





A Coronation Year Tasty

England has her adored Prince Charles and her adorable Princess Anne—both much in the limelight during Coronation year. How they sleep, where they go, what they eat and how they dress is NEWS—real news.

But in the kingdoms of millions of homes, all over the world, there are untitled "wee ones" who are just as important to their relatives as the famous Royal tots are to theirs.

Prince Charles, I have read, likes roast chicken. Both he and his sister, it is claimed, like rennet-custard and ice creans—but what child, whoever he may be, refuses either of these healthful tasties? While the Coronation is still news, let's cater to our little ones with timely dishes like the following:

Coronation Rennet-Custard

H

Set out 1 or 2 custard cups, depending on baby's appetite. Warm 12 cup whole milk until lukewarm, stirring constantly. Test a drop on the inside of your wrist frequently. When it feels comfortably warm (110° F.) not hot, remove at once from heat. Stir in 1 tablespoon raspberry rennet powder. Mix until powder is dissolved—not over one minute. Pour, at once, while still liquid into custard cups. Do not disturb for about 10 minutes, while milk sets. Serve rennet-custard immediately or chill in refrigerator.

When ready to serve, garnish with crown topping. To make topping cut a 1" piece of banana. From the top, cut out 2 V-shaped wedges about "4" deep at river angles to each other



Smooth, firm custard, filled with lots of tender coconut; a crest of rich, dark chocolate garnished with additional coconut; and a tender, flaky pie shell all add up to a mouth-watering dessert that's sure to be enjoyed thoroughly, requested often.

Chocolate Crested Coconut Pie

- 4 eggs, slightly beaten 1/2 to 1/2 cup sugar
- 4 teaspoon salt 3 cups milk 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1 cup coconut 1 unbaked 9-inch pie shell
- 2 tablespoons sugar 1 square unsweetened chocolate,
- melied 2 tablespoons hot water

Combine eggs, sugar, salt, milk, vanilla and coconut; mix well. Pour into pie shell. Bake in hot oven (425° F.) 36 minutes, or until custard is set.

Combine sugar and chocolate. Add hot water gradually, blending well. Pour chocolate mixture on top of baked pie. Reduce oven to 300° F. and bake 7 to 10 minutes longer, or until chocolate is set. Cool, Garnish with additional coconut.

Heat chocolate over hot water until partly melted. Remove from water and stir rapidly until completely melted. Then add cereal and mix well. Drop from teaspoon on waxed paper and cool until firm. Or press into greases \$xxx-inca par. When firm out into squares. Makes about 2 dozen clusters or squares.

Ginger Lemon Squares

1¼ cups fine gingersnap cooky crumbs; 3 tablespoons sugar; 1, cup butter, melted.

1 package lemon pudding and pie filling mix; ½ cup sugar; 2 cuts water; 1 egg, unbeaten; 1 tablespoon butter.

Combine crumbs and 3 tablespoons sugar. Add melted butter and mix well. Press two-thirds of mixture firmly on bottom of \$x\$x2-inch pan. Bake in moderate oven (375° F.) 5 minutes. Cool.

Combine pudding mix, ½ cup sugar, and ¼ cup of the water in a saucepan. Add egg and blend weil. Then add remaining 1½ cups water. Cook and stir until mixture comes to a full boll and is thickened—about 5 minutes. Remove from heat. Add butter and bfend well. Cool only about 5 minutes, stirring once or twice. Turn onto baked crunab mixture. Sprinkle with remaining crumbs. Chill until firm. Cut in rectangles and serve with sweetened whipped cream. Makes 5 servings.

Sift flour once, measure, add baking powder, salt, and soda, and sift again. Cream shortening, add sugars gradually, and cream together until light and fluffy. Add egg and vanilla and beat well. Add flour, rolled oats, and coconut and mix thoroughly. Shape dough in small balls and place on un-greased baking sheet. Bake in mod-erate oven (375°) 12 to 15 minutes. Makes 2 dozen cookles.



1 package chocolate pudding and pie filling mix; 2 cups milk; 1/4 to 1/2 teaspoon almond extract; 1 or 2 egg whites, stiffly beaten; 6 ladyfingers (12 split) or 24 strips of sponge or plain cake.

Combine pudding mix and milk in a saucepan. Cook and stir over medium heat until mixture comes to a full boil. Remove from heat. Cool, stirring occasionally. add almond extract. Fold in beaten egg whites. Split ladyfingers and cut in half. For each serving, place 4 pieces ladyfingers (or cake) in sherbet glass and fill with pudding Makes 6 servings.


