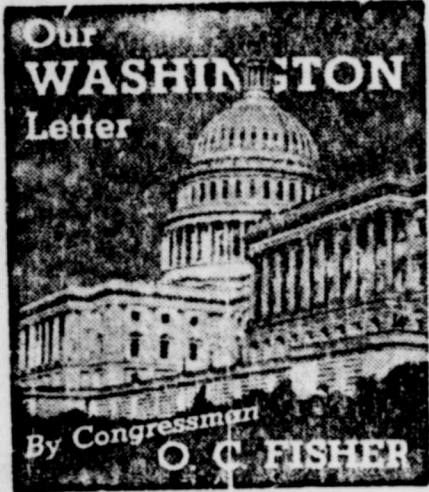

School Board Election Here April 4

There will be an election here on Saturday, April 4 for the purpose of electing two members of the school board. The two whose terms are expiring are Foster Sims Price and Reynolds Foster. The board had named Reynolds to fill out the unexpired term of John Reed, who resigned early this month, and whose term was expiring, so Reynolds will have to be voted on at the April election.

There have been no names certified for printing on the ballot. The deadline for filings is March 24.



THE RELATIVE POWER of Texans in the United States Senate was reduced a bit last week if the action of the House in voting to admit Hawaii to Statehood becomes law. By a vote of 227 to 182, the House called for Statehood. If admitted, the 466,000 Hawaiians will elect the same number of Senators that 7,700,000 Texans now elect. That means one Hawaiian will have the same power in the election of a United States Senator that 17 Texans will have, and will have 7 times the voting power as the average American will have.

I voted against the measure. I think it is a dangerous precedent and will probably be the forerunner for the admission of Alaska, Porto Rico, the Virgin Islands and others. Alaska has now under 100,000 people.

If Hawaii is admitted, it will be the first time in American history that a new state has been brought into the union where the majority of the people were not members of the Caucasian race. This is no reflection on the quality of the Mongolians who make up most of Hawaii's population, but it is fact that must be recognized. The bulk of that population is Japanese, Chinese, and Phillipino, while the Caucasian race accounts for only 16 1/2 per cent of the total population.

The Hawaiian Island are 2,000 miles from our west coast. Most of the people there have never seen the continental United States and probably never will see it.

It is claimed that we were obligated to admit those islands. But the fact is that there was no such agreement made when the Territory was created in 1900. Some fond hope for eventual Statehood were expressed by some individuals, but there was no formal agreement whatever.

It is also claimed that because of some of our States were admitted when they had very few people, the number of people is not important. But conditions have changed in 50 years. Fifty years ago we admitted nearly a million people annually as immigrants. That was when people, like new States, were needed to form the skeleton and nucleus for economic and political development of the Nation. But now we limit immigration, and by the same token we should be more choosy in admitting new States than we were 50 years ago.

The Hawaiian people have made a lot of progress. They pay a lot of taxes and are entitled to credit for their economic growth. It may be they should have independence, with a reservation for military installations. We gave Cuba independence and still maintain military bases there. The same is true of the Phillipines.

Judging by the surveys that have been made, if Hawaii is admitted to Statehood, it is likely that the two Senators and two Representatives who are elected will be "liberals", and will be prone to vote with the so-called left-wing element in Congress. Let us hope that will not be the case.

Kent Jones played a piano solo. Mrs. Martin C. Reed and Mr. O. T. Jones showed a Red Cross film.

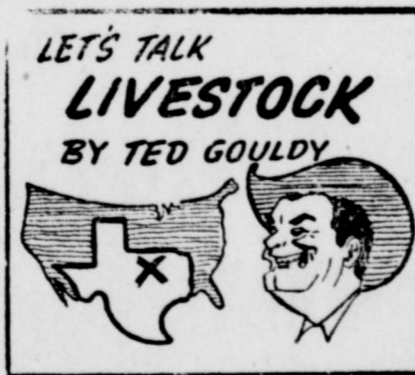

FORT WORTH—Hogs hit the highest point since last summer at Fort Worth Monday with a top of \$22.25 and the bulk of the good and choice 185-250 pound butchers selling 25 to 75 cents above last week's close and in the \$21.75 to \$22.25 range. Sows were steady at \$16.50 to \$19. Receipts all around the major market circle were far below a week ago and a year also, indicating the short supply of hogs this season was possibly in excess of predictions earlier this year.

Easter lambs shared the spotlight with breeding ewes Monday. Some pairs of ewes and small lambs sold around \$25 and \$26 per pair, a new high for months on this class, and this reflects directly the enhanced prospects in the sheep country since the good rains of about two weeks ago. Milk fat lambs reached \$23, old crop woolled lambs topped at \$22, and shorn lambs cashed at \$19.50 down. Some aged wethers sold for \$15. Slaughter ewes were scarce, a few from

Cattle trade was fairly active and generally steady. Some cows and fat yearlings stronger.

