W. S. Leslie Announces For District Judge

W. S. Leslie, attorney of San Angelo, announces his candidacy for the office of District Judge of the 51st Judicial District, composed of Tom Green, Schleicher, Irion, Coke and Sterling Counties.

"Proper administration of justice," says Mr. Leslie, "is America's first line of defense against communism."

"I believe that our courts should be equally open to all people, and that the presiding judge should be as impartial as human ability and diligent effort can make possible."

"I believe the courts should be open at all times, and that the presiding judge should engage in no other business that will take him away from his official duties."

"I believe in the diligent co-operation of the judge in the elimination of unnecessary delays, and in the elimination of waste of time by jurors and parties to suits."

Mr. Leslie is a member of a pioneer West Texas family, having been born and reared in Scurry County, and being the son and grandson of ministers who blazed the West Texas Trail. He is 54 years of age and came to San Angelo just over 18 years ago. For six and a half years, in addition to the regular practice of law, he served as City Judge of the city of San Angelo under several changes in the city administration.

He is a World War I veteran, having volunteered at the age of 18, and for approximately 18 months was overseas with the 169th Aero Squadron, serving with Pershing's First Army in the battle of "The Meuse", "Defensive Sector", "St. Mihiel" and "Argonne Forest," having been in the Meuse-Argonne sector when the Armistice was

signed November 1, 1918. After returning home, he attended Texas University and Baylor University and graduated with an L.L.B. in 1925. He began the practice of law in Bay City, Matagorda County, in 1925, and continued there until the spring of 1934, when he came to San Angelo.

Mr. Leslie has taken an active part in civic affairs. He has served as a member and vice-president of the Board of Directors of the Board of City Development of San Angelo. He is a member of the First Baptist Church, the Masonic Lodge, the Kiwanis Club, and two of San Angelo's Veteran organizations, having served two terms as Post Advocate of the San Angelo VFW, three terms as Post Commander of the American Legion here and at Bay City, and two terms as Judge Advocate of the American Legion Department of Texas.

Mr. Leslie and his wife, formerly Miss Stella Cobb of Brady, Texas, reside at 1519 Shafter in San Angelo, Texas. He has one daughter, Mrs. Mitchell May, who resides in Shreveport, La.

He has practiced in all State and Federal Courts, including the Appel-

late Courts. "I believe that I can contribute to the preservation of American ideas and ideals by presiding over your court with fairness, impartiality and diligence."

"I believe that special attention should be given to the problem of juvenile delinquents in an effort to develop them into useful citizens instead of permitting them to become criminals; and to that end I shall devote a considerable part of my time to the development of a practical plan for setting youngsters' erring feet upon a solid road to good citizenship."

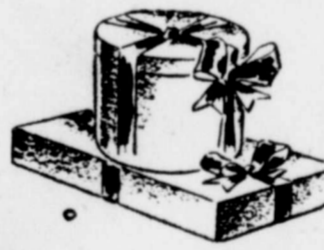
