Mr. and Mrs. J. Q. Foster have returned from a reunion of the 403rd Bombing Squadron, that was held in Omaha, Nebraska.

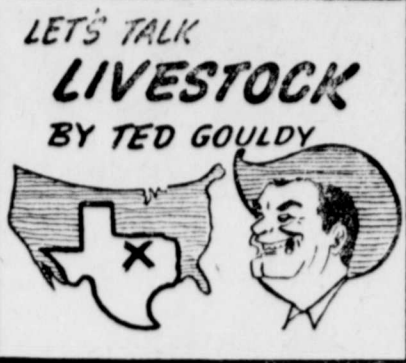

FORT WORTH—Heavy movement of cattle and calves continued this week. However, a stronger stocker and feeder market and broader demand for replacement cattle and calves helped prices away to a better start at Fort Worth Monday. Fat calves shared the stronger market. Many sales of stockers and fat calves were \$1 or more above a week ago at Fort Worth. First interest in many weeks in lightweight calves this week resulted in some calf sales sharply higher for their kind. Typical was a lot of 42 calves at 216 pounds at \$24.50. Hugh Rogers, Knox County, had 32 stock-steer yearlings at 521 lbs. at \$22.50, with 31 heifers at 493 lbs. at \$18. G. R. White, Brady, had cows at \$14.50 and \$15.50. Curtis Martin, Motley County, sold cows at \$14 and \$16 at Fort Worth Monday, Mrs. Jessie Mae Williams, Midland, had three loads of 961-lb. cows at \$12.50. C. F. Mock, Oklahoma, had two loads of 1,152-lb. steers at \$29.

Lambs were strong to 50 cents higher at Fort Worth Monday, and ewes were mostly 50 cents up. Feeders and yearlings ruled steady. Good and choice fed steers and yearlings drew \$23 to \$31, and plain and medium sorts sold from \$14 to \$21, with cutter grades from \$10 to \$13. Fat cows cashed at \$13 to \$16, a few heiferettes to \$18. Cannons and cutters cleared at \$7 to \$13. Bulls sold from \$10 to \$18.50.

Good and choice slaughter calves sold for \$18 to \$23, with fancy heavyweights of 500 to 600 pounds at \$23 to \$26. Plain and medium butcher sorts cashed at \$14 to \$17, with cull sorts from \$10 to \$13.

Hogs topped at \$18, lowest since April, 1952. Sows drew \$14 to \$16.50. Good and choice stocker calves ranged from \$17 to \$24.50, some mixed steer and heifer calves averaging 216 pounds at \$24.50, and some plain and medium kinds sold from \$13 to \$17. Stocker steer yearlings cashed at \$14 to \$22.50. Stocker cows drew \$11 to \$18. Several sizeable shipments of feeder steers and heifers sold in the \$16 to \$19 bracket.

Miss Ethel Foster Back From G.F.W.C. Meeting And New York Forum

Miss Ethel Foster returned home Monday from New York and Washington, where she had attended the fall General Federation of Women's Clubs board meeting and the New York Herald-Tribune Forum.

The G.F.W.C. executive meeting was held in the Statler Hotel in Washington, D.C. While there the group was entertained with a tea in the White House. Miss Foster is the treasurer of the G.F.W.C.

From Washington Miss Foster went on to New York where she attended the New York Herald-Tribune's Forum. She was a guest at the forum, as were the other G.F.W.C. executive board members.

The first meeting of the forum was held in the new United Nations building. Trygve Lie opened the forum and the new U.N. president, Lester B. Pearson closed the forum. The program lasted several days. The group was feted by the New York Times at an educational conference, and the agency CARE had them for a meeting. A tea was given honoring the clubwomen by the Dupont Celanese Corporation. In charge of the tea was Mrs. Katherine Hammer, one of the directors of the corporation.

Miss Foster said the finest meeting she attended while in New York was that of the American Cancer Society. The society held its convention there at this time. She is a district lay woman for the state of Texas in the society's set-up. The doctor who operated on Eva Peron appeared at the convention.

The trip covered two week's time, and was well-filled with activities.

The general election will be held next Tuesday, November 4. With an eight-column ballot and two constitutional amendments to be voted on, the ballot is a big one. The eight columns deal with the different political parties, such as Democratic, Republican, Prohibition, Progressive, Christian Nationalist, Constitution, Independent and one for write-ins.

