assistance to and provide for the payment of same to residents of the State of Texas who are needy aged persons over the age of sixty-five (65) years, needy blind persons over the age of sixteen (16) years removing the Thirty-five Million Dollars (\$35,000,000) limitation upon expenditures for such purposes and providing for a limitation of Forty-two Million Dollars (\$42,000,000) upon such expenditures; providing a maximum payment of Thirty Dollars (\$30) per month from State funds for old age assistance; prohibiting payment or assistance after disposition of property under certain conditions; providing for the acceptance of financial aid from the Government of the United States of America for such assistance; providing that the payment of such from State funds shall never exceed the payments from Federal funds; providing for the necessary election, and providing for the form of ballot, proclamation and publication.

**Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:**

**Section 1.** That Section 51a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended, and the same is hereby amended so that the same shall hereafter read as follows:

"Section 51a. The Legislature shall have the power, by general laws to provide, subject to limitations and restrictions herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions, and regulations as may be by the Legislature be deemed expedient for assistance to, and for the payment of assistance to:

"(1) Needy aged persons who are over the age of sixty-five (65) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any State-supported institution, while such inmate; and provided that any resident of the State, if otherwise eligible, may not be excluded who has resided in the State for five (5) years during the nine (9) years

immediately preceding the filing of the application for assistance including the one (1) year continuously immediately preceding the filing of such application provided that the maximum payment per month from State funds shall not be more than Thirty Dollars (\$30) per month.

"Any applicant for or recipient of assistance, including the spouse in each instance, who shall dispose of any property after June 1, 1952, and any person who initially applies for assistance after June 1, 1957, who has disposed of any property within five (5) years prior to the date of application, shall be ineligible to receive assistance; provided, that if such property was disposed of by bona fide sale and conveyance, and for value commensurate with the actual market value thereof, such disposition shall not affect eligibility for assistance if it be shown that all proceeds from such sale have been used by such person and spouse for normal living expenses, or for the purchase of other real property of like value. If any recipient of assistance or spouse shall sell any real property, neither such recipient nor spouse shall thereafter receive assistance until all net proceeds of such sale have been expended for normal living expenses; and in case of disposition of such property by gifts or for an amount less than its actual market value, such person and spouse shall not thereafter receive assistance until the expiration of the period of time during which the net proceeds of said sale would have paid their normal living expenses had the actual market value been realized therefrom.

"(2) Needy blind persons who are over the age of sixteen (16) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any State-supported institution, while such inmate; and provided that any resident of the State, if otherwise eligible, may not be excluded who has resided in the State for five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the filing of the application for such assistance including the one (1) year continuously immediately preceding the filing of such application.

"(3) Needy children who are under the age of sixteen (16) years; provided that any child, if otherwise eligible, may not be excluded who has resided in the State for one (1) year immediately preceding the filing of the application for such assistance, or, if said child is under the age of one (1) year, whose parent or other relative with whom the child is living has resided in the State for one (1) year immediately preceding the birth of such child.

"The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Federal Government of the United States such financial aid for the assistance of the needy aged, needy blind, and needy children as such Government may offer not inconsistent with restrictions herein set forth; provided, however, that the amount of such assistance out of State funds to each person assisted shall never exceed the amount so expended out of Federal funds; and provided further that the total amount of money to be expended out of State funds for such assistance to the needy aged, needy blind and needy children shall never exceed the sum of Forty-two Million Dollars (\$42,000,000) per year.

"Should the Legislature enact en-

abling laws and provide an additional appropriation hereto in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment, such Acts shall not be invalid by reason of their anticipatory character."

**Sec. 2.** The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of Texas at the Election to be held through out the State of Texas on the second Tuesday in November, 1951, at which election there shall be printed on such ballot the following clause:

"FOR the amendment to the Constitution giving the Legislature power to set up a system of payments of assistance to needy persons over sixty-five (65) years of age; to needy blind persons over the age of sixteen (16) years; to needy children under sixteen (16) years of age; removing the Thirty-five Million Dollar (\$35,000,000) limitation upon the amount of State expenditures for such purposes; disqualifying persons who dispose of property under certain conditions; providing a maximum payment of Thirty Dollars (\$30) per month from State funds for old age assistance; providing for the acceptance and expenditure of funds from the Federal Government; providing that expenditures from State funds shall not exceed the expenditure from Federal funds with respect to any individual; and providing conditions as to residence within the State in order to be eligible to receive assistance; and providing a limitation of Forty-two Million Dollars (\$42,000,000) per year on State Fund expenditures for such purpose each year."

**Sec. 3.** The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published and held as required by the Constitution and Laws of the State of Texas.

