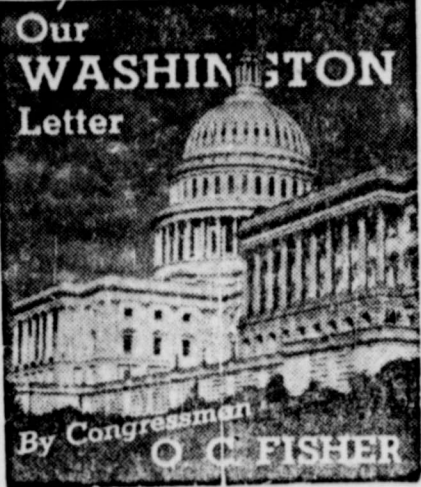

With this first Newsletter of 1952, I extend my greetings and best wishes to each of you for the New Year. Though it's too much to hope for, it is my wish that the best day you had in 1951 may be the worst for you in '52.

During the past three months I have had the privilege of visiting in most of the counties of our large 27-county district. I made more than 40 appearances before different groups, including Farm Bureau meetings, Soil Conservation, REA, PMA, livestock producers, Angora Association, School and College assemblies, Chamber of Commerce, Service Clubs, and a multitude of other meetings. As I made the rounds I had a chance to talk personally with hundreds of friends and constituents and to obtain the benefit of their views on many complex problems with which our Nation is faced today.

Everywhere in our area the drought is, of course, taking its toll, and along with this misfortune there is a very serious shortage of labor to carry on ranching and farming operations.

I found the people to be of one mind on most of the basic issues with which we are confronted. They are very properly concerned about high taxes, the magnitude of the public debt and the present-day cost of government. Most of the people want this ration made strong and powerful during the critical and uncertain times. But they loath the waste and extravagance by the military as well as all other agencies.

They feel there has been poor judgment used by the Executive branch in hiring many key officials and that the Congress has acted with wisdom and propriety in exposing crime and corruption wherever it could be found. Many expressed the hope that these investigations be continued so long as they seem to be doing any good.

**THE PRESIDENT'S ACTION** in calling for a complete revamping of the Bureau of Internal Revenue, with the offices of Collectors to be abolished and most key officials put under Civil Service, offers a plan patterned after the Hoover-Commission recommendations. The proposal will receive the attention of the Congress early in the session. While coming at a late date, the plan seems to be basically sound. There is no way of preventing dishonesty and corruption if dishonest or corrupt men are employed, whether under Civil Service or not. But the reorganization should discourage a practice of political rewards in making appointments, and thru an independent inspection service, should be a very proper step in the right direction.

Commissioner of Internal Revenue John Dunlap, is said to be about the busiest man in Washington these days. Having taken over the job last summer after having served as Collector of Internal Revenue at Dallas, he has been prying into the caliber of personnel and has removed a lot of them. He has disclosed that a total of 166 employees of the tax agency were fired or forced to resign in 1951, including six Collectors. Dunlap and thousands of other Federal employees are considered to be honest, but it seems that he inherited a good many politically inspired appointees who turned out to be corrupt.

**TIDELANDS** is due to be acted upon by the Senate this Spring. A bill to confirm title to our tidelands in Texas was passed by the House last July by a vote of 265 to 109—more than enough to override a veto. But the margin may be closer in the Senate despite the valiant efforts of Senator Connally, Senator Johnson and others.

Spearheading the opposition will be Senator O'Mahoney of Wyoming and Senators who are closely aligned with labor union pressure. Both the CIO and the AFL have been very active in supporting the Administration's grab of our tidelands.

If anyone desires seats, tickets may be bought from Mrs. Lee Reed, Mrs. Finis Westbrook, Mrs. Harvey Glass, Mrs. Reynolds Foster or Mrs. David Glass. Money raised will be used by the P.T.A. for carrying on their activities of the year.

The concert consists of a variety of musical selections. One will hear solos by sopranos, mezzo-sopranos, baritone, piano numbers violin pieces, harpsicord, and other musical instruments.

