

Combine pudding mix and 14 cup of water in saucepan. Add whole egg and blend well. Then add remaining 114 cups water. Cook and stir until mixture comes to a full boil and is thickened. (This takes about 5 minutes.) Remove from heat. Cool about 5 minutes; stir once or twice. Chill.

Cream butter until soft. Add sugar gradually, blending well after each addition. Add chilled pudding gradually, beating well with rotary egg beater.

Split cake into three layers. Spread frosting between layers and on top and sides of cake. Makes 10 to 12 servings.

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

It's football kick-off time, and here's a veal loaf that will be the star of any football party, whether it's for the youngster's gang or your own friends. Shape the meat like a football and "lace it up" with gay strips of red pimiento. This main dish is just as pretty when it's cut, because hard-cooked eggs and pimiento rolls are placed so they will show in every slice. Note: You can also press this loaf into a regular loaf pan or into any other shape you might wish

Pimiento Veal Loaf

- 2 pounds yeal, ground 14 pound pork, ground 2 green pepper, chopped
- 1 tablespoon lemon juice teaspoon salt 1 cup fresh bread crumbs, packed
- 1 egg
- 1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce
- 3 hard-cooked eggs 1 4-oz, can or jar of pimiento

Mix all ingredients except bacon hard-cooked eggs, and pimiento. Di-vide the mixture in half and press onhalf into baking dish in the shape of a football. Press a hollow down the center and place eggs in it, end to end. Make rolls of pimiento and place on each side of the eggs. Now place remainder of meat mixture over this and finish patting into a football shape. Place strips of bacon over top. Cover and bake 40 minutes at 300 degrees F. Remove cover and bake 30 minutes. Win Second in Home Improvement Contest

In Arkansas

Mr. and Mrs. Benny G. Green of near Evreton ,won second place in seventeen northwe t Arkanses counties after entering a contest for home improvement, sponsored by the Farmers Home Administration, Agricultural Extension Service, Arkansas Press Association and the Arkansas Power and Light Company. This honor was in recognition of their efforts on their kitchen.

Mr. Green is an excellent cabinet maker and the cabinets are almost perfect in construction. The surface of the cabinets were made by ripping good pine lumber into one inch strips. The strips were then glued together, dressed, sanded and covered with several coats of clear varnish. Mr. Green states that this sort of construction will never give, warp or sag regardless of the years of service.

Mr. and Mrs. Green and son, Rickey, came to Arkansas in September, 1951 from West Texas. They purchased a 220 acre farm from W. O. Kisner known as Duggars Stand near Everton. In 1952 they secured a farm Housing Loan through the local office of the Farmers Home A ministration to remodel the old house on their place making it modern in every way. They used a spring for their water supply. This spring comes out of the bluff east of the house high enough to afford gravity water pressure to throw water above the house roof.

The Greens are milking fourteen good dairy cows and run a small herd of fifteen Hereford beef cows.

Mr. Green is a World War II veteran and served in the 944 Guard Squadron of the Air Force. He was discharged January 19, 1944.
