The original gasoline barrel marked "Danger—Gasoline-1912" is now located at his modern station in Sterling City and is a classic example of the progress of the petroleum industry.

Mr. Dickerson, who is Vice President of the Shell Oil Company in Midland, was in Sterling City May 22 for an organization meeting of the local OIIC committee.







Chocolate Spice Cake 2 cups sifted cake flour

1/4 teaspoon soda teaspoon salt teaspoon cloves

teaspoon allspice teaspoon cinnamon cup shortening 1% cups sugar

> eggs, unbeaten 3 squares unsweetened chocolate, melted

Buttermilk (see below for amount) 1 teaspoon vanilla

*With butter, margarine, or lard, use 1 cup buttermilk. With vegetable or any other shortening, use 11/4 cups buttermilk.

Sift flour once, measure, add soda, salt and spices, and sift together three times. Cream shortening, add sugar gradually, and cream together until light and fluffy. Add eggs, one at a time, beating well after each. Add melted chocolate and blend. Then add flour, alternately with buttermilk, a small amount at a time, beating after addition until smooth. Add vanilla;

Turn batter into two round 9-inch layer pans, which have been lined on bottoms with paper. Bake in moderate oven (375° F.) 30 minutes, or until Spread tops and sides of layers Seven Minute Frosting. While with Seven Minute Frosting. still soft, carefully press down chocolate chips into the frosting to spell out the words "To Mom."

Chocolate Caramel Icing

1 cup sifted confectioners' sugar cup cocoa teaspoon salt

cup light or dark corn syrup cup butter or margarine. 1 teaspoon vanilla

Sift together confectioners' sugar, cocoa and sait. Combine corn syrup and butter in a saucepan. Cook over medium heat, until mixture comes to a full boil. Remove from heat. Add sifted dry ingredients all at once to syrup mixture in saucepan. Beat with

10-inch tube cake or 9x13-inch load

Note: Three squares unsweetened chocolate may be substituted for cocoa. Add chocolate to corn syrup-butter mixture. Stir while mixture is heating. Cook until chocolate is melted and mixture comes to a full boil.

Coconut Fruit Roll % cup light brown sugar, firmly

packed 2 teaspoons light corn syrup ½ cup milk

½ teaspoon vanilla 1/2 cup chopped raisins

1/2 cup chopped dates 11/2 cups shredded coconut

Combine sugar, corn syrup, and milk. Place over low heat and stir constantly until sugar is dissolved and mixture boils. Continue boiling until a small amount of mixture forms a a small amount of mixture forms a soft ball in cold water (or to a temperature of 234°F.). Remove from heat. Cool slightly. Add vanilla and beat until creamy. Add fruit and coconut and knead well. Shape into rolls, 1½ inches in diameter. Wrap in waxed paper; chill. Cut in slices. Makes 8 dozen slices.

Three cups shredded coconut may be substituted for raisins, dates, and co-
