

Combine gelatine, salt, and spices; add hot water and stir until gelatine is dissolved. Chill. When slightly thickened, fold in combined fruits, nuts, and Grape-Nuts. Turn into mold. Chill until firm. Unmold. Serve with whipped cream flavored with nutmeg. Makes 10 servings.

## Texas 4-H Winners Go to Chicago









TATE championship honors for 1951 have been won by four 4-H Club members in Texas for outstanding work in the National Farm and Home Safety, Food Preparation, Health and Home Improvement programs. Their awards are all-expense trips to the 30th National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago, November 25-29. Brief outlines of their records follow:

Billy Whitt, 16, of Muenter, has demonstrated what vigilant safety practices can mean to a State 4-H Safety champion. By means of surveys, demonstrations and clean-up compaigns, he has made his home and community more safety-conscious and has helped to prevent accidents. His industry also won for him the General Motors trip award. Dur-ing seven years in 4-H he has established an enviable record in leadership and in publicizing club work, having made 93 talks at meetings and on the radio and written 120 stories for release. He worked at distributing 500 Farm Safety sheets, and in making surveys on nei farms as well a his own. on neighbors'

A comforta : and attractive home is no probem to the Mullins family of McDa le since daughter Jeanie, 16, has become interested in the 4-H Home Improvement program. As state winner in the 1951 program she was awarded a trip to Chciago as guest of The Sears-Roebuck Foundation. Jeanie spent four years trans-forming her farm home, where she lives with her parent and younger brother and sister, into a place where they would all enjoy living. Her first big job was redoing her bedroom, which Jeanie says, was a mixture of dark antique furniture and linoleum of a sickly tan that clashed with faded wallpaper. Jeanie went to work with paint, brush, and sandpaper. The completed room boasted meadowgreen walls, white woodwork, green and white linoleum, and pastel green furniture.

Acclaimed 4-H Health Improvement winner in Texas for 1951, Mary Scott, 16, of Brownsville, received a trip to Chicago as guest of the Kellogg Co. of Battle Creek. Untiring efforts to imrove her own health and the health habits of family and community, earned for her this recognition. The Health program for her 4-H Club was started last year and her energetic promotion caused interest in better health to spread to the public school. The severe weather of last January caused considerable hardship among the migratory workers and Mary Helen and her club contributed much to their being by helping provide food and clothing.

The art of cooking has real meaning to Mary Ann Goertz, 18, of Red Rock, state winner in the 4-H Food Preparation program. Developing an understanding of the selection and preparation of nutritious foods, she has put these skills into daily use. The result has been improved eating habits for herself and family, as well as a considerable saving in food bills. A 4-H'er for eight years, Mary Ann has completed 45 projects, many of them relating to good and gar-dening. In her community and church she is recognized as a leader who willingly gives of her time and energy. She is usually made chairman of food committees and has had charge of serving dinners to a group of 200 people. In Food Preparation she has a total of 3,855 quarts of food canned, 1,000 pounds forzen, and 5,875 meals served. Mary Ann's trip was presented by Kelvinator.

All of these activities are conducted under the direction of the Extension Service of the State Agricultural College and USDA cooperating.

America. In setting price ceilings on liquor, the Office of Price Stabilization has now established whiskey as a necessity

OPS concentration on whiskey has caused Washington cynics to & comment

"Without whiskey many of these nonsensical orders could have never been written so naturally it's a necessity in Washington".

OPS went in- C. W. Harder to whiskey deeply, too, for printed orders, publicity, etc., are among most elaborate set up on any commodity.

Just one of the whiskey price orders took 14 pages of newsprint, and many supplemental orders were also issued. \* \* \*

And all this concentration on possible high whiskey prices came at a time when whiskey stocks are the highest ever. \* \* \*

This surplus of whiskey was amply illustrated by another OPS order on bulk whiskey which set the ceiling price on four year old, 100 proof bourbon at \$3.96 per gallon. And the OPS also split hairs, or rather gallons, to determine that corn whiskey the same age is only worth \$3.38 per gallon.

\* \* \* But when it comes to wasting tax dollars on foolishness, the young OPS is a mere bush leaguer compared to the older Marshall Plan. Commerce Dept. just reports U. S. imports from Marshall Plan nations have doubled to reach over billion dollar mark since Korea. The imports are principally iron and steel products and textiles.

But at the same time the Marshall Plan announces that over \$1 million worth of iron, steel and pig iron, and almost \$1 million worth of textiles has been given to Yugoslavia.

And at the same time the Defense Production Administration issues a bulletin stating that lead and copper are in critically short supply.

But DPA apparently forgot to tell Marshall Plan officials about this, for shortly after it is announced \$5,369,000 worth of lead and copper has been given to

This has led to a new definition of free trade in Washington.

"We buy from them the things which we give them free".

And as already mentioned, OPS spends days working out price control on whiskey based on 1947 prices, yet the newsprint price of vital concern to the last stronghold of the American independent free press, the weekly newspaper, has skyrocketed. Shortage of newsprint is the excuse given.

But ECA Bulletin No. 37 reports the Marshall Plan has bought \$270,000 worth of news-print in Canada to give Yugoslavia. And as is well known, any Yugoslavian editor who uses this newsprint to print the truth would have to have a hole in his head. Or rather, if he did print the truth, Tito would see that he would have a hole in his head.

These are but a few of the many reasons why Congressmen are not having a happy holiday.

Folks back home are taking the viewpoint that individual Congressmen have not protected the American home. That is why new Congressional session may be stormy. Many Congressmen will return with feeling they are on probation.
