Combine butter, brown sugar, and light corn syrup in saucepan. Place over low heat. Cook and stir con-stantly until mixture comes to a boil. Add water and bring again to a boil. Boil 1 to 2 minutes. Remove from heat. Stir in pincapple. Set sauce with chopped nuts. Bake in moderate oven  $(350^\circ F.)$  50 to 55 minutes, or until done. until done.

Most people think only of gasolines, lubricants, and fuel oils when the petroleum industry is mentioned. The fact is, practically all oil producers are also natural gas producers.
