ROSALIE GAITAN Lions Honor Minstrel **KILLED IN CAR CRASH** Cast With Ladies Night LAST FRIDAY Dinner

Rosalie Gaitan, 26, was instantly killed in a car crash last Friday late afternoon. The car she was clear of the car and reportedly over a telephone wire. She died instantly and he companion was seriously injured.

The owner of the car, Thomas Buchanan Visage of McCamey, was seriously hurt in the accident. He was brought to the Sterling County Hospital suffering from back injuries and bruises and cuts. He is still confined to the local hospital.

Funrela services for Mrs. Gaitan were held here Tuesday morning at the Mexican Catholic Church and burial followed that afternoon. Lowe's Funeral Chapel was in charge of arrangements.

Among the survivors are her four daughters, Angelia, Margia, Jessie and Josephine; her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Joe Herrera, and three sisters and seven brothers.

The law provides a fine of not to exceed \$200.00 for any person guilty of operating a vehicle after September 7th when such vehicle has not been inspected and approved.
