May I present the following food tips as something delicious and different which will enhance any meal during these forty days of the Lenten season? As a matter of fact you will probably want to use them long after Lent is a thing of the past.

Layered Cheese and Apple Salad
1 package lemon-flavored gelatin
1 cup hot water
1 cup minus 3 tablespoons cold water

$\frac{3}{4}$ teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon sugar
1 tablespoon lemon juice
1 cup diced red apple
1 package (3 ounces) cream cheese
 $\frac{1}{4}$ cup broken walnut meats.

Dissolve gelatin in hot water. Add cold water, salt, sugar and lemon juice. Chill until slightly thickened. Fold apple into half of mixture. Turn into 1-quart mold. Chill until firm.

Place remaining slightly thickened gelatin in bowl of ice and water. Whip with rotary egg beater until fluffy and thick like whipped cream. Soften cheese with fork, add a small amount of whipped gelatin, blend, and fold into remaining whipped gelatin. Then fold in nut meats. Turn into mold over firm gelatin. Chill until firm. Cut in slices or squares. Serve on crisp lettuce with mayonnaise. Makes 8 servings.

Creamed Shrimp with Rice

1 $\frac{1}{2}$ cups (5-ounce package) pre-cooked rice
1 $\frac{1}{2}$ cups water
 $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon salt

1 can cream of mushroom soup*
 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup milk
1 cup cooked shrimp**
Dash of pepper.

Combine pre-cooked rice, water and salt in saucepan. Mix just until all rice is moistened. Bring quickly to a boil over high heat. Turn down, simmer rice gently once or twice with a fork. (Do not stir.) Cover and remove from heat. Let stand 10 minutes.

Meanwhile, combine soup and milk in saucepan. Heat, stirring occasionally. Add shrimp and pepper. Mix and heat thoroughly. Makes 4 or 5 servings.

Serve Over the Rice. Arrange rice in serving dish and top with the creamed shrimp.

Serve Mixed with the Rice. Add rice to the creamed shrimp. Mix lightly and serve at once.

Casseroles. Add rice to the creamed shrimp. Mix lightly and turn into 1-quart casserole. Sprinkle with buttered crumbs and broil 2 to 3 minutes or until lightly browned.

*Or use cream of celery soup, cream of chicken soup, cream of asparagus soup, or cream of green vegetable soup.

**Use one 7-ounce can of shrimp. Or cook and clean about $\frac{1}{2}$ pound fresh shrimp.

Pancakes in Lent

Pancakes and syrup with scrambled eggs make a good combination for luncheon or supper. You can make them big or little; use your own favorite recipe, or a prepared pancake or biscuit mix. But, in any case, add to the batter 1 or 2 tablespoons dark corn syrup for an even, appetizing browning.

Serve the pancakes with a hot spread made by heating in a small saucepan, 1 cup dark corn syrup with $\frac{1}{4}$ cup butter or margarine. Bring mixture to a boil and stir until syrup is well blended. Makes about 1 $\frac{1}{4}$ cups syrup.

Orange Rennet Desserts

(No cooking, easy-to-make)
2 cups milk (not canned)
1 package rennet powder

Set out 4 or 5 dessert glasses. Warm milk slowly until lukewarm, stirring constantly. When comfortably warm (110° F.) not hot, remove at once from heat. Stir in entire contents of package of rennet powder at one time. Mix until powder is dissolved—not over one minute. Pour at once, while still liquid, into dessert glasses. Do not disturb for about 10 minutes, while milk sets. Chill in refrigerator. Top with whipped cream or meringue.

