REA WORK BEGUN HERE THIS WEEK

**Widens Area to Have Electricity;
Ready By November 1st Maybe**

Work on surveying lines for the REA expansion in Sterling County was begun on Wednesday morning. The wire and some of the other necessary material is already here. The wire is on the ground over by the Santa Fe freight depot.

With the line surveying begun, it was said that the lines should be up and ready for customers by November.

The outer fringe of the lines will serve Forrest Foster on the Colorado City road, George McEntire on the Big Spring road, Bado Bros. on the Garden City road, Fred Hodges on the south and Crit Clark on the San Angelo road. This group of signers are the ones on the edges of the district to be served. All residents in the circle of those already mentioned may be served if they have signed up, or agree to.

There was a long drawn-out request for such rural electrification in Sterling County through the years, and due to the sparseness of the houses in the ranch country, it seemed as if REA would never be brought in. But now it is nearly a reality.

Two San Angelo youths were injured near here Monday afternoon when the Grapette truck in which they were riding overturned.

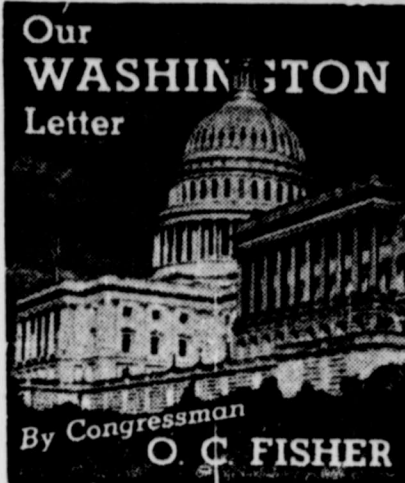

Last week I got away from the grind of Capitol Hill for a few days and kept some engagements I had previously made in the district. It is always inspiring to be able to get home and visit and talk with the people. There has been little chance to do that this year.

While in the district, I attended an annual meeting of the members and families of the Runnels County Farm Bureau Federation, held at the park in Ballinger. A big crowd turned out and there was an abundance of hospitality, old-fashioned barbecue and oratory. County Judge Grindstaff and Rep. Henry Rumpy were among the speakers and both gave interesting reports on the county and state governments, taxes, finances, rural roads and other problems. Mr. Rumpy is chairman of the House Appropriations Committee in Austin and is considered one of the most important Members of the State Legislature.

In my talk there I called attention to false and misleading reports to the effect that the farmers are responsible for the high cost of living. The fact is that, according to government figures, the farm income has dropped a total of 27% each year since 1948, while the national income has increased by 16% during the same period.

As an example of this, I reminded that wheat has dropped from a post-war peak of \$2.81 a bushel to a recent figure of around \$2.00. Corn dropped from \$2.46 to about \$1.50 during the same period and hog prices slumped from a peak of \$27.40 per hundred pounds in 1948 to a recent quotation of \$20.00. Milk was another example given.

Yet, despite the reduced prices to producers, retail bread prices went up, milk is costing consumers more, and many other examples of this were given. Certainly, farmers—who in general, are getting less—are not responsible for these increases in consumer prices.

Actually, only about a half-dozen farm products out of more than a hundred were above parity this year. These have included beef, cattle, wool, cottonseed, lambs, soybeans, rice and cotton. Cotton and some of these other commodities have recently dropped, however.

It appears that increased costs of marketing and distribution account for most of the higher prices paid by consumers. Secretary Brannan recently disclosed that in January of 1951 a typical market basket of food for a family of three was costing at the rate of \$709.00 a year. Of this amount, marketing costs accounted for \$352.00, while the farmer received only \$357.00.

The annual community get-together and picnic of the Winters Volunteer Fire Department was held on Thursday night of last week also drew a large crowd, as is always the case. My visit there was my first since the big oil development which puts Winters in the midst of a huge oil field. Following the program I drove west through Wilmoth to the farm home of my friends, the Tod Richards, who were celebrating their 50th Wedding Anniversary. These pioneers have been pillars of strength and inspiration in the community where they have lived. They fed and entertained nearly a thousand of their friends and neighbors on the occasion of their anniversary. Many happy returns to them!

