





1 package lemon pudding and piefilling mix; ½ cup sugar; 2 cap-water; 1 egg, unbeaten; 1 table spoon butter.

Combine crumbs and 2 tablespoons sugar. Add melted butter and mix well. Press two-thirds of mixture firmly on bottom of 8x8x2-inch pan. Bake in moderate oven (375° F.) 5 minutes. Cool.

Combine pudding mix, 1/2 cup sugar, and 1/4 cup of the water in a saucepan. Add egg and blend well. Then add remaining 1% cups water. Cook and stir until mixture comes to a full boli and is, thickened—about 5 minutes. Remove from heat. Add butter and blend well. Cool only about 5 minutes, stirring once or twice. Turn onto remaining crumbs. Chill until firm. Cut in sectangles and serve with sweetened whipped cream. Makes