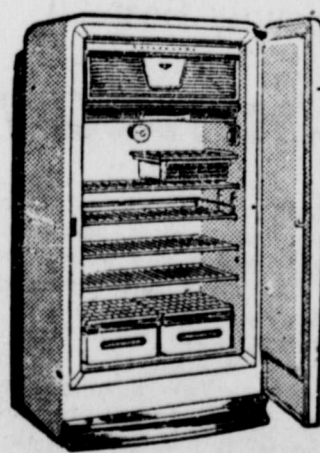

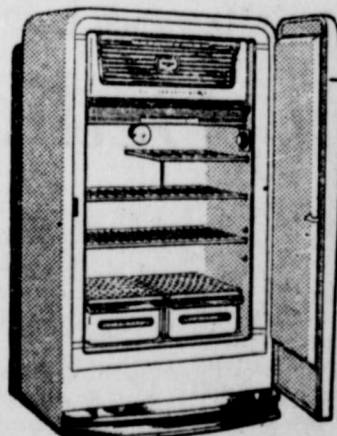

Jan Dockins, of Hollywood, Md., points to a permanent front tooth that was saved by a unique dental procedure. The 8-year-old fell on the sidewalk and an incisor tooth was pushed up into the jaw, almost out of sight. The dentist to whom he was rushed, decided to attempt saving the tooth by replantation, a difficult procedure. He removed the uninjured tooth, and while it soaked in aureomycin, the socket was cleaned. The dentist held the tooth in place for 20 minutes while a temporary blood clot formed. Jan's parents then held the tooth in place for 10 hours. At last report, the tooth was firmly in place and serving Jan well. An important factor in the success of such a procedure, is that aureomycin, an antibiotic drug, is effective against many bacteria found in such a wound and at the same time, is not harmful to tissue cells.

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 37**

proposing an Amendment to Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new section after Section 11 thereof to be designated as Section 11a, providing for the investment of the Permanent University Fund in additional securities to those now enumerated in Section 11 of Article VII of the State of Texas providing for the necessary proclamation and publication, and calling of an election therefor.

**Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:**

**Section 1.** That Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas shall be amended by adding after Section 11 thereof a new section to be designated Section 11a, which shall read as follows:

**"Section 11a.** In addition to the bonds now enumerated in Section 11 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas, the Permanent University Fund may be invested in such other securities, including bonds, preferred stocks, and common stocks, as the Board of Regents of the University of Texas may deem to be proper investment for said fund; provided, however, that not more than fifty per cent (50%) of the said fund shall be invested at any given time in stocks, nor shall more than one per cent (1%) of the said fund be invested in securities issued by any one (1) corporation, nor shall more than five per cent (5%) of the voting stock of any one (1) corporation be owned; and provided further that stocks eligible for purchase shall be restricted to stocks of companies incorporated within the United States which have paid dividends for ten (10) consecutive years or longer immediately prior to the date of purchase and which, except for bank stocks and insurance stocks, are listed upon an exchange registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission or its successors. This amendment shall be self-enacting."

**Sec. 2.** The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held throughout the State on the second Tuesday in November, 1951, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

**"FOR the Constitutional Amendment** providing for the investment of the Permanent University Fund in additional securities to those now enumerated in Section 11 of Article VII of the Constitution"; and

**AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment** providing for the investment of the Permanent University Fund in additional securities to those now enumerated in Section 11 of Article VII of the Constitution."

**Sec. 3.** The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. The expense of publication and election for such Amendment shall be paid out of the proper appropriation made by law.

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 22**

proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of Texas by adding to Article XVI thereof a new Section to be numbered 63, and authorizing the Legislature to provide for a statewide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive officers and employees of the several counties of this State; providing that participation therein by counties shall be voluntary, and authorized by the qualified voters of such county; providing the Legislature shall not be authorized to make an appropriation to pay any retirement or disability benefits authorized herein; and providing that administration of said system may be committed to the same body set up to administer the statewide municipal retirement system authorized under Section 51f of Article III; providing for the calling of an election and the publication and issuance of the proclamation therefor.

**Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:**

**Section 1.** That Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding thereto a new Section, to be numbered Section 63, which shall read as follows:

**"Section 63.** The Legislature shall have the authority to provide for a statewide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive officers and employees of the counties of this State under such a plan and program as the Legislature shall authorize; provided, that participation therein by counties shall be voluntary and shall first be authorized by vote of the qualified voters of such county; provided further that the Legislature shall not be authorized to make an appropriation to pay any retirement or disability benefits authorized herein. Administration of such system may be committed to the same body as may be set up to administer the municipal retirement system provided for by Section 51f of Article III."

**Sec. 2.** The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors at an election to be held throughout this State on the second Tuesday in November, 1951, and at said election the ballots shall have printed thereon the words:

**"FOR the Constitutional Amendment** authorizing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees," and

**"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment** authorizing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees."