It was my privilege to address the ladies of the First Presbyterian Church while there, and on Friday evening I drove to Kerrville where I spoke to a large audience of Kerr citizens who assembled at the Schreiner Institute auditorium. The meeting was sponsored by the "We The Citizens" organization there. The program being in charge of Johnnie Hill and Col. Parmalee (Ret.) Commandant at Schreiner. 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LEGAL NOTICES
HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 6

Proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas amending Article III, Section 51a, providing that the Legislature shall have the power to provide assistance to and provide for the payment of same to residents of the State of Texas who are needy aged persons over the age of sixty-five (65) years, needy blind persons over the age of sixteen (16) years removing the Thirty-five Million Dollars (\$35,000,000) limitation upon expenditures for such purposes and providing for a limitation of Forty-two Million Dollars (\$42,000,000) upon such expenditures; providing a maximum payment of Thirty Dollars (\$30) per month from State funds for old age assistance; prohibiting payment or assistance after disposition of property under certain conditions; providing for the acceptance of financial aid from the Government of the United States of America for such assistance; providing that the payment of such from State funds shall never exceed the payments from Federal funds; providing for the necessary election, and providing for the form of ballot, proclamation and publication.

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 51a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended, and the same is hereby amended so that the same shall hereafter read as follows:

"Section 51a. The Legislature shall have the power, by general laws to provide, subject to limitations and restrictions herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions, and regulations as may be by the Legislature be deemed expedient for assistance to, and for the payment of assistance to:

"(1) Needy aged persons who are over the age of sixty-five (65) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any State-supported institution, while such inmate; and provided that any resident of the State, if otherwise eligible, may not be excluded who has resided in the State for five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the filing of the application for assistance including the one (1) year continuously immediately preceding the filing of such application provided that the maximum payment per month from State funds shall not be more than Thirty Dollars (\$30) per month.

"Any applicant for or recipient of assistance, including the spouse in each instance, who shall dispose of any property after June 1, 1952, and any person who initially applies for assistance after June 1, 1957, who has disposed of any property within five (5) years prior to the date of application, shall be ineligible to receive assistance; provided, that if such property was disposed of by bona fide sale and conveyance, and for value commensurate with the actual market value thereof, such disposition shall not affect eligibility for assistance if it be shown that all proceeds from such sale have been used by such person and spouse for normal living expenses or for the purchase of other real property of like value. If any recipient of assistance or spouse shall sell any real property, neither such recipient nor spouse shall thereafter receive assistance until all net proceeds of such sale have been expended for normal living expenses; and in case of disposition of such property by gifts or for an amount less than its actual market value, such person and spouse shall not thereafter receive assistance until the expiration of the period of time during which the net proceeds of said sale would have paid their normal living expenses had the actual market value been realized therefrom.

"(2) Needy blind persons who are over the age of sixteen (16) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any State-supported institution, while such inmate; and provided that any resident of the State, if otherwise eligible, may not be excluded who has resided in the State for five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the filing of the application for such assistance including

the one (1) year continuously immediately preceding the filing of such application.

"(3) Needy children who are under the age of sixteen (16) years; provided that any child, if otherwise eligible, may not be excluded who has resided in the State for one (1) year immediately preceding the filing of the application for such assistance, or, if said child is under the age of one (1) year, whose parent or other relative with whom the child is living has resided in the State for one (1) year immediately preceding the birth of such child.

"The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Federal Government of the United States such financial aid for the assistance of the needy aged, needy blind, and needy children as such Government may offer not inconsistent with restrictions herein set forth; provided, however, that the amount of such assistance out of State funds to each person assisted shall never exceed the amount so expended out of Federal funds; and provided further that the total amount of money to be expended out of State funds for such assistance to the needy aged, needy blind and needy children shall never exceed the sum of Forty-two Million Dollars (\$42,000,000) per year.

