HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 38 providing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by the addition of a new Section to be known as Section 50a, providing for the establishment of a State Medical Education Board and a State Medical Scholarship Fund from which grants, loans or scholarships may be made to students desiring to study medicine; providing that such students shall agree to practice in rural areas of this State; providing certain restrictions and limitations; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as Section 50a which shall read as follows:

"Sec. 50a. The Legislature shall create a State Medical Education Board to be composed of not more than six (6) members whose qualifications, duties and terms of office shall be prescribed by law. The Legislature shall also establish a State Medical Education Fund and make adequate appropriations therefor to be used by the State Medical Education Board to provide grants, loans or scholarships to students desiring to study medicine and agreeing to practice in the rural areas of this State, upon such terms and conditions as shall be prescribed by law. The term 'rural areas' as used in this Section shall be defined by law."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1952, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines the machines shall provide for) the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for the establishment of a State Medical Education Fund from which grants, loans or scholarships may be made to students desiring to study medicine."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing for the establishment of a State Medical Education Fund from which grants, loans or scholarships may be made to students desiring to study medicine."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment; and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

H. J. R. No. 38
Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. The expense of publication and election for such amendment shall be paid out of proper appropriation made by law.

Mays and Vinson In Only TOWN SPRAYED ON TUESDAY

There will be a run-off election of the Democratic Primary here on Saturday, August 23. Such was announced by Jack Douthit, County Chairman this week. Only one race holds any interest for local voters, however, and that is the race of Joe Mays and Clyde Vinson for the post of 51st Judicial District Judge. Mays led Vinson in the first primary as a whole over the district, but Vinson led in Schleicher and Irion Counties. In Sterling County Mays got 177 votes with Vinson 115. The third man in the race, W. S. Leslie, received 91.

On the ballot there will be the listing of Mays and Vinson for the post now held by John F. Sutton; Martin Dies' name on the Congressman at large race with no opponent listed; and Spurgeon Bell and Frank P. Culver running of the primary for Associate Justice of the Supreme Court (Place 1).

So, really, there is only two contested races on the ballot for Sterling county. In some counties there are several county and district places being run-off.

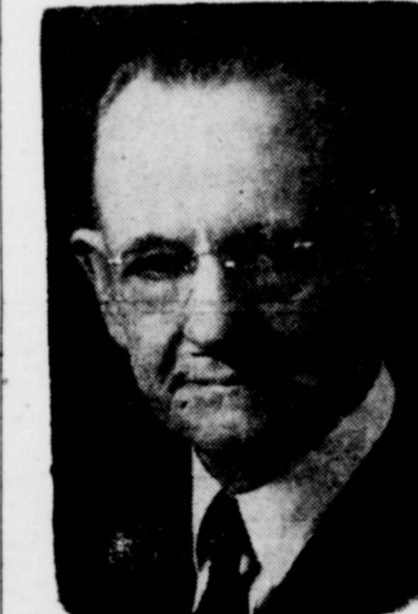

Both Campbell and H. A. Chapple, president of the Lions Club, expressed their thanks and gratitude to the ranchers, helpers and all who assisted in anyway with the campaigns this year.

They, and the community feel that if the campaigns helped hold polio away from here, and keep the fly and mosquito population down, the time and effort was well spent.

Use the open kettle method for jams, preserves, relishes and pickles, but this method is not a reliable one for canning fruits and tomatoes.

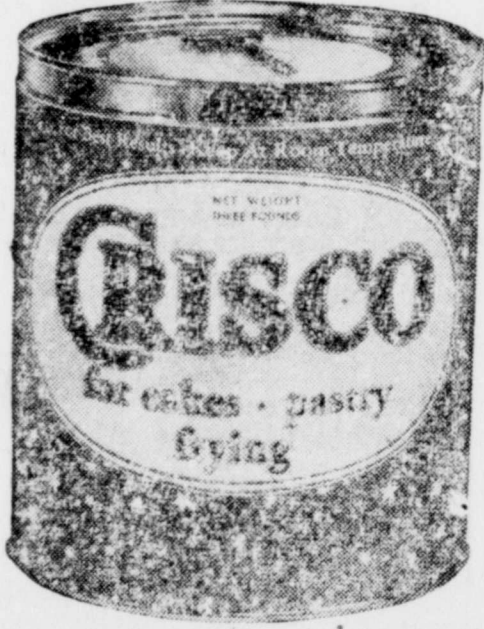
Dad Hawkins inspired this column today. He's really studied up on lightning since his own cow barn was struck that time.

"Trouble is, most of us don't know half enough about the subject," Dad says. "And about half of what we do know is false!"

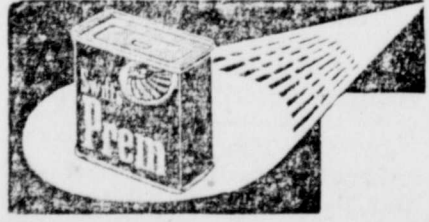

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 70
proposing an Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 61 to authorize cities, towns, and villages of this State to provide insurance for employees; providing for the submission of the proposed Amendment to the qualified elector; and providing for proclamation and publication by the Governor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 61 to read as follows:

"Sec. 61. The Legislature shall have the power to enact laws to enable cities, towns, and villages of this State to provide Workmen's Compensation Insurance, including the right to provide their own insurance risk for all employees; and the Legislature shall provide suitable laws for the administration of such insurance in the said municipalities and for payment of the costs, charges, and premiums on policies of insurance and the benefits to be paid thereunder."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the State at the General Election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1952, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (a) in counties using voting machines the said machines shall provide for the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for Workmen's Compensation Insurance for employees of cities, towns and villages"; and

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for Workmen's Compensation Insurance for employees of cities, towns and villages."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one (1) expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment; and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

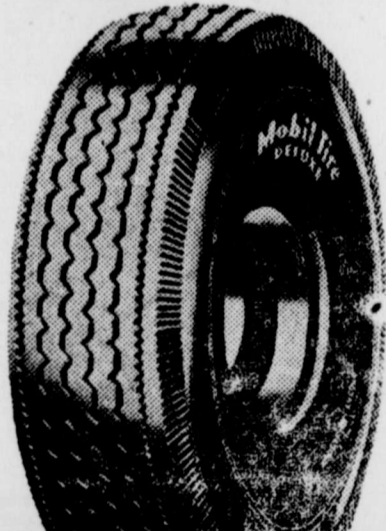
Every spring, young fancies lightly turn to thoughts of picnicking—and a healthy sign it is, for what child eats a delicately prepared meal in the open air! Appetites run wild, and nothing tastes so good as a freshly toasted hamburger. You can stretch the meat for the onslaught and add a new and delicious nutty tang to this old favorite by mixing in a quantity of ready to eat cereal flakes. The recipe is so simple that the picnic is likely to be as much fun for Mother as it will be for the children. Enlist their help in mixing or in wrapping the patties in wax paper and arranging them in the basket. And—make enough for an army!

Hamburger Toasties

½ pound ground beef, 1 cup Grape-Nuts Flakes, slightly crushed; 1 teaspoon salt; dash of pepper; 3 to 4 tablespoons milk or water.