**Each voter** shall strike out one of said clauses on his ballot, leaving the one unmarked which expresses his vote upon the proposed Amendment.

**Sec. 3.** The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the foregoing proposed Amendment published as required by the Constitution for proposed Amendments thereto.

**Sec. 4.** If at said election a majority of the votes are "FOR the Constitutional Amendment" authorizing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees" the foregoing proposed Amendment shall become Section 63 of Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas, and proclamation shall be made by the Governor therefor.

**SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 8**

proposing an Amendment to Section 48-d of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, authorizing the Legislature to provide for the creation and establishment of rural fire prevention districts so as to provide that the Legislature may authorize an ad valorem tax not to exceed Fifty (50c) cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation.

**Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:**

**Section 1.** That Section 48-d of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows:  
**Sec. 48-d.** The Legislature shall have the power to provide for the establishment and creation of rural fire prevention districts and to authorize a tax on the ad valorem property situated in said districts not to exceed Fifty (50c) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation for the support thereof provided that no tax shall be levied in support of said districts until approved by vote of the people residing therein."

**Sec. 2.** The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the State at an election to be held on the second Tuesday in November, 1951, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines, the said machines shall provide) the following:  
**"FOR the constitutional amendment** authorizing the Legislature to provide for the levy of an ad valorem tax not to exceed Fifty (50c) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation for the creation

and establishment of rural fire prevention districts;" and

**"AGAINST the constitutional amendment** authorizing the Legislature to provide for the levy of an ad valorem tax not to exceed Fifty (50c) on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation for the creation and establishment of rural fire prevention districts."

**Each voter** shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment; and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the

State of Texas.

**Sec. 3.** The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

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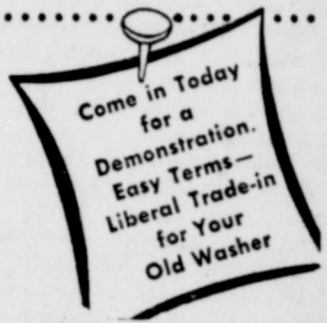

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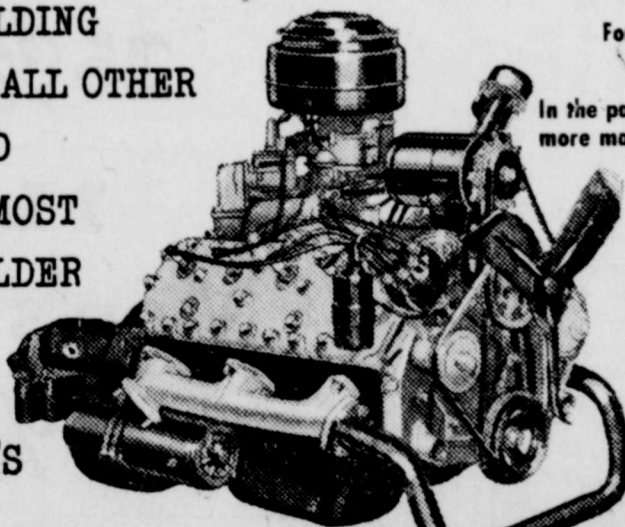
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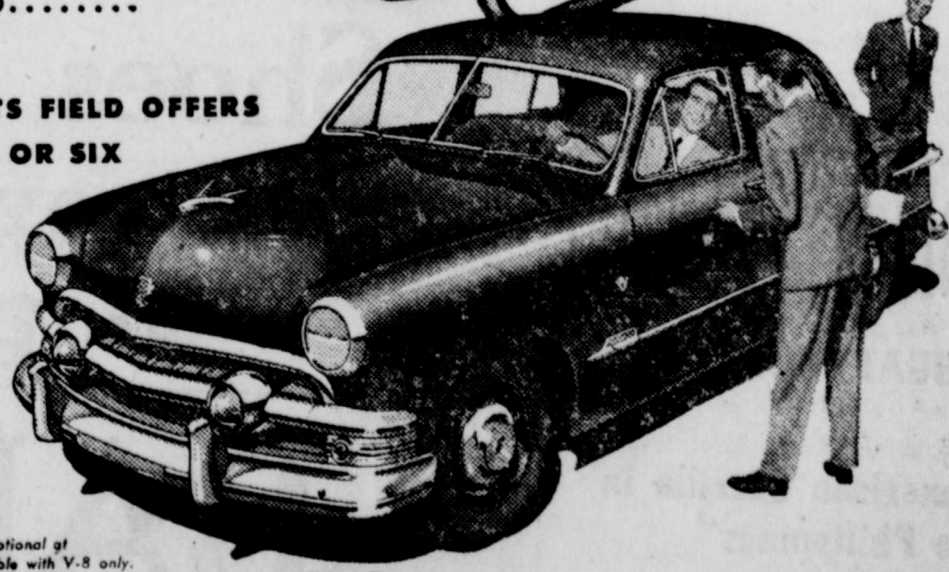

