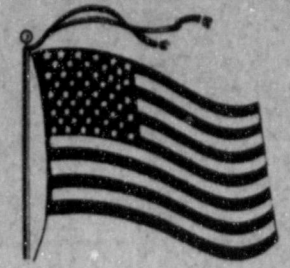

Mules Take On Lockney Longhorns Friday Night

Friday night the Muleshoe Mules will travel to Lockney to take on the Longhorns on their home field. The Horns stand 2-2 in the season play and will begin district play next week.

Coach Windy Williams had nothing but good things to say about the Longhorns and their coach Dewayne Sexton. "The Lockney team is well-coached, and they possibly have better uniformity in size than we do. They have a tough defense,--one that swarms all over you, and

they will run right at you," said Williams. "The Mules will need to execute offensively as well as playing good heads-up defense," he stated.

In a Monday conversation with Longhorn coach Dewayne Sexton, he made the following statements to this Journal reporter: "We scouted the Mules last week in their bout with Abernathy, and we felt like they have an outstanding team--a quick team--and a super-good young quarterback, who is a scrambler and can come up with the

yardage when it counts. The Mules defensive unit is a tough one and is good at containing the opposing offense."

Coach Williams stated that the Mules will all be in uniform and healthy, with perhaps the exception of

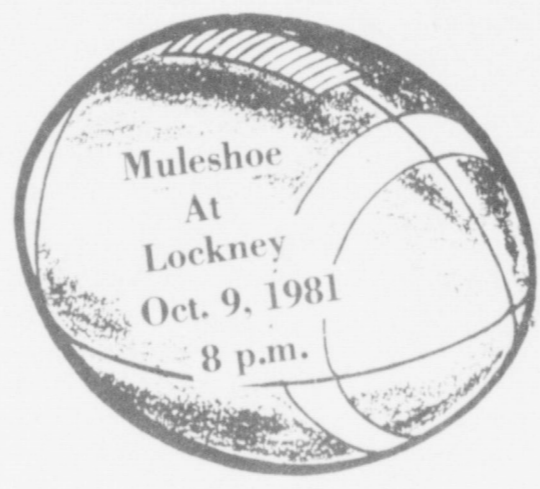

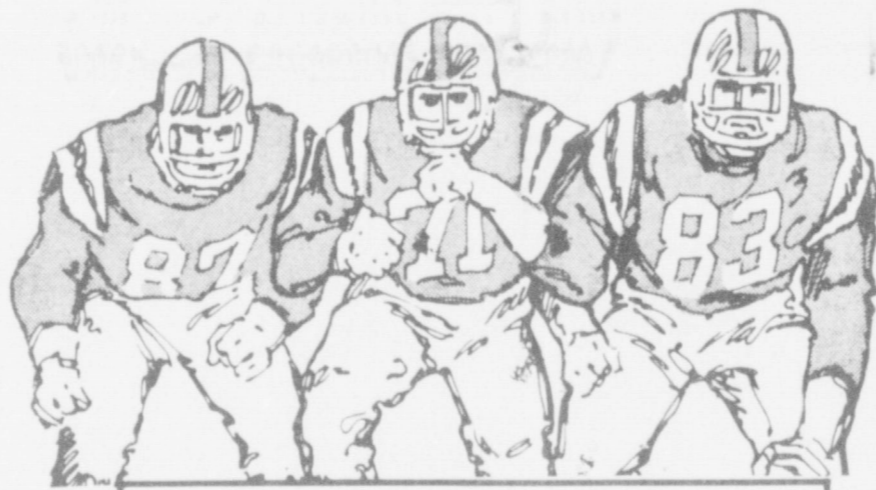
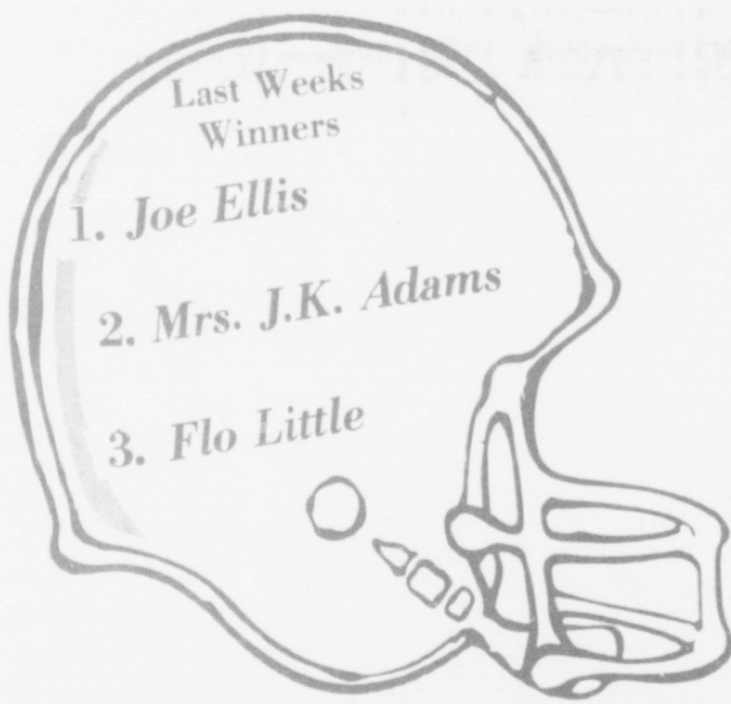

Sooners Meet Longhorns For 76th. Battle

Oklahoma has lost just three games over the past two years, and two of those losses have been at the hands of the Texas Longhorns. Texas won 16-7 in 1979, and again last fall 20-13. This, their 76th meeting (Texas leads the series 44-28 with three ties) is again being played in Dallas. The Longhorns are coming off a two-week rest, whipping the Hurricanes of Miami their last time out 14-7. They were impressive in their opening two contests, winning over both Rice and North Texas. The Sooners started their Big Eight Conference schedule last week vs Iowa State, and had posted a 1-1 record up to that time. They rallied to beat Wyoming and then lost to Southern California on the coast 28-24. Oklahoma will be the winner in the annual Big One by nine points.

