DENVER—Sandy Lorraine, the young desperado, was shot by Deputy Leathery, is still alive. Leathery has not been arrested. It is supposed he escaped to the Red River bottoms.

HILLSBORO—A meeting of the business men of Hillsboro was held at the depot yesterday evening for the purpose of devising ways and means by which numerous bad roads leading to this point can be placed in proper condition for the fall.

BRIDGEPORT—While the little child of L. S. Scriber was playing about the yard it walked into a fire where a tin can was burning and the little fellow's feet were badly burned.

FOKNEY—The three blacksmith shops at this place are crowded with work and the consequence is they have increased their force. Business is doing well for some time past.

SAN ANTONIO—The remains of the late Colonel George Gibson, of the Fifth Infantry, have been taken to Carlisle, Pa., for interment, being accompanied by Major Charles McClure, of the same department.
