

Mr. Parsons planted two and a half acres of Buffel grass in the spring of 1952. After six weeks he started harvesting seed. When frost nipped the grass he had harvested fifteen hundred pounds of clean hand-picked seed. In addition to this he cut two-thousand bundles

All three calves have made good gains with no supplementary feed. The grass was still staying ahead of the three calves so Mr. Parsons mowed it. In July the grass was doing so well that Mr. Parsons bought thirty nine head of cutback lambs to help harvest his Buffel grass. Now on September 18, the calves and lambs are all gaining daily and the grass is still staying ahead of them. This 21/2 acres is divided into three pastures and at present one pasture is better than knee-high and the other two are not grazed too closely. Mr. Parsons says that under grazing the grass requires more water than when harvesting for seed production. Both years very little rainfall has occured and this year under grazing he has watered his grass about every fifteen days with a sprinkler system and put on about two and one-half inches each watering. None of the livestock have been doubt but that they have made good gains. At least you would have seed production.





Let's Make Fudge - By Betty Barclay -

ratO say that recipes for fudge are as numerous as the sands would be more than slight exaggeration, but



you'll have to admit there are a goodly num-ber. If you could total all the recipe variations of this eandy favorite, there would probably be al-

most as many as the number of people who ever said, "Let's make fudge." Of course, all these fudge recipes aren't good recipes, so if you need something rather special, try this Log Cabin Fudge.

Log Cabin Fudge

1 cup maple-blended syrup; 1 cup sugar; dash of salt; ½ cup light cream; ¾ cup broken walnut meats.

Combine syrup, sugar, salt, and cream and place over low heat. Bring to boiling point, stirring constantly. Then boil, without stirring, until a small amount of mixture forms a soft ball in cold water (or to a temperature of 236° F.). Remove from heat. Cool to luke-warm (110° F.), without stirring. Then beat until mixture loses its gloss (12 to 15 minutes). Add nuts and turn at once into lightly buttered 8x4x3-inch pan. When cold, cut in squares. Makes 18 large pieces.

Pimiento Strips Lace Veal Football Loaf



By BETTY EARCLAY It's football kick-off time, and here's a veal loaf that will be the star of any football party, whether it's for the youngster's gang or your own friends. Shape the meat like a football and "lace it up" with gay strips of red pimiento. This main dish is just as pretty when it's cut, because hard-cooked eggs and pimiento rolls are placed so they will show in every slice. Note: You can also press this loaf into : regular loaf pan or into any othe shape you might wish.

Pimiento Veal Loaf

- 2 pounds yeal, ground 1/2 pound pork, ground
- green pepper, chopped onion, chopped
- tablespoon lemon juice