The program is under the direction of Walter Hodgson, dean of music at North Texas. Miss Susan Houser of Big Spring will be heard as a mezzo-soprano. Miss Francene Pearce of Crane, violinist, will appear on the program.

The R. T. Caperton Chevrolet Company here is to be the only inspection station that we have heard of around here to examine the cars for defects, under the new Texas inspection law. Defects are to be noted and pointed out by the inspection stations and car owners will, in order to comply with the new law, have to get them corrected in order to get new license plates.

If a car is found defective as to lights, brakes, etc., the defect is called to the attention of the owner. Then he should (or will have to) have them remedied and a later inspection before he can get the new plates.

Caperton, who said his license to act as an official inspection station, should be in next week, said that the repairs do not have to be made at the inspection station, but the car owner may have them done at any place he chooses.

## JOHN DEAN MULLINS DIES

John Dean Mullins, 29, died in San Angelo Monday, January 7, of carbon monoxide poisoning. Burial was in Wichita Falls on Wednesday afternoon of this week.

Survivors include three brothers, Joe of Sterling City, C. W., H. R. and Tommy of Wichita Falls. Mr. and Mrs. M. Z. Brown and Joe Mullins of Sterling attended the services.

Last week the magazine **LABOR**, representing 15 railroad unions, joined in the demand that Uncle Sam gobble oil reserves under the tidelands along the coasts where ownership in the States was recognized for more than 150 years. In the case of Texas, ownership was defined in the annexation agreement in 1845. It is believed here that most of the labor unions in Texas are not in sympathy with the attitude of the parent unions in the North with respect to the tidelands issue.

## Bank Directors Relected And Officers Renamed

All directors of the First National Bank here were re-elected Tuesday at a meeting of stockholders.

At a meeting of the directors, bank officers and employees were re-elected. They are: Davis, president; Cole, executive vice-president; R. T. Foster, vice-president; H. M. Knight, cashier; Miss Sue Nelson, assistant cashier; and Mrs. Nan Davis, bookkeeper.

It was announced that the bank paid a 20 per cent dividend on the capital stock and a 20 per cent bonus to all employees.

Loans and discounts at the close of 1951 were listed at \$435,394.52 and deposits at \$3,411,271.43.

## Last Year's Rainfall Was Not Halfway Normal

Rainfall here last year was not quite half of the yearly normal fall if one takes the record back to 1925. The average for the 27-year period has been 20.97 and last year's rain was only 9.89 inches.

The only year with less rainfall was 1933 with 9.79 or only a tenth of an inch less than 1950. All these figures are from J. T. Davis' reports which he has kept for the weather bureau through the years.

The year 1941 was the one with the highest rainfall being 40.70 and a close second was 1932 with 38.38.

According to the table of records there hasn't been very much rain here at any one given time since September of 1950. After September of 1950 only a bit over ten inches has been recorded. What few good showers fell last summer, were all dried up immediately by the excessive heat.

## High Honors for Texas 4-H'ers

**HIGH HONORS** have been accorded 4-H'ers for having the best records in the 1951 National 4-H Dress Revue, Farm and Home Electric, Poultry and Tractor Maintenance programs in Texas. Their awards were educational trips to the 30th National 4-H Club Congress, Chicago, November 25-29. Highlights of their records are told below.

Applying the latest scientific developments in poultry and egg production to the home flock, and thereby making a major contribution towards the farm economy, David Behlen, 15, of Gonzales, was named state winner in the 4-H Poultry Achievement program. In Club work seven years, he has raised a flock of 4,533 New Hampshire Reds, White Rocks, Vantresses, Indian River Cross broilers and Cornish Hampshire Crosses. David lives with his parents and his sister on a 350-acre livestock and poultry farm. He has been president of his 4-H Club for the past year. His first project as a 4-H'er got under way when his father gave him a pig. At that time he "made a little profit and learned a great deal." He has gone on learning since then, and his profits have climbed higher and higher.

David's trip was provided by Dearborn Motors.