"Should the Legislature enact enabling laws and provide an additional appropriation hereto in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment, such Acts shall not be invalid by reason of their anticipatory character."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of Texas at the Election to be held through out the State of Texas on the second Tuesday in November, 1951, at which election there shall be printed on such ballot the following clause:

"FOR the amendment to the Constitution giving the Legislature power to set up a system of payments of assistance to needy persons over sixty-five (65) years of age; to needy blind persons over the age of sixteen (16) years; to needy children under sixteen (16) years of age; removing the Thirty-five Million Dollar (\$35,000,000) limitation upon the amount of State expenditures for such purposes; disqualifying persons who dispose of property under certain conditions; providing a maximum payment of Thirty Dollars (\$30) per month from State funds for old age assistance; providing for the acceptance and expenditure of funds from the Federal Government; providing that expenditures from State funds shall not exceed the expenditure from Federal funds with respect to any individual; and providing conditions as to residence within the State in order to be eligible to receive assistance; and providing a limitation of Forty-two Million Dollars (\$42,000,000) per year on State Fund expenditures for such purpose each year."

"AGAINST the amendment to the Constitution giving the Legislature power to set up a system of payments of assistance to needy persons over sixty-five (65) years of age; to needy blind persons over the age of sixteen (16) years; to needy children under sixteen (16) years of age; removing the Thirty-five Million Dollar (\$35,000,000) limitation upon the amount of State expenditures for such purposes; disqualifying persons who dispose of property under certain conditions; providing a maximum payment of Thirty Dollars (\$30) per month from State funds for old age assistance; providing for the acceptance and expenditure of funds from the Federal Government providing that expenditures from State funds shall not exceed the expenditure from Federal Funds with respect to any individual; and providing conditions as to residence within the State in order to be eligible to receive assistance; and providing a limitation of Forty-two Million Dollars (\$42,000,000) per year on State Fund expenditures for such purpose each year."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published and held as required by the Constitution and Laws of the State of Texas.

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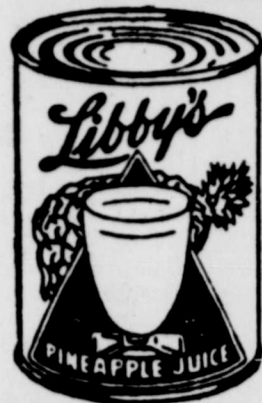
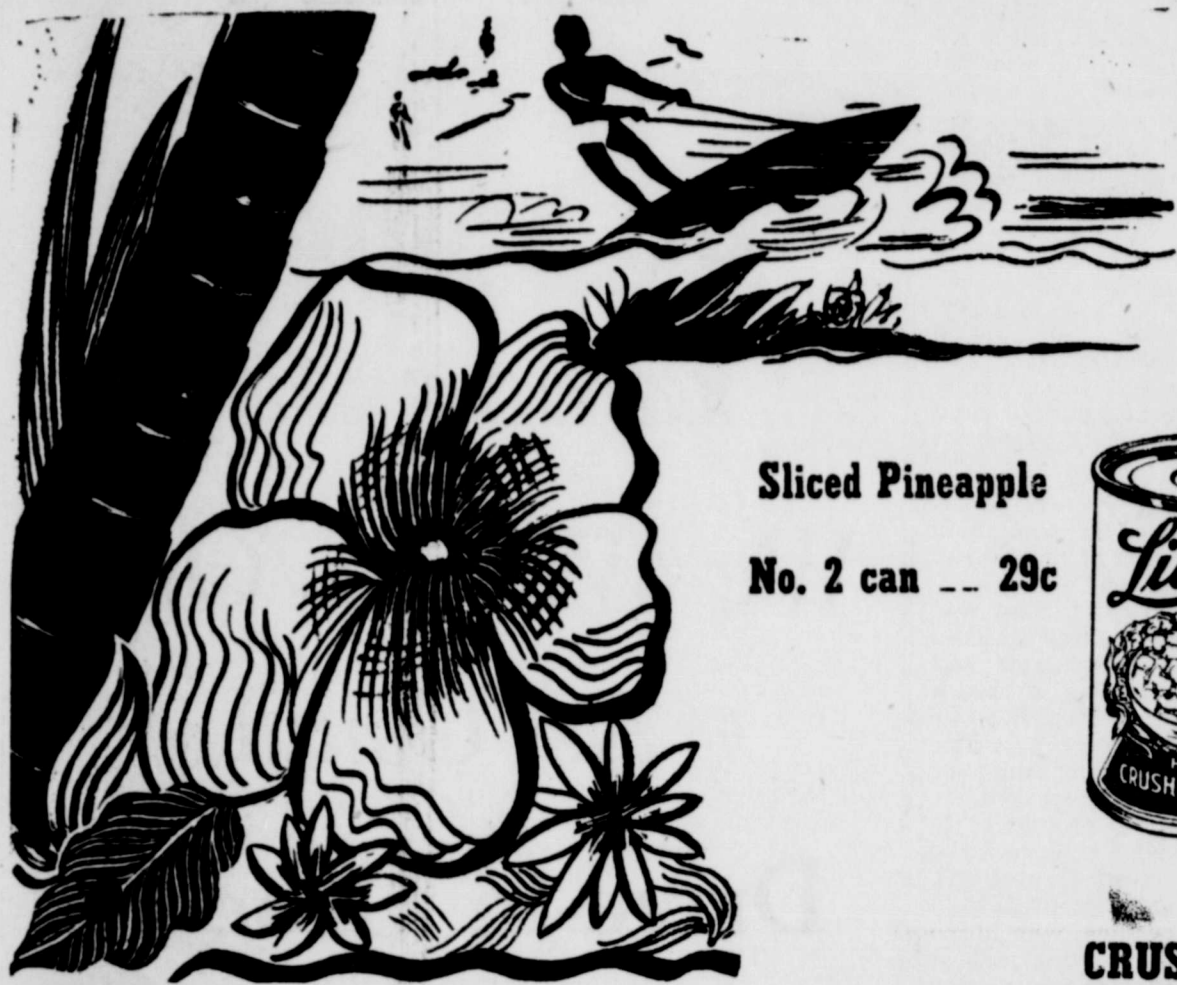