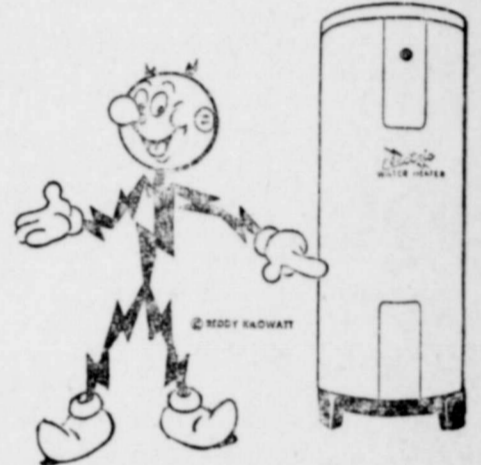

Gets Church Publicity Job

Bluford Hestir Named Director of Publicity for the Presbyterian Church, U. S.

Bluford Hestir of Austin, Texas has been named Director of Publicity for the Presbyterian Church in the United States. He is succeeding Harvey H. Walters. The Publicity Department is located in Decatur, Ga. Mr. Hestir is now director of Journalism, University of Texas Interscholastic League Press Conference, which has offices in Austin. He will move to Decatur on May 15 when he takes up his new duties there.

Born in Grayson, Kentucky, Mr. Hestir has spent most of his life in Texas and Arkansas. He is the son of Dr. Bluford B. Hestir, retired Presbyterian minister, now living at Cabot, Ark. and Nina Martin Hestir, whose family produced one lay moderator of the General Assembly. Mr. Hestir is a deacon in the University Presbyterian Church, Austin. He was graduated from San Angelo College and received a Bachelor of Journalism degree cum laude, from the University of Texas. He received a Master's degree in English, History and Journalism, from the University of Texas and afterwards did one year of study toward a doctorate in American civilization.

For awhile he was public relations advisor for the Texas Motor Transportation Association and editor of the "Steering Wheel", magazine of the association. He did page make up work and was news editor of the San Angelo Standard-Times for nearly a year until he enlisted in the United States Air Force. Four years later he was discharged with the rank of Captain and in May, 1948, became an instructor in English and assistant director of the Interscholastic League Press Conference in Austin. Following this he took a position as copy editor and assistant night editor of the Austin American.

Bluford resided here with his parents, the B. B. Hestir's and is well-known to Sterling people.

