

Rainfall here last year was not quite half of the yearly normal fall if one takes the record back to week and decided to take the play 1925. The average for the 27-year to Christoval on Friday night, Janperiod has been 20.97 and last year's rain was only 9.89 inches. The only year with less rainfall was 1933 with 9.79 or only a tenth of an inch less than 1950. All these figures are from J. T. Davis' reports which he has kept for the weather bureau through the years. The year 1941 was the one with the highest rainfall being 40.70 and a close second was 1932 with 38.38.

According to the table of records there hasn't been very much rain here at any one given time since September of 1950. After September of 1950 only a bit over ten inches has been recorded. What few good showers fell last summer, were all dried up immediately by the excessive heat.

It was voted by the members for two of the members to visit the hospital each week and see if the sick needed anything.