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**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 2** proposing an amendment to Section 49-b, Article III, Constitution of Texas, so that the total amount of bonds or obligations that may be issued by the Veterans' Land Board is increased to One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000); providing for the issuance of said bonds and certain conditions relating thereto and the use of the Veterans' Land Fund; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

**Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:**

**Section 1.** That Section 49-b, Article III, Constitution of Texas, be amended so that the same will hereafter read as follows:

**"Section 49 b.** There is hereby created a Board to be known as the Veterans' Land Board, which shall be composed of the Governor, the Attorney General, and the Commissioner of the General Land Office. The Veterans' Land Board may issue not to exceed One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000) in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the purpose of creating a fund to be known as the Veterans' Land Fund. Such bonds shall be executed by said Board as an obligation of the State of Texas, in such form, denominations, and upon the terms as are now prescribed by Senate Bill No. 29, Chapter 318 of the Acts of the Fifty-first Legislature (provided, that when the limitation of Twenty-five Million Dollars (\$25,000,000) is used in said Senate Bill No. 29, the same shall hereafter be construed as One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000), or as said Act may be hereafter amended, or by other laws that the Legislature may hereafter enact; provided, however, that said bonds shall bear a rate of interest not to exceed three per cent (3%) per annum, and that the same shall be sold for not less than par value and accrued interest.

"In the sale of any such bonds, a preferential right of purchase shall be given to the administrators of the various teacher retirement funds, the Permanent University Funds, and the Permanent School Funds; such bonds to be issued as needed, in the opinion of the Veterans' Land Board.

"The Veterans' Land Fund shall be used by the Board for the sole purpose of purchasing lands suitable for the purpose hereinafter stated, situated in this State, (a) owned by the United States, or any governmental agency thereof; (b) owned by the Texas Prison System, or any other governmental agency of the State of Texas; or (c) owned by any person, firm or corporation.

"All lands thus purchased shall be acquired at the lowest price obtainable, to be paid for in cash, and shall be a part of the Veterans' Land Fund.

"The lands of the Veterans' Land Fund shall be sold by the State to Texas Veterans of the present war or wars, commonly known as World War II, and to Texas Veterans of service in the armed forces of the United States of America subsequent to 1945, as may be included within this program by legislative act, in such quantities, and on such terms, and at such prices and rates of interest, and under such rules and regulations as are now provided by law, or as may hereafter be provided by law.

"All moneys received and which have been received and which have not been used for repurchase of land as provided herein by the Veterans' Land Board from the sale of lands and for interest on deferred payments, shall be credited to the Veterans' Land Fund for use in purchasing additional lands to be sold to Texas Veterans of World War II, and to Texas Veterans of service in the armed forces of the United States of America subsequent to 1945, as may be included within this program by legislative act, in like manner as provided for the sale of lands purchased

with the proceeds from the sales of the bonds, provided for herein, for a period ending December 1, 1959; provided, however, that so much of such moneys as may be necessary during the period ending December 1, 1959, to pay principal of and interest on the bonds heretofore issued and on bonds hereafter issued by the Veterans' Land Board shall be set aside for that purpose. After December 1, 1959, all moneys received by the Veterans' Land Board from the sale of lands and interest on deferred payments, or so much thereof as may be necessary, shall be set aside for the retirement of said bonds and to pay interest thereon, and any of such moneys not so needed shall not later than the maturity date of the last maturing bond or bonds be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund to be appropriated to such purposes as may be prescribed by law. All bonds issued hereunder shall, after approval by the Attorney General of Texas, registration by the Comptroller of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute obligations of the State under the Constitution of Texas. Of the total One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000) of bonds herein authorized, the sum of Twenty-five Million Dollars (\$25,000,000) has heretofore been issued; said bonds are hereby in all respects validated and declared to be obligations of the State of Texas. This amendment shall become effective upon its adoption."

**"Sec. 2.** The foregoing Constitu-

tional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the second Tuesday of November, 1951, at which election all voters favoring the proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the following words:

**FOR the Amendment** to Section 49-b, Constitution of Texas, for increasing Veterans' Land Fund for the purchase of lands in Texas to be sold to Texas Veterans of World War II, and to Texas Veterans of service in the armed forces of the United States of America subsequent to 1942."

Those opposing said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the following words:

**"AGAINST the Amendment** to Section 49-b, Constitution of Texas, for increasing Veterans' Land Fund for the purchase of lands in Texas to be sold to Texas veterans of World War II, and to Texas Veterans of service in the armed forces of the United States of America subsequent to 1945."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast were in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution and be effective from the date of the determination of such result and the Governor's proclamation thereof.

**Sec. 3.** The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and

shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.