Electrically-minded Sue Jones, 13, of Iraan, has made the effective use of electricity pay off. State winner in the 4-H Farm and Home Electric program, this young lady has found easier and better ways of putting electric power to work. This has rewarded her with more leisure time and taken the drudgery out of household chores. The full responsibility of home management has fallen on Sue for the last four years but the use of many electric appliances provided by her father has made it possible to continue her school and community activities. She is a fine junior leader and has won several awards. In recognition, Westinghouse Educational Foundation presented Sue with the Chicago trip award.

All of these activities are conducted under the direction of the Extension Service of the State Agricultural College and USDA cooperating.

Rennet Dessert  
Single Serving

½ cup milk (not canned)  
1 scant tablespoon rennet powder\*

Set out 1 dessert glass. Warm milk slowly until lukewarm, stirring constantly. Test a drop on the inside of your wrist frequently. When it feels comfortably warm (110° F.) not hot, remove at once from heat. Stir in rennet powder at one time. Mix until powder is dissolved—not over one minute. Pour at once, while still liquid, into dessert glasses. Do not disturb for about 10 minutes, while milk sets. Then chill in refrigerator until serving time.

\* 1 rounded tablespoon chocolate rennet powder.

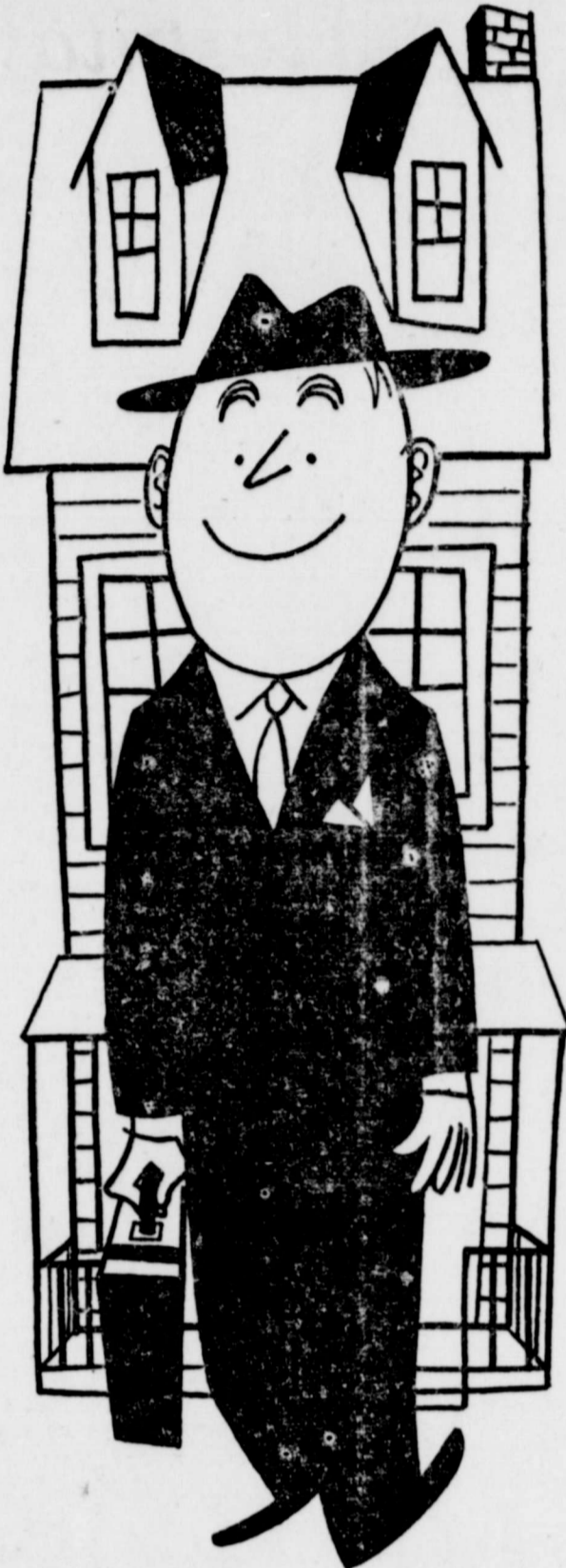