Major Defense Bond Drive Sale Begins Monday

There will be a major Defense Bond drive this fall, the campaign beginning on Monday, September 3—Labor Day—and to continue through October 27. Secretary Snyder hopes to make the drive an outstanding success, as it will be the first all-out sales effort since the outbreak of the war in Korea more than a year ago. As you know, Savings Bonds are being called "Defense" Bonds again.

Secretary Snyder will launch the drive nationally in ceremonies in Grand Rapids, Michigan, on September 3. No special ceremonies are planned for a Texas "kick-off," but since the date is Labor Day, I feel that it would be appropriate if Sterling County citizens could stimulate the interest and enthusiasm in the sale of Defense Bonds in a large volume especially during the first week of the drive, as well as the entire period, for the large volume of sales is as important today as it ever was, and you and I have the opportunity during this drive to render a great patriotic service.

There will be no quotas, except those we set for ourselves. The Treasury recommends however, that we set for our county a reasonable and attainable goal, yet high enough to be a challenge to us. STERLING COUNTY HOSPITAL AFFILIATES WITH TEXAS BLUE CROSS PLAN

The Sterling County Hospital is affiliating with the Texas Blue Cross Plan, Mrs. Valentine Melvin, administrator, announced, today.

In affiliating with the Texas Blue Cross Plan, Sterling County Hospital joins with 460 other hospitals in Texas and 4,000 hospitals throughout the United States, Puerto Rico and Canada, in serving over 42,000,000 Blue Cross Members. This means that 8 per cent of the general hospital beds are now available to one out of every four citizens of the United States as Blue Cross members.

Blue Cross is a non-profit organization sponsored by the hospitals and the medical profession. The original prepayment plan was started in Dallas back in 1929. Dr. Justin Kimball, then associated both with the Dallas school system and Baylor University, is given credit for the origin.

By August of 1937, Blue Cross had its first million members and doubled in the next twelve months. The growth has been steady, until now it exceeds 42 million members.

In June, 1939, the first state-wide movement in Texas began and was known as Group Hospital Service Inc. of Texas.

In 1942, the Plan gained the approval of the American Hospital Association as the Blue Cross Plan of Texas and has progressed in size and in scope of benefits ever since.

In 1945, Blue Shield added medical-surgical benefits to the Blue Cross hospital care. Group Medical and Surgical Service of Texas was approved by the Blue Shield Commission of the American Medical Association.

CAKE OF THE MONTH

So often on these hot sultry summer days our meals are planned around crisp, cool salads which usually means that we can splurge when it comes to dessert time. And just watch the family devour those salad vitamins when they know there's a luscious cake, such as the one pictured here, waiting for them to enjoy at the end of the meal. Richly moist and downy-tender is this devil's food cake. Superb eaten warm—swirled thickly with whipped cream and decorated prettily with shaved chocolate—it rates as a "summer special" when you use a cake mix. For then your cake will be in and out of the oven before you can say "Jack Robinson"—quite a feature these sultry days!