The Democratic column carries the names of Adlai Stevenson and John Sparkman as presidential and vice-presidential nominees at the top. Below are the state, county and district nominees of the party. On the head of the Republican column one finds the names of Dwight D. Eisenhower and Richard M. Nixon for president and vice-president. Thereunder, will be found the same names of the state Democratic nominees for state races in a cross-filing action by the Republicans. There is one exception, being John C. White, nominee of the Demos for Commissioner of Agriculture, who requested that his name not appear on the Republican column.

Heading the Prohibition Party are Stuart Hamblen and E. A. Holtwick. No other names are listed under the Prohibition column. This is also true of all other columns.

Heading the Progressive column are Vincent Hallinan and Charlotte Bass.

Douglas MacArthur heads the Christian Nationalist Party and the Constitution Party, both. But he has Jack B. Tenny listed as his vice-presidential candidate and the Christian Nationalist column and Vivien Kelles on the Constitution column. Some body with just enough money to get his name filed on the ballot accounts for this. The General himself had nothing to do with it and is not running. However it could not be said that he would refuse if elected. His name does not appear on the ballots in all the 43 states, and he is expected to get only a handful of scattered votes.

Texas Democrats have been actively working for the election of Eisenhower as president. One of the resolutions of the State Convention in Amarillo in September was that they would do all in their power as a party towards the election of Dwight D. Eisenhower as president. Texas clearly has a chance to go Republican this year. The pre-election polls seem to point toward a close race, but the poll that really counts is the one next Tuesday by all the voters.

One of the constitutional amendments to be voted upon deals with authorizing the Texas Legislature to provide for Workman's Compensation Insurance. The other deals with the establishment of a state fund to loan money to college students to go to college to study medicine.

Both amendments are given only a slim chance of passing.

Both presidential candidates and the corps of other speakers are in the process of winding up the 1952 political campaign. The campaign started out somewhat on a high level but name-calling and other barbs have brought on one of the most heated campaigns of the past 20 years.

Free Transportation To Polls Tuesday

A concerted effort to get out the vote is being made all over the country and it is hoped that a good turnout will happen here. When everyone eligible votes, the result reflects the will of the people and a more democratic or representative government is gained.

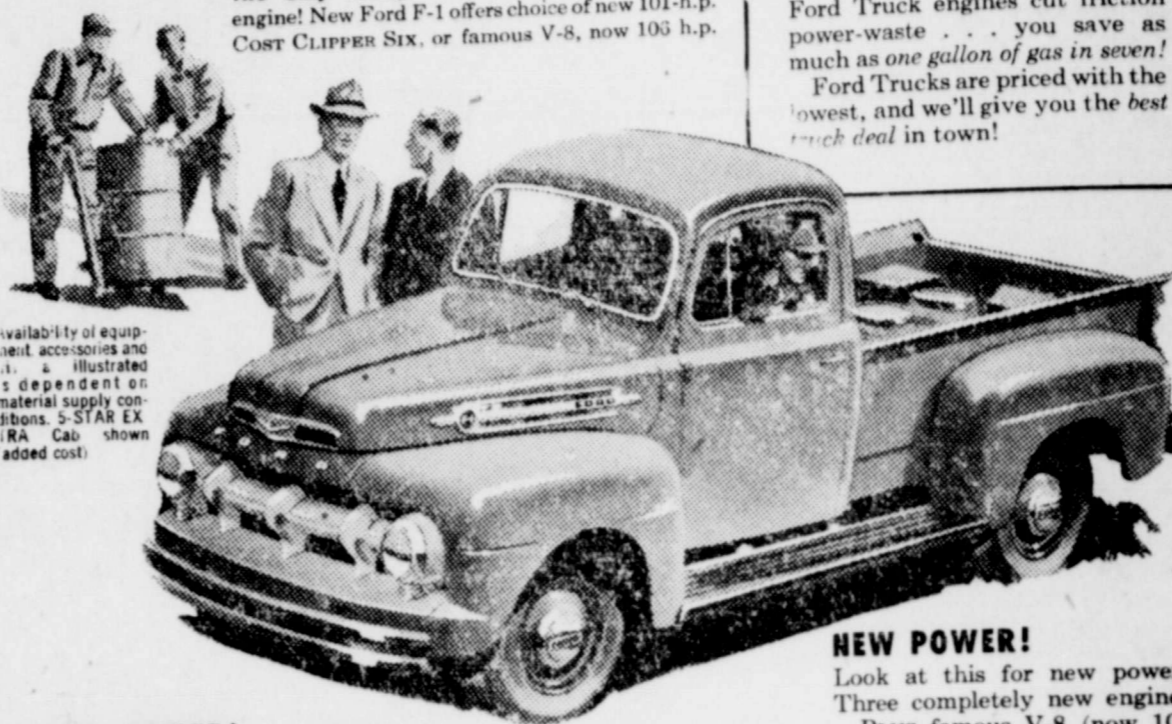

Children have a fine time preparing and eating this apple confection. And it is inexpensive to make!

