FIVE AIRMEN ARE HURT IN WRECK NEAR HERE LAST WEEK

A 1-car crash near here Thursday night of last week resulted in injuries to five airmen stationed at Webb Air Force Base, Big Spring. Hospitalized with injuries were William John Wolff, Jr. of Atlanta, Ga., Lee Shadrack of Ferguson, Mo., and Joseph Harrington of Woodside, N. Y.

Also injured and treated briefly were Robert D. Kohn and George M. Sylvis. Both were returned to Big Spring.

Sheriff Bill Green said the car in which the five enlisted men were riding went out of control on a curve, swerved off the right wing of a culvert and butted the wing of the other side.

The car said Green, was completely demolished. He said it was determined who was driving at the time.

The five, who had previously been stationed at Goodfellow Field near San Angelo, were traveling toward San Angelo in an old model car owned by Kohn when the accident occurred eight miles northwest of Sterling City. A Lowe ambulance brought two of the men in and others were brought in cars.

The Congressman paid tribute to the American heroes through whose gallantry and sacrifices our freedom has been preserved. "It is your job and mine", he reminded, "to vindicate those sacrifices, and that can be done only if we maintain a strong, solvent Free Enterprise Nation under the Constitution. The liberties which so many of our citizens takes so lightly today are blood-bequeathed legacies and were paid for by the lives of brave American patriots of the past."

Fisher lashed out at forms of creeping socialism which tends to paralyze initiative. "Why do we have to borrow discredited socialistic schemes, such as socialized medicine, socialized agriculture (Branan Plan) and socialized housing, from the bankrupt British system?" he asked.

This housing policy was borrowed from Britain, Fisher explained, and is now actually in use in this country—and is gaining momentum. More than 800,000 housing units are planned, with 200,000 already built or under construction. Tenants in these government-owned projects often pay only about one-half of normal rent values.

"You, the taxpayers, are paying for this experiment in state socialism", he continued, explaining that he and many other Southern Congressmen have always opposed it. "The taxpayers will eventually dig down into their pockets and pay upwards of \$20 billion for these socialized housing projects. You will help pay the rent bills for those tenants every month for 40 years, just like the British government is doing for their public housing tenants."

A lot depends on who the Demos nominate later this month—or at least a little depends on it.

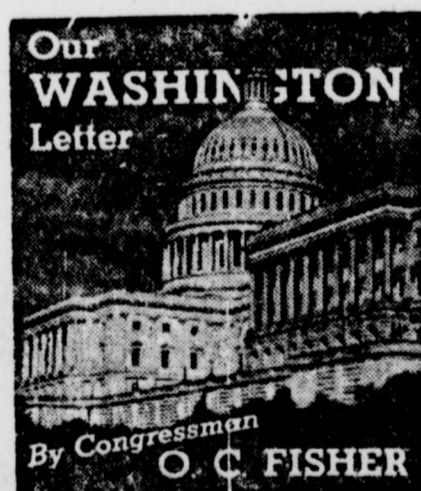
Maybe Harry S. T. will be drafted. He could be, you know.

Yes-siree, this is an election year—and although it may seem a bit early, the air will be filled with campaign ribbons and buttons of all kinds, before you know it. Even the kiddies will be vote conscious as a result of newspapers, magazines, radio and television—or from hearing "Dad" and the next door neighbor engaging in a word battle over various parties and policies.

However, when voting for your favorite dessert, here is a tried and true campaigner that will appeal to ALL AGES. So you good people who are in favor of a "food platform" calling for tastier dessert treats that are healthful as well as delicious—just cast your culinary "vote" for the following:

Fruit Cocktail Rennet Dessert
1 package vanilla rennet powder
2 cups milk (not canned)
1/2 cup well-drained fruit cocktail
Whipped cream

Divide fruit cocktail among 4 or 5 dessert glasses. Warm milk slowly until lukewarm, stirring constantly. Test a drop on the inside of your wrist frequently. When it feels comfortably warm (110° F.) not hot,* remove at once from heat. Stir in entire contents of package at one time. Mix until powder is dissolved—not over one minute. Pour at once, while still liquid, into dessert glasses. Do not disturb for about 10 minutes, while milk sets. Then chill in refrigerator until serving time. Just before serving, top each dessert with whipped cream and a maraschino cherry.

*If milk gets too hot, cool to comfortably warm before adding powder, or it will not set.