Chocolate Whipped Cream Dessert
1 package devil's food cake mix
1 1/4 cups milk
3/4 cup cream, whipped and sweetened
1 square unsweetened chocolate, grated

Turn cake mix into bowl. Add 1/2 cup of the milk, blend, then beat 2 minutes. Add 1/2 cup more milk, blend, then beat 2 minutes. Then add 1/4 cup milk and beat 1 minute longer. (Beat vigorously by hand or at low speed of electric mixer. Scrape bowl and spoon or beater often.)

Turn batter into 9x9x2-inch square pan which has been lined on bottom with paper. Bake in moderate oven (375° F.) 30 to 35 minutes.

Cool in pan 10 minutes, then turn out, remove paper, and turn right-side up on rack. While cake is still slightly warm, spread generously with the whipped cream and make a border around outer edge with the grated chocolate. Serve at once with feed coffee.

If desired, cut cake in squares while still warm, top with whipped cream, and sprinkle with grated chocolate. Serve at once.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 37

proposing an Amendment to Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new section after Section 11 thereof to be designated as Section 11a, providing for the investment of the Permanent University Fund in additional securities to those now enumerated in Section 11 of Article VII of the State of Texas providing for the necessary proclamation and publication, and calling of an election therefor.

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas shall be amended by adding after Section 11 thereof a new section to be designated Section 11a, which shall read as follows:

"Section 11a. In addition to the bonds now enumerated in Section 11 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas, the Permanent University Fund may be invested in such other securities, including bonds, preferred stocks and common stocks, as the Board of Regents of the University of Texas may deem to be proper investment for said fund; provided, however, that not more than fifty per cent (50%) of the said fund shall be invested at any given time in stocks, nor shall more than one per cent (1%) of the said fund be invested in securities issued by any one (1) corporation, nor shall more than five per cent (5%) of the voting stock of any one (1) corporation be owned; and provided further that stocks eligible for purchase shall be restricted to stocks of companies incorporated within the United States which have paid dividends for ten (10) consecutive years or longer immediately prior to the date of purchase and which, except for bank stocks and insurance stocks, are listed upon an exchange registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission or its successors. This amendment shall be self-enacting."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held throughout the State on the second Tuesday in November, 1951, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for the investment of the Permanent University Fund in additional securities to those now enumerated in Section 11 of Article VII of the Constitution"; and

AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing for the investment of the Permanent University Fund in additional securities to those now enumerated in Section 11 of Article VII of the Constitution."

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. The expense of publication and election for such Amendment shall be paid out of the proper appropriation made by law.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 22

proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of Texas by adding to Article XVI thereof a new Section to be numbered 63, and authorizing the Legislature to provide for a statewide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive officers and employees of the several counties of this State; providing that participation therein by counties shall be voluntary, and authorized by the qualified voters of such county; providing the Legislature shall not be authorized to make an appropriation to pay any retirement or disability benefits authorized herein; and providing that administration of said system may be committed to the same body set up to administer the statewide municipal retirement system authorized under Section 51f of Article III; providing for the calling of an election and the publication and issuance of the proclamation therefor.

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding thereto a new Section, to be numbered Section 63, which shall read as follows:

"Section 63. The Legislature shall have the authority to provide for a statewide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive officers and employees of the counties of this State under such a plan and program as the Legislature shall authorize; provided, that participation therein by counties shall be voluntary and shall first be authorized by vote of the qualified voters of such county; provided further that the Legislature shall not be authorized to make an appropriation to pay any retirement or disability benefits authorized herein. Administration of such system may be committed to the same body as may be set up to administer the municipal retirement system provided for by Section 51f of Article III."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors at an election to be held throughout this State on the second Tuesday in November, 1951, and at said election the ballots shall have printed thereon the words:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees," and

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees."

Each voter shall strike out one of said clauses on his ballot, leaving the one unmarked which expresses his vote upon the proposed Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the foregoing proposed Amendment published as required by the Constitution for proposed Amendments thereto.