Apples-on-a-Stick

- 6 red apples
- 6 wooden skewers
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 cup Karo Syrup, Red Label
- 1/2 cup water
- Few drops red vegetable coloring
- Few drops cinnamon or peppermint flavoring

Wash and dry apples; remove stems. Insert skewers in stem end of apples. Combine sugar, light corn syrup, water and red vegetable coloring in saucepan. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly until mixture boils. Then cook without stirring to soft crack stage (280° F.) or until a small amount of mixture separates into threads which are hard but not brittle when tested in very cold water. Remove from heat; add flavoring and stir only enough to mix. To keep syrup from thickening, place pan over boiling water immediately. Hold each apple by skewer end and dip in syrup. Remove quickly and twirl around so syrup spreads smoothly over apples. Place on wire rack over wax paper to cool. Makes sufficient syrup for six apples.

We recommend the following unusual fruit dessert. Cranberries give the compote an attractive color and flavor combination.

Baked Fruit Compote

- 1 cup light corn syrup
- 1/4 cup orange sections
- 1/2 cup uncooked cranberries
- 3 fresh pears, quartered, peeled and cored
- 6 whole cloves
- 1 3-inch stick cinnamon

Place all ingredients in casserole. Cover and bake in moderate oven (350° F.) about 1 hour or until pears are tender. Chill thoroughly before serving. Makes 4 to 6 servings. Omit spices if desired.

A Time Of Changes

EVERY time a new season arrives, it brings changes. The coming Fall months will change the leaves to beautiful red and gold colors; balmy breezes to nippy winds. People, taking their cue from nature, begin to look for changes too—in clothes and in foods. Here we give you an old favorite, lemon pudding and pie filling mix, all dressed up with a new Fall "topper" of gingersnap cookies and whipped cream. One important ingredient in this luscious dessert hasn't changed, however—the ease and speed of preparation that you can count on during all four seasons when you use a prepared pudding and pie filling mix!

Ginger Fluff Pudding
 2 egg yolks, slightly beaten; 2 cups water; 1 package lemon pudding and pie filling mix; 1/2 cup sugar; 2 egg whites; 3 tablespoons sugar; 12 gingersnap cookies (2 3/4 inches); 1 cup cream, whipped.

Mix yolks with 1/2 cup of the water in saucepan. Add pudding mix and 1/2 cup sugar; blend well. Then add remaining water gradually, stirring constantly. Cook and stir over medium heat until mixture comes to a boil and is thickened. Remove from heat.

Beat egg whites until foamy throughout. Add 3 tablespoons sugar gradually and continue beating until mixture will stand in soft peaks. Fold in hot pudding. Turn into 9x9x2-inch serving dish. Chill. Arrange 9 of the cookies on top and spread with whipped cream. Crush remaining cookies thoroughly and sprinkle the crumbs on the whipped cream. Chill 1 hour longer. Cut in squares. Garnish with mint leaves and maraschino cherries, if desired. Makes 9 servings.

Chocolate Pecan Pie
 2 squares unsweetened chocolate; 3 tablespoons butter; 3/4 cup sugar; 1 cup light corn syrup; 3 eggs, slightly beaten; 1 teaspoon vanilla; 1 cup coarsely chopped pecan meats; 1 unbaked 9-inch pie shell; 1/2 cup cream, whipped.

Melt chocolate and butter over hot water. Combine sugar and syrup in saucepan. Bring to a boil over high heat, stirring until sugar is dissolved. Boil 2 minutes. Add chocolate mixture. Pour slowly over eggs, stirring constantly. Add vanilla and nuts, stirring to mix well. Turn into unbaked pie shell. Bake in moderate oven (375° F.) 45 to 50 minutes, or until pie is puffed completely across top. Cool. Top with whipped cream.
