SCRIMMAGE GAMES TO BENEFIT BASKETBALL GIRLS

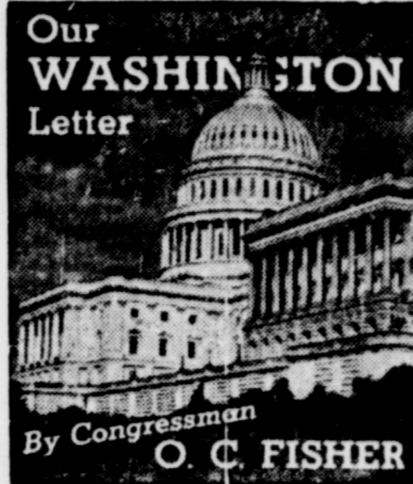

Billy Graham Preaches

A week ago Sunday Rev. Billy Graham made history by preaching a sermon from the steps of the Capitol. It was a rainy, cold day, and it looked for awhile like the meeting would be a washout. But despite the bad weather, the crowd was estimated at from 20 to 40 thousands. I have seen two inaugurations of Presidents since I came to Congress, and cannot recall ever seeing a turn-out that surpassed this one.

The dynamic Evangelist has been conducting a revival at the National Guard Armory here for more than a month. There the crowds have averaged from five to ten thousand each night.

Calling for a return to Christ if our strength and moral fiber is to endure and meet the test of these critical times when "humanity stands at the crossroads", the speaker urged that a day of national prayer be designated similar to the one ordered by Abraham Lincoln while he was President.

VFW Honors Captain Carlsen

At its annual dinner last week, the Veterans of Foreign Wars, with delegates from every state, highlighted their meeting by honoring General Dean and by presenting Captain Kurt Carlsen, heroic skipper of the ill-fated Flying Enterprise, a medal, with a citation reminding of Carlsen's "courageous action aboard the sinking Flying Enterprise, adding to the highest traditions of the sea and to our appraisal of real Americanism, truly admirable examples of outstanding fortitude and loyalty."

The medal was pinned on the Captain by President Truman in behalf of the Veterans.

The third annual Gen. Omar N. Bradley gold medal was presented, in absentia, to Maj. Gen. Wm. F. Dean, now a Communist prisoner. This is the highest award that is given by this great veteran's organization.

Captain Carlsen, here on his first trip to Washington following his harrowing experience, was also honored on Capitol Hill. At one function his success story was praised by a speaker who pointed out that the Danish-born Captain became a success and a national hero by virtue of his own courage and efforts, his own devotion to a task, and all this without a press agent, a promoter or a phony build up. "It wasn't done for political purposes," the admirer continued. "He didn't have to know 'the right people' in order to win his achievement. He didn't get his friends to promote a campaign of make-believe. No; his success was gained thru merit, courage and actual accomplishment. That is the kind of success Americans believe in."

Scrap Iron to Mexico

Export controls over scrap iron moving into Mexico will be tightened and the amount probably reduced a bit this year, according to information furnished me by Charles Sawyer, Secretary of Commerce, who controls exports.

I have repeatedly urged that heavy exports of scrap from this country be curbed unless strong justification is shown, and that even then restrictions be imposed that would take into account our own steel shortage here at home.

Mr. Sawyer reports to me that export quota of 25,000 short tons of scrap and 2,500 tons of pig iron have been established for the first quarter of 1952. This is designed to permit closer coordination between export licensing and domestic supplies.

Scrap export to Mexico last year amounted to 104,000 tons. The year before it was 124,334 tons, and the year before that the figure was 122,218 tons.

The major portion of this scrap goes to an American-owned open hearth furnace plant located in Piedras Negras, fueled by Texas natural gas. Steel ingots are produced there to supply that Company's two rolling mills at Mex-

The American Smelting & Refining Company is the other scrap importer. It, too, is principally American owned, and in addition to the steel plant has many mining operations in Mexico.

There is no export of scrap or of steel products out of Mexico. All is consumed there to sustain Mexican economy and mining operations. In fact, 251,000 tons of finished steel was imported by Mexico last year to supplement their own production from scrap.

By way of comparison, the United States consumed 34 million long tons of scrap iron last year. Our total steel production amounted to about 110 million tons.

Pointing to our imports of lead, copper, zinc and iron ore from Mexico, Mr. Sawyer contends that because of their scarcity and strategic value at this time, the quantity we obtain is "in effect an exchange for the scrap exported by us to Mexico."