Sec. 4. If at said election a majority of the votes are "FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees" the foregoing proposed Amendment shall become Section 63 of Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas, and proclamation shall be made by the Governor thereof.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 8

proposing an Amendment to Section 48-d of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, authorizing the Legislature to provide for the creation and establishment of rural fire prevention districts so as to provide that the Legislature may authorize an ad valorem tax not to exceed Fifty (50c) cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation.

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 48-d of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows:

Sec. 48-d. The Legislature shall have the power to provide for the establishment and creation of rural fire prevention districts and to authorize a tax on the ad valorem property situated in said districts not to exceed Fifty (50c) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation for the support thereof provided that no tax shall be levied in support of said districts until approved by vote of the people residing therein."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the State at an election to be held on the second Tuesday in November, 1951, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines, the said machines shall provide) the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for the levy of an ad valorem tax not to exceed Fifty (50c) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation for the creation

and establishment of rural fire prevention districts;" and

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for the levy of an ad valorem tax not to exceed Fifty (50c) on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation for the creation and establishment of rural fire prevention districts."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment; and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

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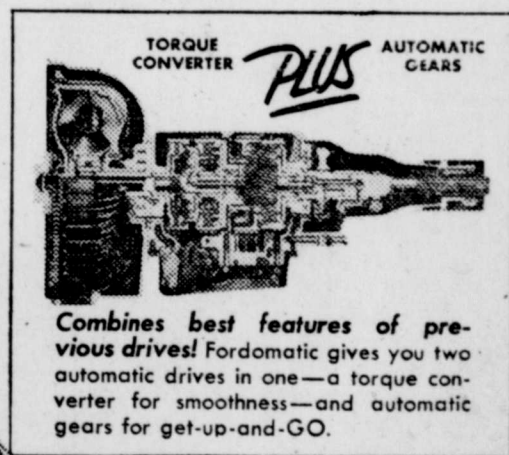

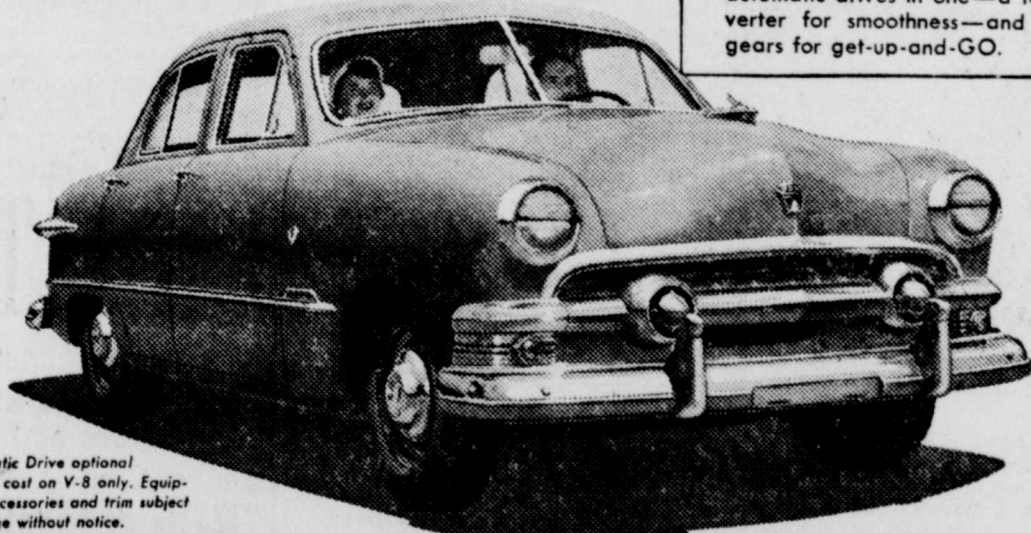

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 2 proposing an amendment to Section 49-b, Article III, Constitution of Texas, so that the total amount of bonds or obligations that may be issued by the Veterans' Land Board is increased to One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000); providing for the issuance of said bonds and certain conditions relating thereto and the use of the Veterans' Land Fund; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 49-b, Article III, Constitution of Texas, be amended so that the same will hereafter read as follows:

"Section 49b. There is hereby created a Board to be known as the Veterans' Land Board, which shall be composed of the Governor, the Attorney General, and the Commissioner of the General Land Office. The Veterans' Land Board may issue not to exceed One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000) in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the purpose of creating a fund to be known as the Veterans' Land Fund. Such bonds shall be executed by said Board as an obligation of the State of Texas, in such form denominations, and upon the terms as are now prescribed by Senate Bill No. 29, Chapter 318 of the Act of the Fifty-first Legislature (provided, that when the limitation of Twenty-five Million Dollars (\$25,000,000) is used in said Senate Bill No. 29, the same shall hereafter be construed as One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000), or as said Act may be hereafter amended, or by other laws that the Legislature may hereafter enact; provided however, that said bonds shall bear a rate of interest not to exceed three per cent (3%) per annum, and that the same shall be sold for not less than par value and accrued interest.

"In the sale of any such bonds, a preferential right of purchase shall be given to the administrators of the various teacher retirement funds, the Permanent University Funds, and the Permanent School Funds; such bonds to be issued as needed, in the opinion of the Veterans' Land Board.

"The Veterans' Land Fund shall be used by the Board for the sole purpose of purchasing lands suitable for the purpose hereinafter stated, situated in this State, (a) owned by the United States, or any governmental agency thereof; (b) owned by the Texas Prison System, or any other governmental agency of the State of Texas; or (c) owned

by any person, firm or corporation. **"All lands** thus purchased shall be acquired at the lowest price obtainable, to be paid for in cash, and shall be a part of the Veterans' Land Fund.

"The lands of the Veterans' Land Fund shall be sold by the State to Texas Veterans of the present war or wars, commonly known as World War II, and to Texas Veterans of service in the armed forces of the United States of America subsequent to 1945, as may be included within this program by legislative act, in such quantities, and on such terms, and at such prices and rates of interest, and under such rules and regulations as are now provided by law, or as may hereafter be provided by law.

"All moneys received and which have been received and which have not been used for repurchase of land as provided herein by the Veterans' Land Board from the sale of lands and for interest on deferred payments, shall be credited to the Veterans' Land Fund for use in purchasing additional lands to be sold to Texas Veterans of World War II, and to Texas Veterans of service in the armed forces of the United States of America subsequent to 1945, as may be included within this program by legislative act, in like manner as provided for the sale of lands purchased with the proceeds from the sales of the bonds, provided for herein, for a period ending December 1, 1959; provided, however, that so much of such moneys as may be necessary during the period ending December 1, 1959, to pay principal of and interest on the bonds heretofore issued and on bonds hereafter issued by the Veterans' Land Board shall be set aside for that purpose. After December 1, 1959, all moneys received by the Veterans' Land Board from the sale of lands and interest on deferred payments, or so much thereof as may be necessary, shall be set aside for the retirement of said bonds and to pay interest thereon, and any of such moneys not so needed shall not later than the maturity date of the last maturing bond or bonds be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund to be appropriated to such purposes as may be prescribed by law. All bonds issued hereunder shall, after approval by the Attorney General of Texas, registration by the Comptroller of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute obligations of the State under the Constitution of Texas. Of the total One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000) of

bonds herein authorized, the sum of Twenty-five Million Dollars (\$25,000,000) has heretofore been issued; said bonds are hereby in all respects validated and declared to be obligations of the State of Texas. This amendment shall become effective upon its adoption."

"Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the second Tuesday of November, 1951, at which election all voters favoring the proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the following words:

FOR the Amendment to Section 49-b, Constitution of Texas, for increasing Veterans' Land Fund for the purchase of lands in Texas to be sold to Texas Veterans of World War II, and to Texas Veterans of service in the armed forces of the United States of America subsequent to 1942."

Those opposing said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the following words:

"AGAINST the Amendment to Section 49-b, Constitution of Texas, for increasing Veterans' Land Fund for the purchase of lands in Texas to be sold to Texas veterans of World War II, and to Texas Veterans of service in the armed forces of the United States of America subsequent to 1945."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the vote cast were in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution and be effective from the date of the determination of such result and the Governor's proclamation thereof.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

