## LIGHT VOTE CAST IN ELECTION HERE TUESDAY

Only 78 voters went to the polls and voted at the special election in Sterling County Tuesday. There likewise was not much interest in the election over the state.

In the race to name a successor for Peppy Blount as Legislative representative, W. A. (Bill) Stroman ran second to Jerry Johnson. Johnson tallied 42 votes to Stroman's 30. Bill Davenport didn't really get enough to count, having racked up only 6 votes over the entire county.

Sterling voters rejected all five of the proposed amendments to the state constitution. The average of the votes cast were two to one against the amendments. Coming nearest passing was the amendment to raise the Veteran's Land Purchase Fund to \$100 million. It ran 40 for to 33 against. The one to create rural fire prevention districts was defeated the worst—53 to 20.

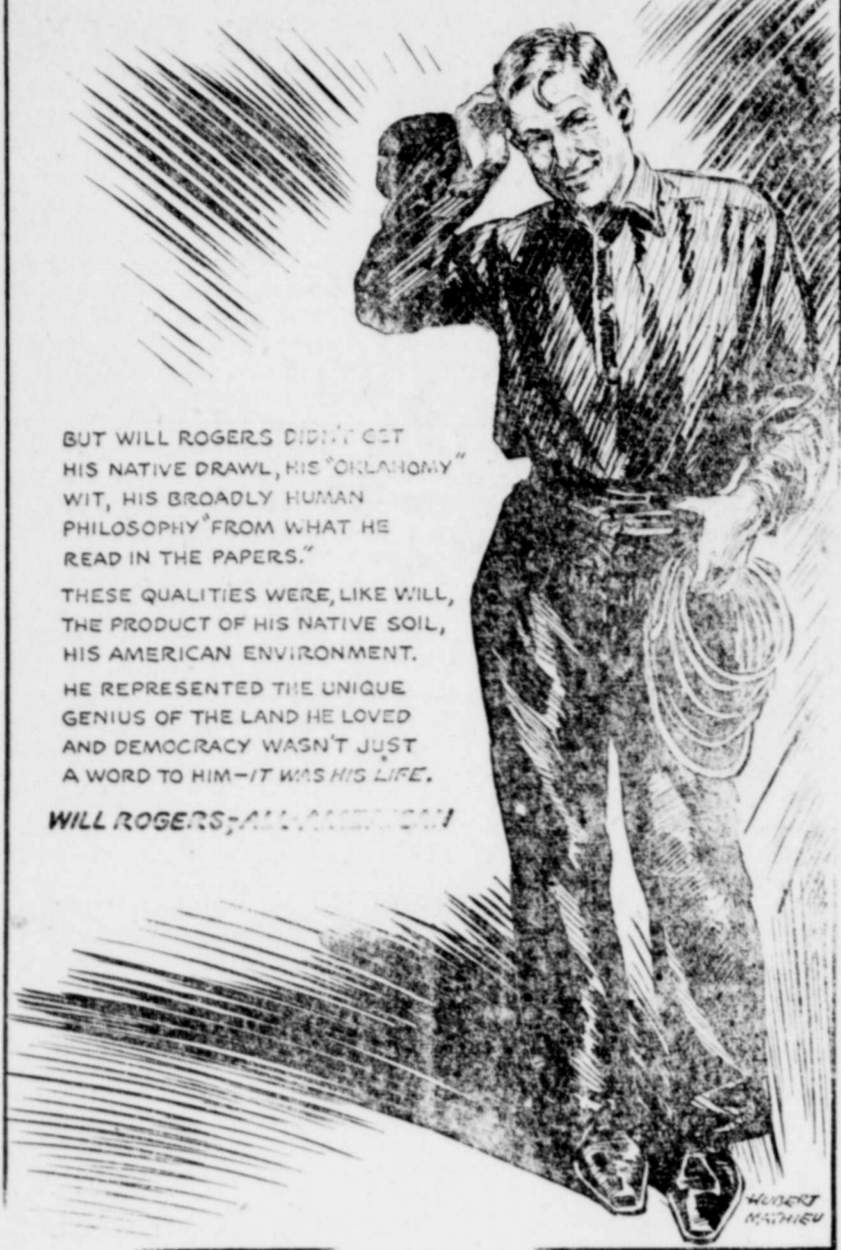

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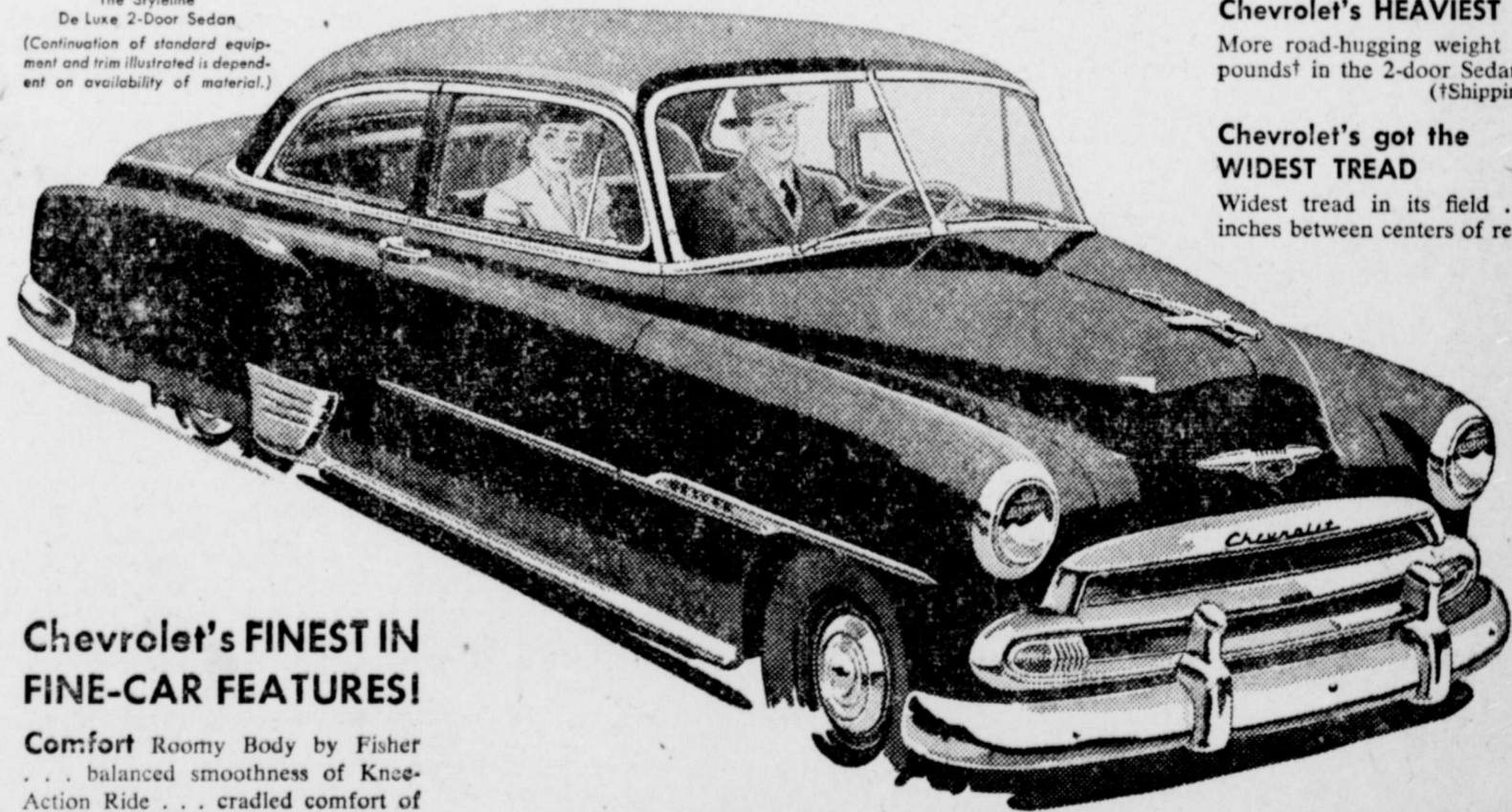