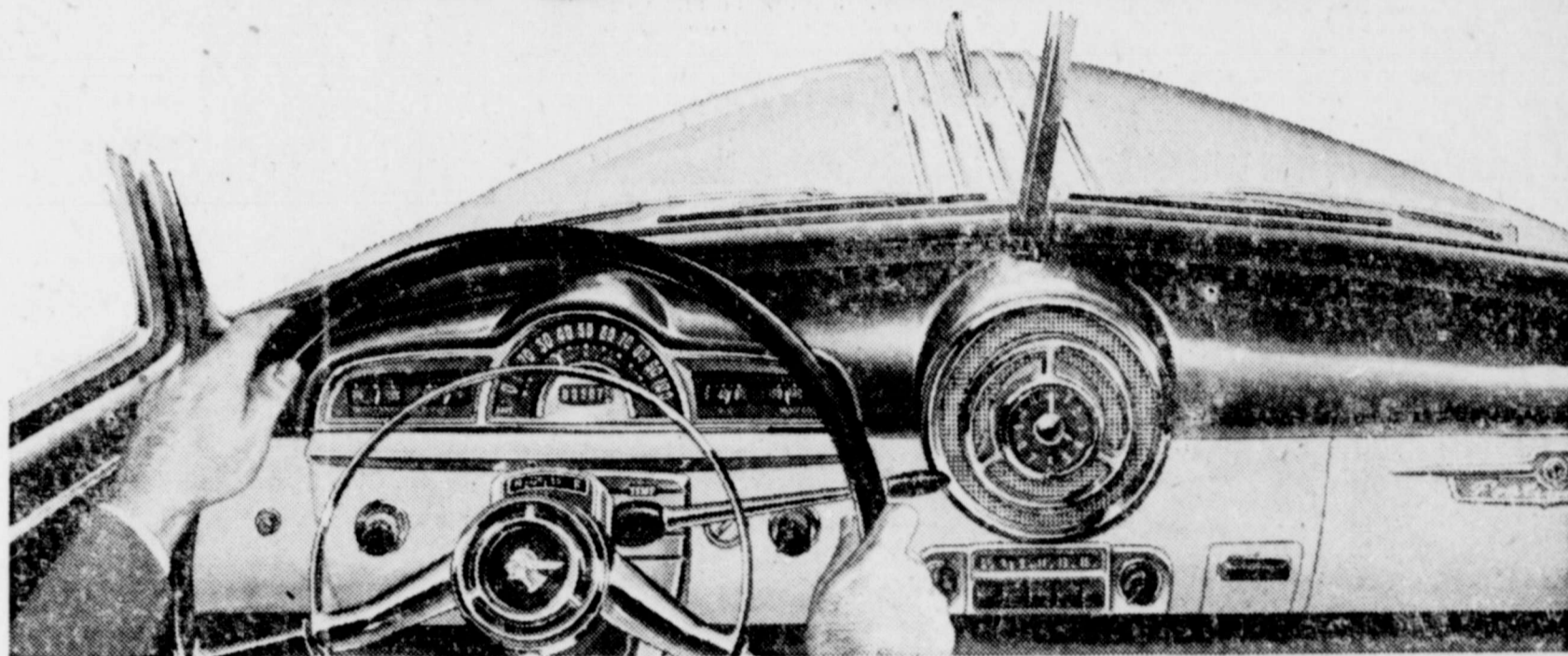

J. Gordon (Obie) Bristow Is Candidate for State Legislature

Formal announcement of his candidacy for the Texas Legislature from this district is being made by J. Gordon (Obie) Bristow of Big Spring. Bristow this week is completing filing in the six counties of the newly-created 101st district, a result of the Legislature's re-districting measure of last year.

Bristow has been a resident of Big Spring for the past 25 years, having been active in the oil business most of that time. He also has had experience as a school teacher and athletic coach.

Bristow said he hoped to make frequent tours over the district between now and the July Democratic primaries, and to contact as many voters as possible in person. "I want to know better the folks of the new 101st district, and I want them to know me," he said.

"I am not making any sort of 'crusade' in seeking this office, nor do I represent any interests whatsoever," Bristow said. "I simply want to go to Austin and do my humble best for what I think is right for our section of the state and for all of Texas. I intend to try to be an honest and conscientious representative of all the people."
