

Mix just until all rice is meistened. Bring quickly to a boil over high heat, uncovered, fluffig rice gettly once or twice with a fork. (Do not stir.) Cover and remove from heat. Let stand 10 minutes.




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

Bluford Hestir Named Director of Publicity for the Presbyterian Church, U. S.

Bluford Hestir of Austin, Texas has been named Director of Publicity for the Presbyterian Church in the United States. He is succeeding Harvey H. Walters. The Publicity Department is located in Decatur, Ga. Mr. Hestir is now director of Journalism, University of Texas Interscholastic League Press Conference, which has offices in Austin. He will move to Decatur on May 15 when he takes up his new duties there.

Born in Grayson, Kentucky, Mr. Hestir has spent most of his life in Texas and Arkansas. He is the son of Dr. Bluford B. Hestir, retired Presbyterian minister, now living at Cabot, Ark. and Nina Martin Hestir, whose famiy produced one lay moderator of the General Assembly. Mr. Hestir is a deacon in the University Presbyterian Church, Austin. He was graduated from San Angelo College and received a Bachelor of Journalism degree cum laude, from the University of Texas. He received a Master's degree in English, History and Journalism, from the University of Texas and afterwards did one year of study toward a doctorate in American civilization.

For awhile he was public relations advisor for the Texas Motor Transportation Association and editor of the "Steering Wheel", magazine of the association. He did page make up work and was news elitor of the San Angelo Standard-Times for nearly a year until he enlisted the United States Air Force. Four years later he was discharged with the rank of Captain and in May, 1948, became an instructor in English and assistant director of the Interscholastic League Press Conference in Austin. Following this he took a position as copy editor and assistant night editor of the Austin American.

Bluford resided here with his parents, the B. B. Hestir's and is wellknown to Sterling people.

1¼ cups fine gingersnap cooky crumbs; 3 tablespoons sugar; ¼ cup butter, melted.

1 package lemon pudding and pie filling mix; ½ cup sugar; 2 cups water; 1 egg, unbeaten; 1 table-spoon butter.

Combine crumbs and 2 tablespoons sugar. Add melted butter and mix well. Press two-thirds of mixture firmly on bottom of 8x8x2-inch pan. Bake in moderate oven (3.5° F.) 5 minutes. Cool.

Combine pudding mix, ½ cup sugar, snd ½ cup of the water in a saucepan. Add egg and blend well. Then add remaining 1½ cups water. Cook and stir until mixture comes to a full boil and is thickened—about 5 minutes. Remove from heat. Add butter and blend well. Cool only about 5 minutes, stirring once or twice. Turn onto baked crumb mixture. Sprinkle with remaining crumbs. Chill until firm. Cut in rectangles and serve with sweetened whipped cream. Makes is servings.

Combine pie filling mix and milk in a saucepan. Cook and stir over medium heat until the mixture comes to a full boil. Remove from heat. Cool only about 5 minutes, stirring once or twice. Fold in fruit, almonds, and flavoring. Pour into pie shell. Chill. Spread whipped cream on top.

1 cup sifted flour; ½ teaspoon double-acting baking powder; ½ teaspoon soda; ½ teaspoon soda; ½ cup butter or other shortening; ½ cup granulated sugar; ½ cup brown sugar, firmly packed; 1 egg. unbeaten; 1 teaspoon vanilla; ½ cup rolled oats; 1 cup shredded coconut.

Sift flour once, measure, add baking powder, salt, and soda, and sift again. Cream shortening, add sugars gradually, and cream together until light and fluffy. Add egg and vanilla and beat well. Add flour, rolled oats, and coconut and mix thoroughly. Shape dough in small balls and place on ungreased baking sheet. Bake in moderate oven (375°) 12 to 15 minutes. Makes 2 dozen cookies.





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