Good and choice fed steers and yearlings sold for \$18.50 to \$22, some weighty steers at \$21.50. Common, plain and medium butcher cattle sold for \$13 to \$18.50.

Fat cows drew \$14 to \$16, and canners and cutters cashed at \$10 to \$14. Bulls sold for \$13 to \$18.

Good and choice slaughter calves sold for \$18.50 to \$22, and common and medium offerings sold for \$13 to \$18.50, and culls drew \$10 to \$13.

A few stocker calves and yearlings sold for \$15 to \$21, and stocker cows sold from \$12 to \$16.50.

It is believed that virtually all of the X-Disease cattle, (those poisoned and suffering from hyperkeratosis) will have been destroyed within 10 days or two weeks. Most observers feel that at least 80 per cent have now been slaughtered.

Many cattle suffering from malnutrition have been marketed as "suspected" of having been poisoned. Old-timers are recalling the old saying that in this part of the country a cow will live all winter and then die in the spring. We are sure this is the case with hundreds we have seen here.

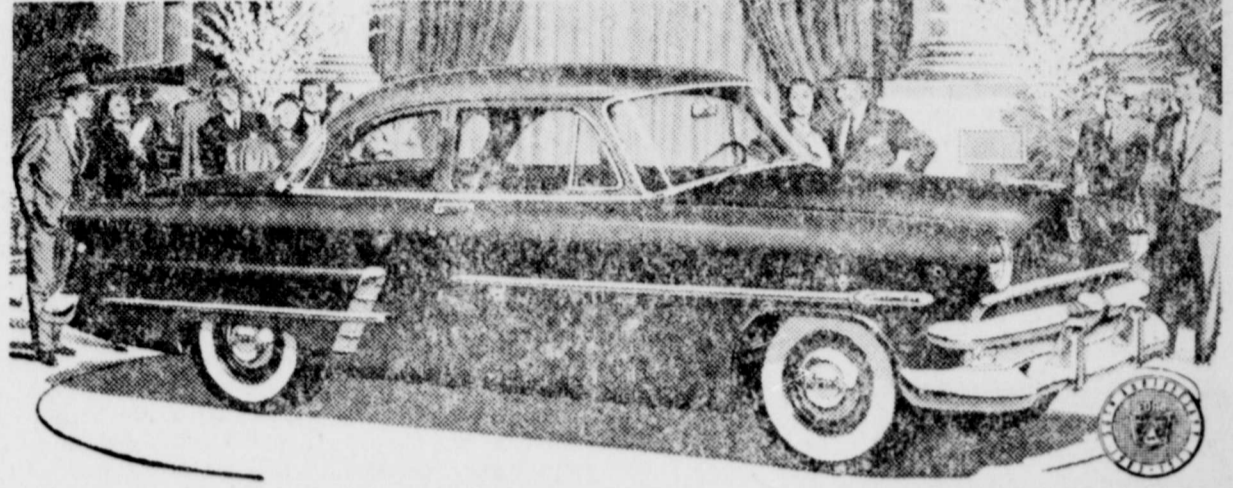

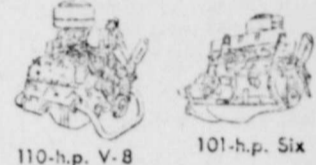

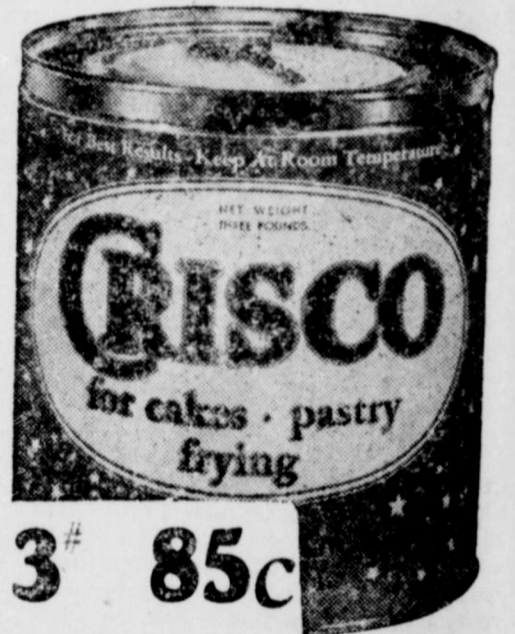

In accordance with the provisions of said House Bills, the State Highway Commission has ascertained and set forth in the proposal the wage rates, for each craft or type of workman or mechanic needed to execute the work on above named project, now prevailing in the locality in which the work is to be performed, and the Contractor shall pay not less than these wage rates as shown in the proposal for each craft or type of laborer, workman or mechanic employed on this project.

Legal holiday work shall be paid for at the regular governing rates.
