


Baptist Revival Starts Next Wednesday



cup butter, melted. 1 package lemon pudding and p filling mix; 1/2 cup sugar; 2 cu water; 1 egg, unbeaten; 1 tab. spoon butter.

Combine crumbs and 3 tablespoonsugar. Add melted butter and mix well. Press two-thirds of mixture firmly on bottom of 8x8x2-inch Bake in moderate oven (375° F.) 5 minutes, Cool.

Combine pudding mix, 1/2 cup sugar, and ¼ cup of the water in a saucepan. Add egg and blend well. Then add remaining 1% cups water. Cook and stir until mixture comes to a full boll and is thickened—about 5 minutes. Remove from heat. Add butter and blend well. Cool only about 5 minutes, stirring once or twice. Turn onto baked crumb mixture. Sprinkle with remaining crumbs. Chill until firm, Cut in rectangles and serve with sweetened whipped cream. Makes 1 serving:

(Continued from Front Page) gave a fair indication of the change of climate in PMA and the Department of Agriculture generally with his statement last week on the drouth disaster program. He said: "This is a disaster program, not one aimed at giving people some cheap feed." McCan says what he thinks everytime, as many of the members of the livestock know from past experience. Such frank expressions are entirely new to government programs.




