



Vote-Winning Dessert

However, when voting for your favorite dessert, here is a tried and true campaigner that will appeal to ALL AGES. So you good people who are in favor of a "food plat-form" calling for tastier dessert treats that are healthful as well as delicious-just cast your culinary "vote" for the following:

Fruit Cocktail Rennet Dessert 1 package vanilla rennet powder 2 cups milk (not canned) 1/2 cup well-drained fruit cocktail Whipped cream

Divide fruit cocktail among 4 or 5 dessert glasses. Warm milk slowly until lukewarm, stirring constantly. Test a drop on the inside of your wrist frequently. When it feels comfortably warm (110° F.) not hot, * remove at once from heat. Stir in entire contents of package at one time. Mix until powder is dissolved-not over one minute. Pour at once, while still liquid, into dessert glasses. Do not disturb for about 10 minutes, while milk sets. Then chill in refrigerator until serving time. Just before serving. top each dessert with whipped cream and a maraschino cherry.

*If milk gets too hot, cool to comfortably warm before adding powder, or it will not set.