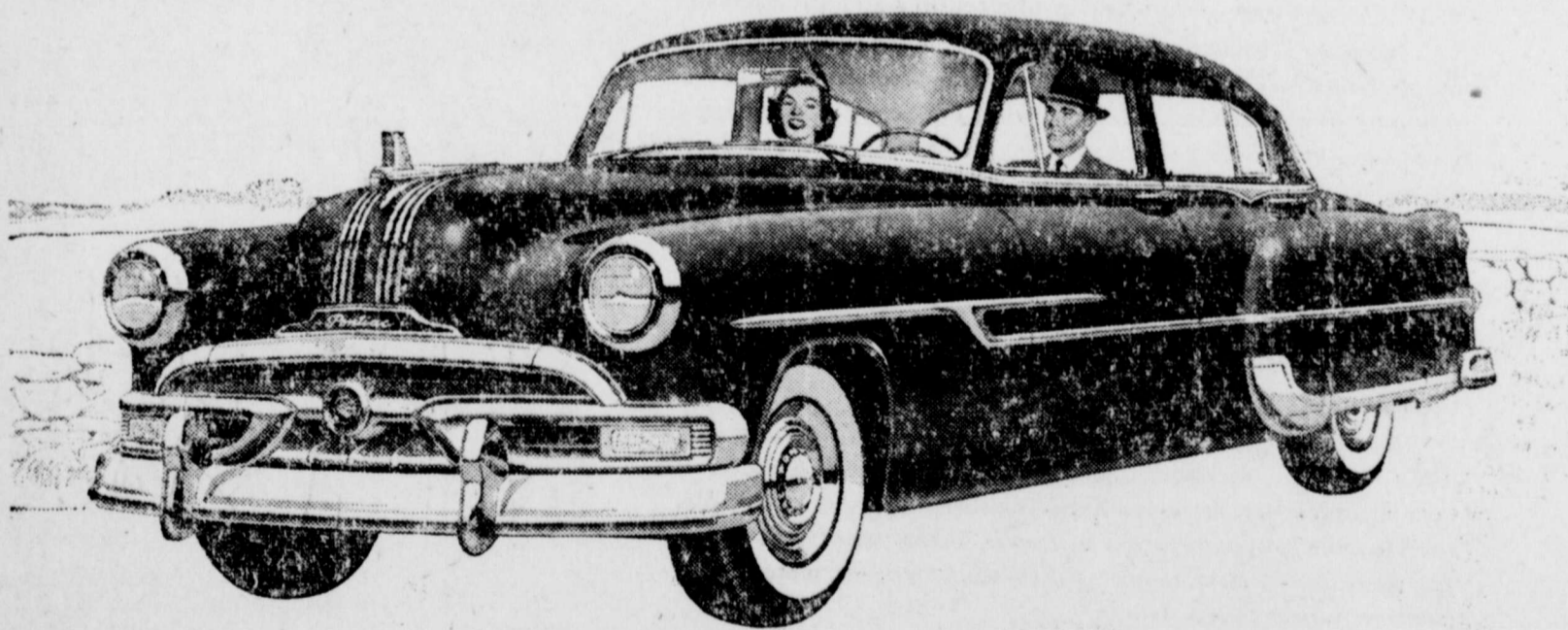

Glamour Gal!

GIVE a girl a new party dress and presto—she's a new woman! We tried the same technique on that favorite, "gal" of the food world, lemon pudding and pie filling mix.



First, for a touch of color and spice we added gingersnap crumbs; then we gave her a topper of sweetened whipped cream to that elegant look—and, oh my!—What a dish!

Ginger Lemon Squares

1 1/4 cups fine gingersnap cookie crumbs; 3 tablespoons sugar; 1/4 cup butter, melted.

1 package lemon pudding and pie filling mix; 1/2 cup sugar; 2 cups water; 1 egg, unbeaten; 1 tablespoon butter.

Combine crumbs and 2 tablespoons sugar. Add melted butter and mix well. Press two-thirds of mixture firmly on bottom of 8x8x2-inch pan. Bake in moderate oven (375° F.) 5 minutes. Cool.

Combine pudding mix, 1/2 cup sugar, and 1/4 cup of the water in a saucepan. Add egg and blend well. Then add remaining 1 1/2 cups water. Cook and stir until mixture comes to a full boil and is thickened—about 5 minutes. Remove from heat. Add butter and blend well. Cool only about 5 minutes, stirring once or twice. Turn onto baked crumb mixture. Sprinkle with remaining crumbs. Chill until firm. Cut in rectangles and serve with sweetened whipped cream. Makes 8 servings.

"Easy As Pie"

AS a matter of fact, this Coconut Tutti-Frutti Pie is even easier than the ordinary pie, because it uses that wonderful time-saver, prepared pudding and pie filling mix as a base.



This pie is made with "delightfully different" coconut cream pudding and has chopped maraschino cherries, dates and almonds folded in. Garnish with some whipped cream and you have a pie that's not only delicious to eat, but extra-special in looks, too.

Coconut Tutti-Frutti Pie

1 package coconut cream pudding and pie filling mix; 2 cups milk; 2 tablespoons chopped maraschino cherries; 2 tablespoons chopped dates; 2 tablespoons chopped almonds; 1/2 teaspoon rum flavoring; 1 baked 8-inch pie shell; 1/2 cup cream, whipped and sweetened.

Combine pie filling mix and milk in a saucepan. Cook and stir over medium heat until the mixture comes to a full boil. Remove from heat. Cool only about 5 minutes, stirring once or twice. Fold in fruit, almonds, and flavoring. Pour into pie shell. Chill. Spread whipped cream on top.