Two of the three "Mississippi's can make new headlines by winning Saturday. The strong Golden Eagles of Southern Mississippi came into last year's tussle with Alabama undefeated in their first six games. They left with their tails between their legs, the Tide winning 42-7. This year Alabama is favored, but only by ten points. The Rebels of Ole' Miss lost to Georgia 28-21 in 1980, and this year it may not be as close. Mississippi is at home, and is the underdog by 18 points.

Baylor won the Southwest Conference championship last year with an 8-0 conference record. The closest they came to losing in league competition was a 32-28 win over the Mus-

tangs of S.M.U. Southern Methodist hosts the Bears Saturday in what should be a turn-around from last fall. S.M.U. is favored by thirteen points.

Florida State goes to South Bend on the third leg of its tough road schedule, but there'll be no sympathy from the Irish-Notre Dame by one. Wisconsin entertains Ohio State, the Buckeyes winning by ten. Pittsburgh is ten points stronger than West Virginia, and North Carolina will beat Wake Forest by 34 points.

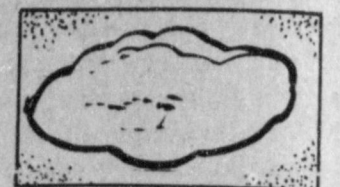
Large Number Attend Bread Fairs

SOUTH CENTRAL COTTON, SORGHUM CORN, WHEAT PRODUCTION UP

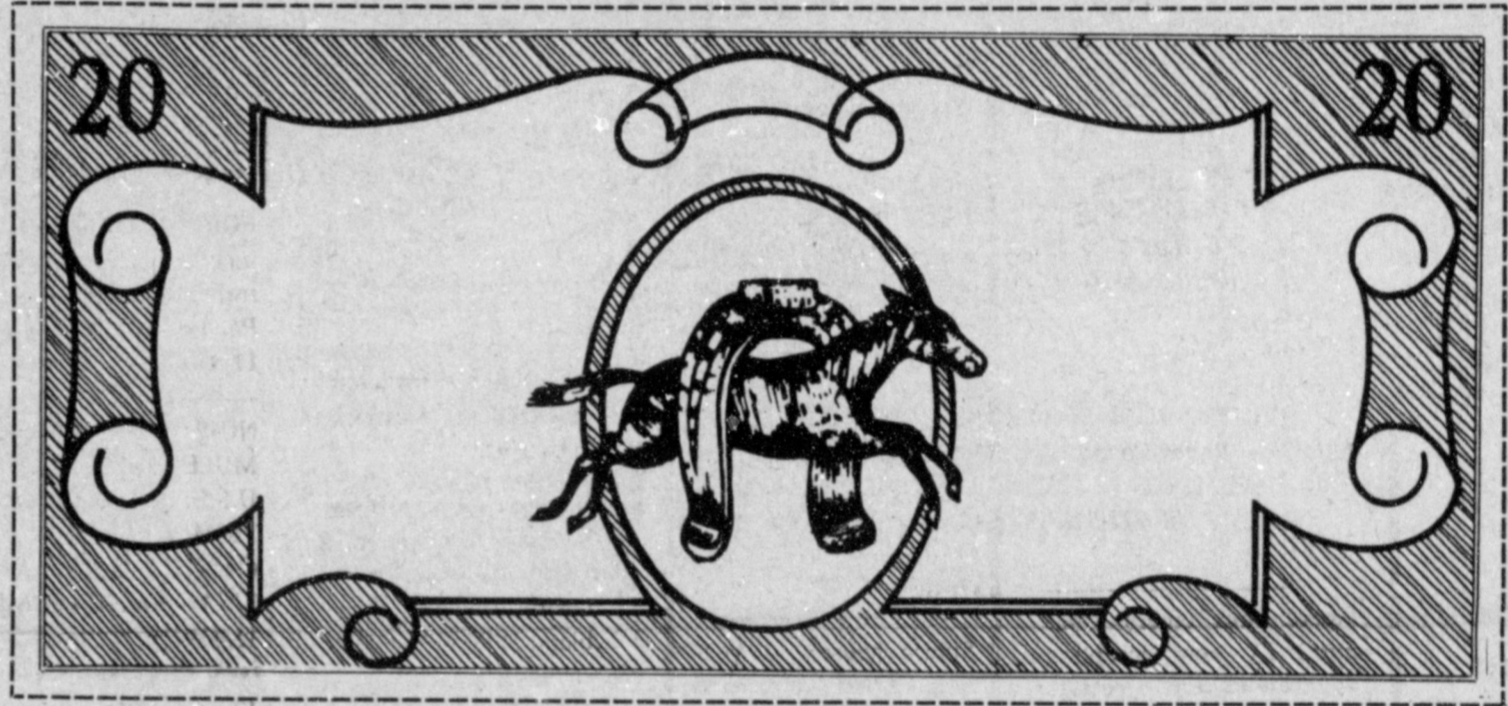
AUSTIN--The August estimates for crop production indicate that South Central cotton, sorghum, corn, and wheat will be higher from 1980. Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown has reported.

According to the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, cotton and sorghum were forecast at 30,000 bales and 10,079,000 hundredweight respectively.

Corn production was estimated at 15,700,000 bushels, rising above the 1980 level of 10,180,000.

Wheat production at 4,148,000 bushels is greatly higher than 1980's level of 1,680,000 bushels, statewide, however a record harvest of 183,400,000 bushels is projected.
