WIDE COVERAGE

Many people are still unaware of the extent to which social security payments affect the community, declares George Clark, manager of the San Angelo office of the Social Security Administration.

As old-age survivors insurance enters its seventeenth year of operation, Clark says, over five million people are receiving \$200 million in insurance payments each month. The total paid in 1953 to these retired workers, their families, and to dependent survivors of deceased workers who were insured will be more than \$21/2 billion.
