

Once rabies develops in man, it mals like cats, squirrels and skunks. Because the animal may be rabid, it should be captured and penned up for a ten-day observation period. if at all possible. The wound should be washed with soap and water to remove all saliva, and the doctor called immediately. He will decide what further steps should be taken.

Victims of the heat require quick treatment. With heat stroke (or sunstroke) the patient has a hot, nearly normal. He may faint. The \$5,000. victim of heat cramps, in addition exhaustion.

American wool growers have suffered considerably during the past four years from the effects of subsidies that have been paid to wool exporters from Uruguay and Argentina. To obtain American dollars, which are readily exchangable in any foreign currency and are very much sought after in international trade, Peron and Uruguay have given their wool exporters a subsidy in amounts that have enabled those people to pay the duty and still be able to sell their wool in this country at prices below our cost of production. This practice has displaced the normal market for some of our own wool and has placed our growers in an unfavorable situation. Import of wool tops from those countries during the past four years has increased more than 1000% because of the advantage of the export subwhom "Miss Wool" will be chosen. sidy. 