One for the Cooky Jar

HAVING trouble keeping the cooky jar filled these days? Well, you could keep a padlock on it, but a much easier way is to choose recipes for cookies that require no rolling and cutting, like Coconut Oatmeal Cookies! And just because they're quick-and-easy,



don't think they're not delicious—as a matter of fact these are extra special, with tender coconut, mixed right in the batter, adding a delicate and subtle goodness!

Coconut Oatmeal Cookies

1 cup sifted flour; 1/2 teaspoon double-acting baking powder; 1/2 teaspoon salt; 1/2 teaspoon soda; 1/2 cup butter or other shortening; 1/2 cup granulated sugar; 1/2 cup brown sugar, firmly packed; 1 egg, unbeaten; 1 teaspoon vanilla; 1/2 cup rolled oats; 1 cup shredded coconut.

Sift flour once, measure, add baking powder, salt, and soda, and sift again. Cream shortening, add sugars gradually, and cream together until light and fluffy. Add egg and vanilla and beat well. Add flour, rolled oats, and coconut and mix thoroughly. Shape dough in small balls and place on ungreased baking sheet. Bake in moderate oven (375°) 12 to 15 minutes. Makes 2 dozen cookies.

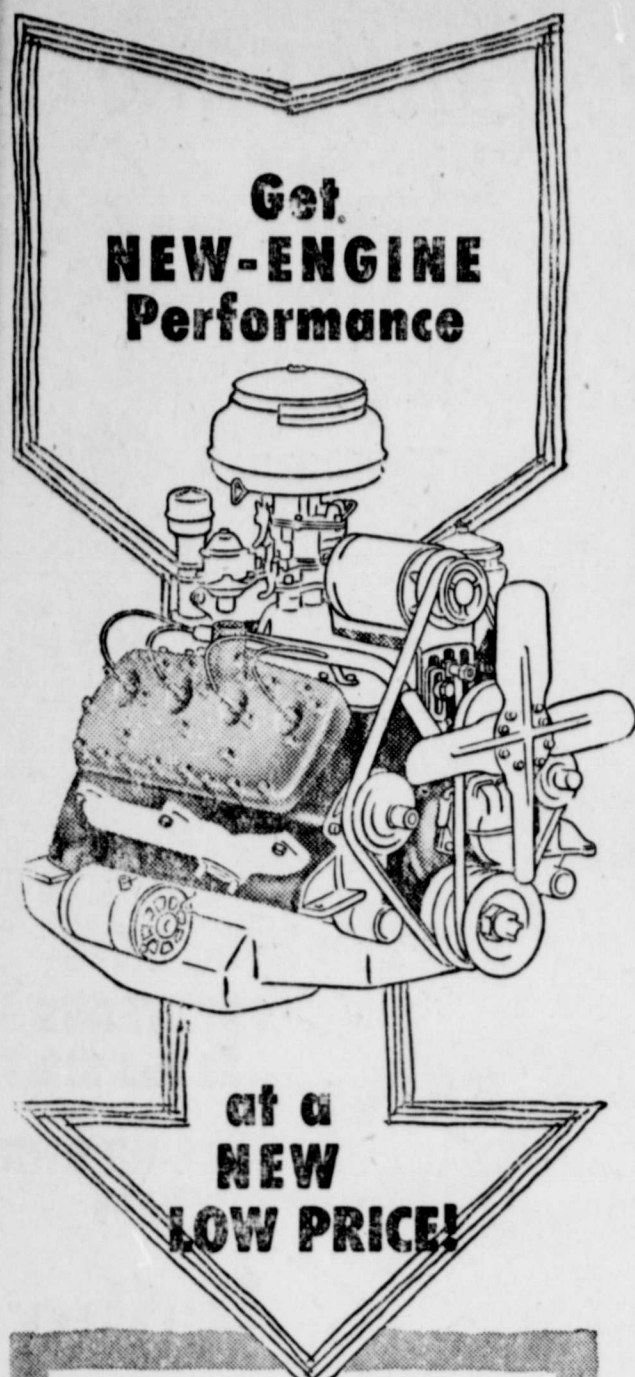