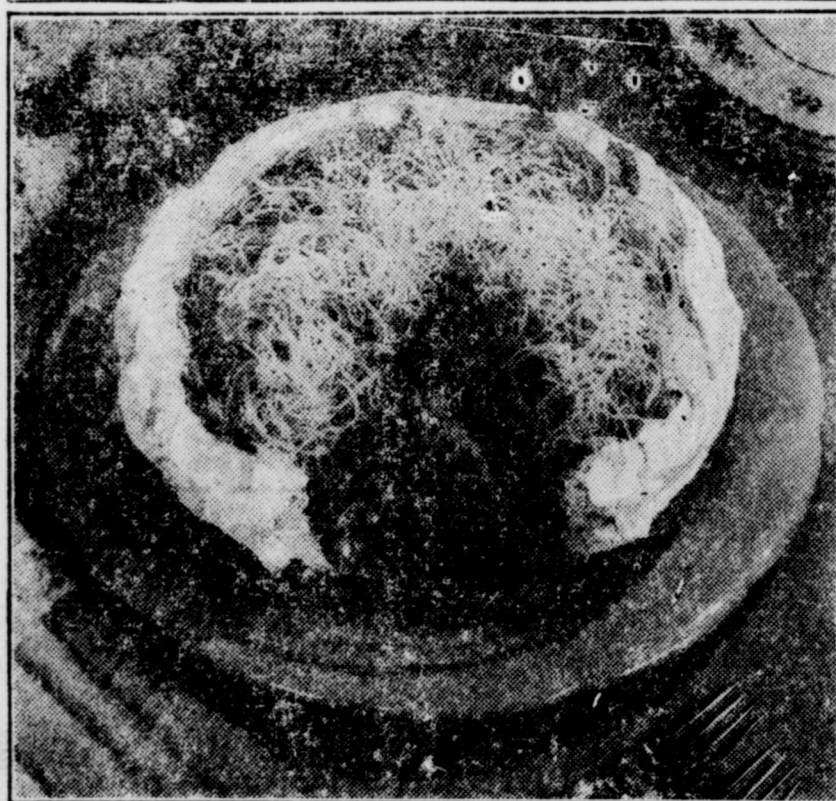

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Mid-Summer Dream

Bake a tender meringue shell, fill it with luscious chocolate coconut ice cream, shower the top with additional filmy coconut, and there you have as dreamy a dessert as ever graced a mid-summer company dinner! What's more, it doesn't require a lot of time in an overheated kitchen. The meringue shell calls for a low-temperature oven; and the refrigerator takes care of the filling.

If time saving is of first importance to you, then the filling can be your favorite pre-packaged ice cream from the store instead of the home-made variety. Only do take time to add the deluxe touch to it—let it stand at room temperature until soft enough to fold in 3/4 cup of toasted coconut. Freeze until firm. At dessert time, fill meringue shell with the coconut ice cream, sprinkle with additional coconut, and serve with pride. Mmm! A mid-summer dream!

Chocolate Coconut Ice Cream Pie
2 egg whites
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon cream of tartar
1/2 cup sifted granulated sugar
1/2 cup finely chopped nut meats
1/2 teaspoon vanilla

Chocolate Coconut Ice Cream

Beat egg whites with rotary egg beater until foamy. Add salt and cream of tartar and continue beating until mixture will stand in soft peaks. Add sugar gradually and continue beating until mixture is very stiff. Fold in nuts and vanilla. Turn into lightly greased 8-inch pie pan and make a ne-tlike shell, building sides up to 1/2 inch above edge of pan. Bake in slow oven (300° F.) 50 to 55 minutes.

Cool. Just before serving, fill with Chocolate Coconut Ice Cream and sprinkle with shredded coconut.

Chocolate Coconut Ice Cream: Combine 2 teaspoons gelatin and 1/4 cup cold water; mix well. Add 1 1/2 squares unsweetened chocolate to 1 1/2 cups milk. Place over hot water until chocolate is melted, stirring constantly. Beat until blended. Dissolve gelatin, 1/2 cup sugar, and a dash of salt in the hot liquid. Chill until slightly thickened. Then fold in 1 cup cream, whipped, and 1 teaspoon vanilla. Turn into freezing tray of automatic refrigerator, setting control for coldest freezing temperature. When partially frozen, beat with rotary egg beater until fluffy and smooth. Fold in 3/4 cup toasted shredded coconut. Freeze 30 minutes longer; stir. Then freeze until firm. Freezing time: 3 to 4 hours.
